State Government To Provide More Information On Internet

PIERRE (AP) — Gov. Dennis Daugaard says state government will update its Internet site to provide more information meaningful to South Dakotans.

The website, <http://open.sd.gov/>, was started in September 2008 and now provides information on the state budget, contracts, payments to vendors and state employees' salaries. It also has links to city, county and school district websites.

Daugaard says the state plans to add more information by late July.

New information will include more details on payments to vendors, easier searches by categories of payments and easier searches for state employees' salaries. Users also will be able to download data into a spreadsheet for analysis in their own computers.

The South Dakota Newspaper Association's Dave Bordewyk says he's glad Daugaard is making the website better and making more information available to the public.

he said.

Yankton County Commission Chairman Bruce Jensen said he is expecting mosquito control to be a challenge this year. In addition to spraying its own properties, the county contracts with cities and townships to control the mosquito population. It also puts pellets in some bodies of water to kill mosquito larvae.

"This year is probably going to be one of the worst years for mosquitos because of all the water," Jensen said. "We're ready for it. We've been spraying."

Large swaths of the county have been sprayed, he stated.

Jensen said he sometimes encounters criticism of mosquito control from constituents but firmly believes it is a worthwhile expenditure.

"What if we didn't spray every year? Then how many cases of West Nile would we have?" he asked. "To me, it's something we have to keep doing every year. If it isn't West Nile (posing a threat to people through mosquitoes), it might be something else."

In June, South Dakota Gov. Dennis Daugaard announced that the state will distribute \$200,000 in mosquito control chemicals to 122 programs in the 36 counties with flood disaster declarations in place this summer. Funding to purchase the chemicals comes from Department of Health general funds, the result of savings in its FY 2011 budget.

"Flooding conditions this year are extraordinary, and mosquito control will become increasingly important because flood waters are expected to remain well into the summer in many places," Daugaard said in a media release. "This assistance will benefit local control programs that work to reduce mosquito numbers and cut the risk of West Nile Virus."

Area counties benefiting from the funds include Clay, Hutchinson, Union and Yankton.

Symptoms of West Nile virus vary from person to person, but they include fever, headache, body aches, nausea, vomiting and sometimes swollen lymph glands or a skin rash on the chest, stomach and back.

Symptoms typically last a few days. About one in 150 people will develop severe illness that can last much longer and lead to neurological effects that may be permanent.

Barb Ogg, a University of Nebraska-Lincoln Extension educator in Lancaster County, said in a media release that people should begin protection from mosquitoes by eliminating breeding grounds such as flower pots, cans and old tires, which collect water. Bird baths should be dumped out at least twice a week and gutters should be checked to make sure they aren't clogged, she added.

"If they're going to spray their yard, it'll be effective for maybe a day or two," Ogg said of the alternative control method.

For ponds or flooded areas, Ogg said briquets or granules of the bacteria *Bacillus thuringiensis israelensis* (Bti) can be used to kill mosquito larvae. It doesn't harm other organisms.

In addition, make sure window and door screens are in good condition, Ogg stated.

When people do go outside, they should wear long-sleeved clothing and long pants. Light-colored clothing seems to attract fewer mosquitoes than dark-colored clothing, Cortinas said.

Mosquitoes are most active at dawn and dusk, so try to avoid being outside during those hours.

According to Ogg, the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention recommends three kinds of mosquito repellents:

- DEET is the most common chemical used in insect repellents. DEET is effective, lasts up to eight hours (depending on the concentration) and is considered "the gold standard" for mosquito repellents, Ogg said. However, many people don't like DEET because it has an oily feeling and odor.
- Picaridin is as effective as DEET but it isn't as long-lasting. However, it is not greasy and doesn't have an odor.
- Oil of lemon eucalyptus (PMD) is extracted from the lemon eucalyptus plant. Ogg noted that people like it because it's a natural substance, but it lasts for a shorter period of time than DEET or Picaridin, so it needs to be re-applied more frequently.

spot painting to complete the project.

Work resumed on the \$4.8 million conversion of the approximately 87-year-old bridge into a bicycling/walking trail in the spring after a winter hiatus. The contract called for the project to be complete by Nov. 1, 2010. However, more steel deterioration was found on the bridge than expected, which required additional planning and work.

Heiman said the change orders could mean the project's cost will exceed \$5 million. Currently, he stated that the additional expenditures do not exceed 5 percent of the original cost.

Heiman encouraged the public to stay off the bridge as work continues.

"Periodically, we've found people on the structure," he said. "We've also seen them breaking through the safety fence and entering it. There are open holes and major hazards on the bridge, and we ask that people stay clear of the site for their own safety and that of the workers."

Agency said in a statement Monday afternoon that officials were still taking air and water samples to determine the impacts.

Exxon Mobil has estimated that that up to 1,000 barrels, or 42,000 gallons, of crude oil spilled Friday night before the flow from the damaged pipeline was stopped. The break near Laurel has fouled miles of riverbank, although high water has hobbled attempts to find where all the oil went.

EPA officials said they and U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service personnel conducted an aerial assessment of the Yellowstone from Laurel to 30 miles downstream of Billings, finding oil deposits along the river banks, in slow water and in small pools in backwaters at intermittent points.

Montana's Disaster and Emergency Services Division was unable to give an update on the spill Monday.

The 20-year-old Silvertip pipeline delivered 40,000 barrels a day to a refinery in Billings along a route that passes beneath the river.

The line was temporarily shut down in May after Laurel officials raised concerns that it could be at risk as the Yellowstone started to rise. And regulators twice in the last year warned Exxon Mobil of several safety violations along the line.

The company decided to restart the line after examining its safety record and deciding it was safe, Pruessing said.

The U.S. Department of Transportation, which oversees pipelines, notified Exxon Mobil in July 2010 of seven potential safety violations and other problems along the pipeline. Two of the warnings faulted the company for its emergency response and pipeline corrosion training.

Transportation Department spokeswoman Patricia Klinger said the company has since responded to the warnings and the case was closed.

The company also was cited for "probable violations" in a February letter. Those included inadequate pipeline markers in a housing development, a section of pipeline over a ditch covered with potentially damaging material and debris, vegetation in a housing area that covered a portion of line and prevented aerial inspections, and a line over a canal not properly protected against corrosion.
