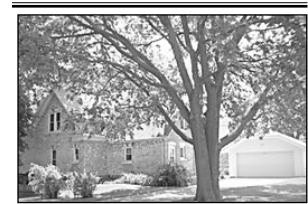

Governments in Watertown will be a partner in carrying out the program.

PDIII was among 43 community-based organizations around the country to receive funding, which is designed to promote economic growth. In addition, six rural microenterprises received loans and grants to support rural business development, create jobs and strengthen local communities.

"A strong rural America and a strong agricultural industry go hand in hand," said Agriculture Sec. Tom Vilsack in a media release. "These investments will bring increased economic opportunity to rural residents and communities. And they will help organizations expand job opportunities across the nation."

The funding is provided through the Rural Community Development Initiative Program (RCDI) and the Rural Microentrepreneur Assistance Program (RMAP). RCDI helps community-based development organizations, federally-recognized Indian tribes and other groups promote economic growth in low-income, rural communities.

South Dakota Rural Development Director Elsie Meeks said applications for the funding are scored according to certain criteria.

"Are they in a rural community? Are they serving communities that have population decline or poverty?" she said. "We determine their eligibility, basically. Then we send them to the national office, where they are selected."

This was the third time that PDIII applied for GIS training funding.

"Their application rose to the top this time," Meeks said.

She stated that it's important for South Dakotans to realize how this federal funding is used to work hand in hand with local communities.

"When the people from these communities of only a couple hundred people understand how to use GIS, it's really going to help their communities," Meeks said. "I don't think people understand sometimes how important these federal programs are — that it's not just wasteful spending. These are all things that build infrastructure for our communities, especially for rural communities. There are not a lot of resources for some of these small communities, whether it's Avon, Centerville or some other small town. The federal government really becomes a partner with them and helps them do what they need."

Henderson said his organization has been tenacious in applying for the funding because it believes strongly in the proposal and in its value to rural counties.

"We kept working it until it became more competitive," he stated. "The training will be provided at three levels (over three years). There will be some direct training with individual counties that have signed up to receive the training. There will also be some regional learning opportunities, where those counties will be invited to participate with other counties in a group setting. Then there will probably be a statewide event, where these counties will get together and share their experiences to do some group learning, too."

PDIII had to provide matching funds equivalent to 50 percent of the grant, which will largely take the form of staff time, Henderson said.

"We're excited about the opportunity to do this project," he stated. "It's going to affect a number of counties across the whole state."

Vegas Police Sorry After Wrong Man Goes To Prison For Four Years

LAS VEGAS (AP) — Las Vegas police officials apologized Thursday for a DNA error that sent the wrong man to prison for four years.

Authorities said a financial settlement is being worked out with Wayne Jackson after determining that a laboratory technician mishandled evidence following Jackson's 2001 arrest on kidnapping and robbery charges.

"We acknowledged that we made a mistake," Clark County Sheriff Doug Gillespie said.

The error was exposed in November by officials at a national database known as the Combined DNA Index System. Authorities found that evidence taken from a California inmate matched genetic material already on file as belonging to Jackson. A resulting investigation turned up the mistake by Terry Cook, a veteran forensics scientist who handled the DNA samples.

Lab chief Linda Krueger said authorities are reviewing as many as 250 cases that Cook handled during his time at the lab.

Authorities said no other mistakes had been discovered. But Gillespie said Cook had been placed on paid leave pending an internal police investigation and a review by the lab accrediting agency.

Attempts to contact Cook for comment were not immediately successful.

Authorities, in announcing the details of the case at a news conference on Thursday, also said they released an Internet video in an effort to explain further how such a mistake could have occurred.

The officials said the mishandled evidence led Jackson to plead guilty in 2003 to kidnapping and robbery in a plea deal that his current lawyer said avoided the possibility of life in prison on a kidnapping conviction. Jackson served four years before his release in 2006.

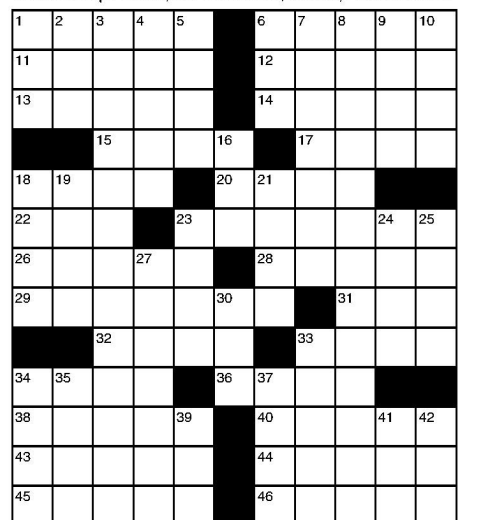
