August live cattle fell 0.07 cent to \$1.1465 a pound; August feeder cattle fell 0.30 cent to \$1.4360 a pound; August lean hogs fell 0.10 cent to 96.17 cents a pound; while August pork bellies were unchanged at \$1.065 a pound.

New Traffic Signal In Place At 8th And Summit

In a continual effort to provide the safest roadways, the South Dakota Department of Transportation recently installed flashing yellow turn arrows at the intersection of Eighth Street and Summit Avenue in Yankton.

A flashing yellow arrow means left turns are permitted, but drivers must first yield to oncoming traffic and pedestrians before proceeding with caution. This system replaces the solid green "ball" indication as a signal for motorists to proceed through the intersection.

The solid yellow arrow means motorists should prepare to stop or complete their left turn if they are in the intersection.

The change to flashing yellow arrows is the result of a national study conducted for the Federal Highway Administration which demonstrated that the new signals help prevent left turn crashes by 35 percent.

The new signal system is part of a larger construction project on West 8th Street (S.D. Highway 52). The asphalt surfacing portion of this project is scheduled to resume the week of July 18 and be completed by Aug. 1, 2011.

Traffic will be maintained through the project and at the Eighth and Summit intersection for the duration of the project.

The Prime Contractor is Commercial Asphalt of Mitchell.
