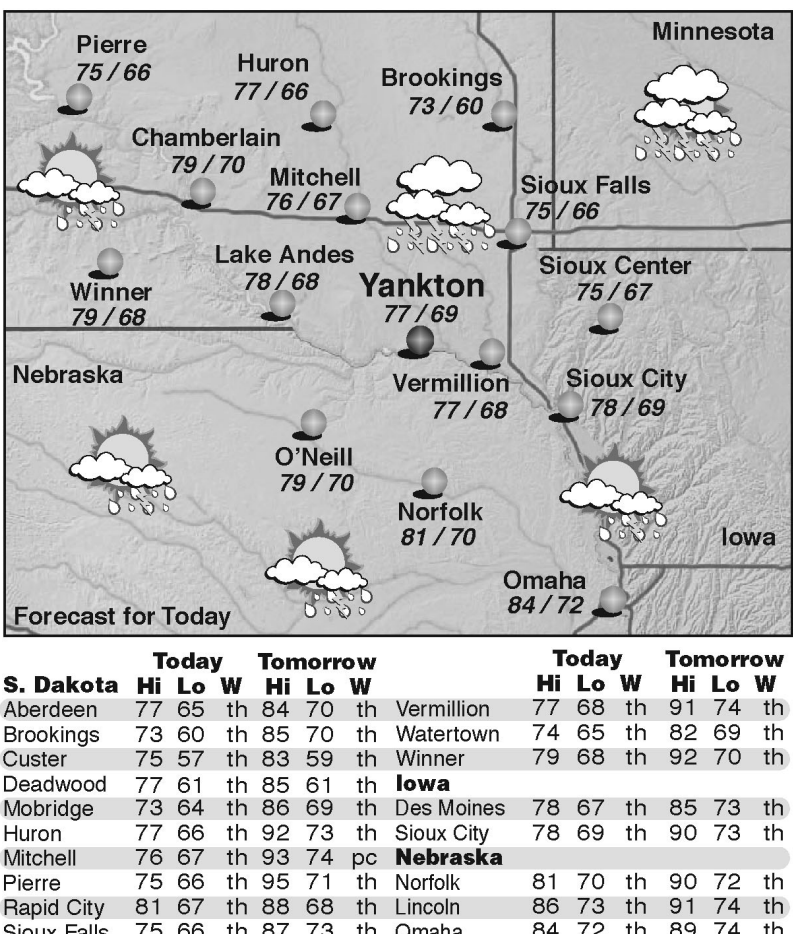

the school districts, the schools will meet with parents and staff from a program like ours and decide if it is appropriate to move into a residential setting, get a place of their own or stay at home, whatever is appropriate."

Because there is support staff on site 24-hours a day and common areas accessible by all residents, the facility has a community feel, while still providing independence.

"It is a nice small apartment setting," Pearson said. "It is small enough to feel like family, but still have your own apartment to get away. Each apartment has closets, a full bathroom, bedroom, living room and small kitchenette. They are very pretty and nice quality. Each person provides their own furnishings. They can have meals with everyone else, which the staff will prepare, but they can also have meals in their apartments by themselves."

Pearson said that without the support of the Yankton community, opportunities such as the apartments would not be successful.

"When you go into area stores, you will see the residents out there working as full members of the community," she said. "That is our goal: to fit into the community. We want everybody to have a circle of friends and a connection with the community. Yankton allows our residents those opportunities."

**Springfield Recreation Area Open To Campers**

SPRINGFIELD — After a short closure caused by Missouri River flooding, state park officials are inviting campers back to Springfield Recreation Area.

"We have a slight detour into the campground and the Springfield Golf Course," said Shane Bertsch, District Park Supervisor. "The flood waters have damaged the main road into the park."

All campsites are available in the north campground, and the boat ramp in the bay can be used to access the river. Bertsch urges boaters to use caution when on the water, as submerged debris can still be a hazard.

Park users should avoid swimming within the park area due to high water and fast-moving currents.

**Monday, July 13, 1936**  
 "Jude" Ballensky is being held in the city jail pending the outcome of injuries received by William Connolly Saturday night in a fight with Ballensky. Apparently, according to the police, the two men had been drinking considerably during the evening and Connolly was knocked down and battered his head on the sidewalk or against a building with disastrous results to Connolly who was taken to the hospital where he was expected to undergo an X-ray examination today. There were indications that his skull had been fractured.  
 •The drought and forest fire scourge which has afflicted eastern Wyoming and southeastern Montana was ended today. Heavy rains, which cooled the area after weeks of crop destroying heat, fell over the two states yesterday and partly cloudy weather was forecast for today. Yankton and vicinity failed to participate in the respite from heat.

**50 YEARS AGO**  
**Thursday, July 13, 1961**  
 •The hot mix plant got too hot at the city street department's shop on lower Douglas avenue Wednesday afternoon, starting a fire which damaged the electric motor and wiring of the equipment. Local firemen battled the blaze with a fog nozzle, putting out the fire with chemical foam.  
 •Two Sturgis men, Bob Lee and R. B. Williams have contracted with the South Dakota Stock Growers Association to compile and publish a history of the association and the cattle industry in the state. The contract calls for a hard back book of some 300 pages, 2,500 copies of which are to be delivered within two years.

CHICAGO (AP) — Grains futures rose Monday on the Chicago Board of Trade.  
 Wheat for September delivery jumped 32.75 cents to \$6.72 a bushel; December corn rose 25.25 cents to \$6.58 a bushel; December oats rose 8.25 cents to \$3.63 a bushel; while November soybeans added 11.25 cent to \$13.5825 a bushel.

Beef and pork futures mostly fell on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange.  
 August live cattle fell 0.68 cent to \$1.1402 a pound; August feeder cattle fell 1.33 cent to \$1.4202 a pound; August lean hogs fell 1.25 cent to 97.92 cents a pound; while August pork bellies were unchanged at \$1.065 a pound.
