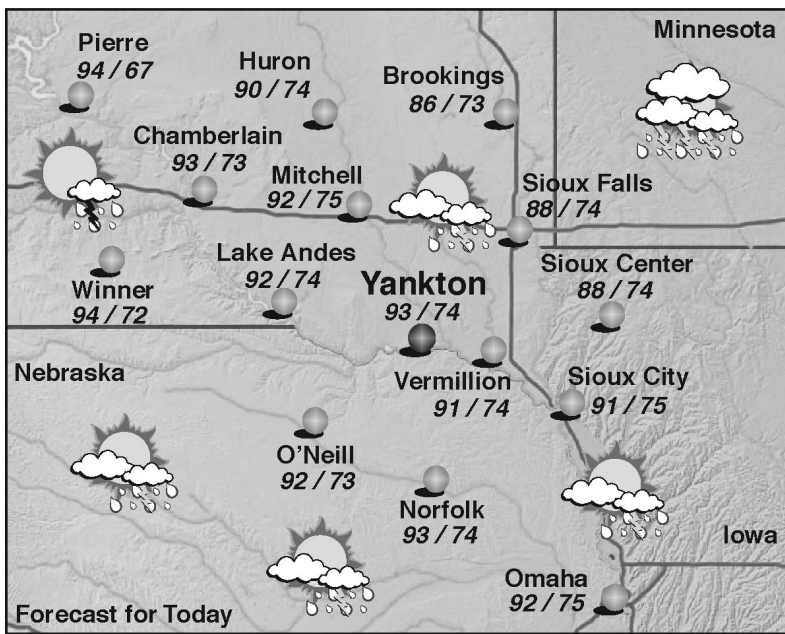

Mold Cleanup Training Offered To Homeowners

PIERRE — The Department of Health is holding free training sessions at three locations across the state to help homeowners prepare for cleaning up homes impacted by flooding. "As flood waters recede, we know there will be questions about mold and other cleanup issues," said Doneen Hollingsworth, Secretary of Health. "These trainings can help homeowners and businesses answer those questions and prepare to safely clean up their properties." The training will be provided by experts from NECHAMA, the Jewish Disaster Relief Organization based in Minneapolis. A national organization, NECHAMA has deployed thousands of volunteers to help clean up after floods, tornados and other natural disasters. In each site two trainings will be held — one for homeowners and business owners and one for city and county officials, volunteer organizations and state agency personnel. Topics include cleaning flooded structures, decontamination, sanitizing, mold and other contaminants, economical remediation, cleanup hazards and re-occupying the home. The site supervisor training includes additional topics related to coordinating a cleanup effort and managing volunteers. The course schedule follows:

Dakota Trailer was established at Yankton in 1968 as Hawkeye Eagle Grain Trailers. In 2005, the company was renamed Dakota Trailer Manufacturing. Since then, the firm has grown from an eight-person operation to a 140-employee company with a global client base.

Burbank Man Who Beat Neighbor's Dog Charged With Felony

VERMILLION — Charges have been filed against the Burbank man who allegedly beat his neighbor's dog to death with a hammer. According to a criminal complaint filed with the First Judicial Circuit in Clay County on Tuesday, Robert Kyte has been charged with Intentional Damage to Property in the First Degree. Because of the value of the dog, the charge is a Class 6 felony, said State's Attorney Teddi Gertsema. Kyte, 61, also has been charged with Killing or Injuring Animal of Another, a Class 1 misdemeanor. Under South Dakota law, Kyte could face up to two years im-

prisonment in the state penitentiary, a fine of \$5,000 or both for the felony, and one year imprisonment in the county jail, a \$2,000 fine or both for the misdemeanor. Kyte allegedly beat the German shorthair pointer — whose name was Shy — to death in its kennel late last month. He is free after posting \$500 bond. According to the Associated Press, Shayne and Kim Ludwig said their dog was gentle and barked only if someone was trespassing on their property. Gertsema said Kyte's initial appearance in the Clay County Courthouse has been set for Tuesday, although she added the hearing may be continued. *The Associated Press contributed to this report.*
