grade, and Chinese Foreign Ministry spokesman Hong Lei said: "We hope that the U.S. government adopts a responsible policy to ensure the interests of the investors."

It was unclear when McConnell and Reid might unveil their legislation, or whether they would first present their ideas to Obama and others involved in the daily meetings at the White House.

McConnell said the plans had not been discussed at Thursday's White House session, which lasted less than 90 minutes.

One option under discussion by the Senate leaders is creation of a group of lawmakers who could recommend spending cuts, possibly including changes in benefit programs, that would be guaranteed a yes-or-no vote in Congress.

Another would be to couple a presidential request for a debt increase with spending cuts, including some that have emerged in private talks led first by Vice President Joe

wherever they may be located.

Weidner-Jordan said the imaging suite was in the development stages for about 1 1/2 years, and its scale grew with time.

"Originally, we were thinking we would only put in CT and X-ray," she said. "Then we were just going to shell out the MRI space, but when we started looking at it and how many MRIs are needed for people who are claustrophobic and who go out of town because there isn't an open magnet in the region, we decided to install that right away, too."

Whereas traditional MRIs require patients to enter a tube, the open MRI has no walls, making it an especially

attractive option for people who are claustrophobic or large in size. The next closest open MRI is in Sioux Falls, according to Lewis and Clark staff.

"What's nice is, we can offer this community not only high detail because it's a high-field MRI, but we can also offer them comfort because the sides are open," said Marla Neukirch, lead technologist at the hospital. "I've been doing MRIs for a long time, and where the challenge always lies is in keeping the patient comfortable so you can get the necessary images. MRI is a modality that is very non-tolerant of motion. You need the patient's cooperation. If you can get that, you get a much better exam so the physicians can see what is going on."

Weidner-Jordan added, "With kids, it's nice, too, because the parents can stand in there. If it was a closed magnet, that wouldn't happen."

Michelle Hlavac, the radiology di-

rector at the hospital, said the hospital recently became accredited by the American College of Radiology for MRI, and is pursuing accreditation for CT and ultrasound. The accreditation ensures that quality and safety standards are upheld at the facility.

Dr. Tom Posch, the hospital's radiologist, said he enjoys working with what he believes are some of Yankton's best medical professionals and offering quality services.

"I think we've been very successful so far, and I see a lot of promise for growth in the future, too," he said. "We get good, positive feedback from our patients, and we get a lot of return customers. Our workload is gradually creeping up because the word is getting out."

Hlavac added, "We're all close as a staff, and I think that makes the patients feel more comfortable. It's kind of a family atmosphere."

programming needs from Nebraska. That information was not received until after the July 2 slaying, even though South Dakota officials had sent a letter and followed up with a telephone call to three people in Nebraska, he said.

"We did have a small breakdown, but it has been fixed and we have received all the information from Nebraska," he said.

Other system improvements include additional notice to law enforcement agencies when high-risk offenders are released and changes in notice procedures when an inmate in a transition program leaves the prison grounds without authorization.

Prison officials also are looking at mental health practices to make sure inmates who are severely mentally ill or have been in prison mental health units get reviews before release. The prison system's check showed McVay received such a review.

During a jailhouse interview with a television station, McVay said he cooked up what he described as a presidential assassination plot while being held alone in the Sioux Falls prison. He said he was angered by Obama's economic policies and was "going to get him on the golf range."

McVay had been serving a five-year sentence with two years suspended for a 2006 grand theft conviction, combined with a concurrent sentence for a 2009 escape attempt. He had served most of his South Dakota escape sentence at a Nebraska prison because that's where he was arrested after stealing a vehicle and leaving a minimum-security unit in Sioux Falls.

The State Penitentiary in Sioux Falls also announced a series of security changes in May following the April 12 killing of a guard during what officials have described as a failed escape attempt by two inmates, who have since been charged with murder.

on McConnell's initial suggestion, Speaker John Boehner told reporters, "What may look like something less than optimal today, if we're unable to get an agreement might look pretty good a few weeks from now."

Carney said if there was no progress toward a bipartisan agreement on cuts by Friday, "then we have to begin looking at making sure that we fulfill our obligations to uphold the credit rating of the United States."

He did not elaborate. Whatever choice was made, it was clear time was running out.

Treasury Secretary Timothy Geithner met privately at the Capitol with Senate Democrats, emerging to say: "We have no way to give Congress more time to solve this problem."

So the alarms covered a broad front: Geithner is a senior official in the Obama administration, Bernanke is the nation's central banker and Dimon the head of one of Wall Street's best-known firms.

Similar warnings have been directed at lawmakers repeatedly since Geithner announced that Aug. 2 was essentially the day of reckoning.

The Treasury has been relying on unusual measures since early May to avoid breaching the current debt ceiling, which stands at \$14.3 trillion.

Congress and the White House have responded to the warnings with a spate of high-profile meetings — but little if any apparent progress toward a solution.

Boehner also took steps during the day to present a common front with House Majority Leader Eric Cantor, his second-in-command, who has seemed at times to take a dominant role in the White House talks.

Reid criticized Cantor in unusually personal remarks on the Senate floor, saying he "has shown he shouldn't be at the table."

"And Republicans agree he shouldn't be at the table," he added, referring to published accounts of other GOP lawmakers criticizing Cantor anonymously.

Cantor brushed aside the criticism, and Boehner came to his defense at a news conference.

"We have been in this fight together," he said, placing his arm around Cantor's shoulder, adding that any report that the Virginian has been "anything less than helpful is just wrong. ... We're in the foxhole."

ivate individuals is focused on activities.

"People need to know, and the school board has stressed this, that if there are individuals or groups that are interested in restoring academic programs, they would be receptive to any group that would want to raise money for a specific cause," she said.

Rhoades also stressed that the foundation is only coordinating the effort and will not be using any of its funds.

"One thing we want people to know is that the foundation is not funding this. There are no foundation dollars funding this specific effort," she said. "We are just taking the money in. We will pass that money on to the school board, and the school board will opt to accept it or not to restore the activities."

Rhoades said the committee is

already approximately half-way to its goal, aided by numerous donations, including a \$20,000 offering from the YHS Booster Club.

"The booster club with its \$20,000 donation is a tremendous start to a very worthwhile project," said Roger Smith, president of the foundation. "We are indebted to them and thank them for it."

Other service organizations and businesses have been contacted as well, but individual donations are also being accepted.

"We are thankful for any amounts anyone is willing to give, whether it be a service group, a business or an individual," Rhoades said.

Rhoades added that she is confident the necessary amount will be raised by the deadline.

"Yankton has demonstrated its

financial generosity with multiple projects in recent years, and we are optimistic that, once again in this time of need, the community will step forward and help with this one-year initiative," she said.
