Presentation On Flooded Trees Slated

BROOKINGS — South Dakota State University specialists will offer information on dealing with flooded shrubs and trees at a meeting in North Sioux City. The event takes place in the Dakota Valley High School auditorium at 1150 Northshore Drive, North Sioux City, from 6:30 p.m. to 7:30 p.m. Wednesday, Aug. 3. Landscape trees and shrubs have been inundated with floodwater from the Missouri river and from rising water tables. SDSU Extension Forestry Specialist John Ball will address the factors that play a role in both the short-term and long-term health of trees in city parks and on private property. The North Sioux City city office, Superintendent Al Leber of the Dakota Valley School District, and the SDSU Cooperative Extension Service are working together to make the event possible. To get there, take Interstate Highway 29 south to Exit 4 (the McCook Lake exit). Turn right (west) and follow the road for approximately one mile. The high school will be on the right (north) side of the road. The auditorium is just inside the main entrance.

from the community and low member fees. "We try to keep our dues for the traditional site very low, \$25 per person or \$50 for families," Erickson said. "The club is basically run on donations and the good will of the community and through special events like (our golf tournament). We're also in the process of our annual 'It Just Takes One' campaign where we go out and look for individuals to donate." According to Director of Operations J.D. O'Grady said he tries to train the staff to motivate the kids with positive reinforcement, rather than using discipline. "We've got almost 600 kids we take care of during the school year. My job is to make sure the staff is trained and make sure they do a good job of taking care of these little people," he said. "My main goal is seeing the kids succeed and being involved in mentoring them and helping them become good citizens." The program during the summer is really important, O'Grady said, as many kids who can't afford to be active often fall behind in school, while those that can afford it continue to grow. To help keep the gap small, the club is introducing a new program. "Our goal is to give the kids every opportunity to succeed that we can, no matter what kind of family they come from," O'Grady said. "We have a project we're trying to do in the summer called 'Project Learn.' A lot of kids step back and regress during the summer and the kids that have the opportunities go to camps, so every time it's one step back and two steps forward." Because the Boys and Girls Club is non-profit, the group calls on the Yankton community to help support it. This weekend, the group held its fourth annual social event and golf tournament. The social event held Friday night at the Elks Lodge included a live and silent auction where members of the community bid on donated items from local businesses that ranged from paintings, signed University of Nebraska-Lincoln memorabilia and free pizza for a year. All the proceeds went back into the club's budget. Saturday, teams hit the course in a four-person, best-ball scramble to play for a new car from Berkeley Motors or \$5,000 in prizes. The golf tournament grew from 22 teams last year to 35 this year, O'Grady said, and they hoped for a crowd of 300 at the auction. To help entice community members to attend, the BGCA of Yankton works with UNL's Department of Athletics to bring in celebrities such as linebacker coach Ross Els and All-American wrestler Andy Johnson. Els and Johnson were auctioned off to play on a team for the golf tournament. "We started with (UNL) a few years ago and they've been great," Erickson said. "They're very kid-oriented as well so they've been really awesome helping us out. We know that where we live in South Dakota we have a huge Husker following." As a Yankton native, Johnson said he feels great being able to come home and help his community. "It's huge — anytime you have the chance to give back you should take advantage of it," he said. "They did so much for me during high school and I've seen other people give back to the community once they graduate. Being able to do it feels really good." Working with kids that don't always have the best opportunities, Johnson said it can be hard to keep them motivated, but they just need to work hard and stay focused.

some were cracking in the corners. It was one of those things were people either loved them or hated them." To that end, those people who have called to reserve season tickets have expressed their support for the changes, according to Brad Simons, Coordinator of Ticket Operations and Sales. "I think people have been pretty pleased hearing that we're getting new ones," Simons said. "The old ones were outdated and pretty ugly, to be honest. These new ones will be much cleaner and more comfortable, and you want people to be comfortable during a three-hour game." The DakotaDome seats 10,000 fans for football and the Coyotes have averaged 7,600 fans per game since coach Ed Meierkort took over in 2004. As part of USD's future plans for the Dome, which was approved by the South Dakota Board of Regents three weeks ago, ongoing renovations will include increasing the seating capacity to 16,000 for football. Donations from the Howling Pack — USD's booster club — members helped offset the costs for the seating project, as did small increases in ticket prices. Season tickets for the 2011 football season are \$90, an increase of \$5 from last fall, but the price includes an additional home game. "We knew we weren't going to cover the costs in one year," Herbster said. "It was going to have to be a three-year period." Another athletic project near-
