Fort Randall At 157,000 CFS

PICKSTOWN — The Corps of Engineers increased the releases Wednesday at Fort Randall Dam to 157,000 cubic feet per second (cfs), up from the former 156,000 cfs.

While the change isn't large, it does reflect the dropping river levels, according to Corps officials.

"Fort Randall continues to fall 2/10 to 3/10 of a foot per day," said Jody Farhat, chief of the Missouri River Basin water management office in Omaha.

The Fort Randall increase was taken to maintain the pool elevation at Gavins Point Dam near Yankton, Farhat said. Gavins Point continues releasing 160,000 cfs with no plans for additional

increases, she said.

"At Fort Randall, the inflow is 144,000 cfs and the outflow (was) 156,000 cfs," she said. "That's the difference we need there, which is causing a drop of 2/10 foot per day."

The other mainstem dams are also seeing gradual lowering of reservoirs, Farhat said.

"If we increase releases, we have to do it throughout the system at the same rate," she said. "We are trying to hold it at 160,000 (cfs) at the bottom and keep all the reservoirs dropping."

The National Weather Service (NWS) forecast calls for a slight chance of thunderstorms from today (Thursday) through Saturday. Temperatures are forecast to drop to 81 degrees today, then rise to the low 90s Friday and Saturday.
