Dockendorf Wins Six National Awards

Press & Dakotan regional editor Randy Dockendorf has won six awards, including two first-place awards, in the 2011 Better Newspaper Contest sponsored by the National Newspaper Association.

He will be recognized at the Sept. 24 awards reception during NNA's 125th annual convention and trade show in Albuquerque, N.M., Sept. 22-25.

Dockendorf won first place for Best Feature Story, Daily Division, circulation less than 16,000, for his story on the Sage brothers of Niobrara, Neb.

The three brothers died together on the USS Frank E. Evans during the Vietnam War. An Australian aircraft carrier, the Melbourne, hit the 376-foot-long destroyer broadside off the coast of Vietnam. The severed bow sank in four minutes.

However, the Sage brothers were denied a place on the Vietnam Wall in Washington, D.C., because the incident occurred outside a combat zone. A national effort is under way to get their names listed on the wall.

The judge commented, "Compelling story. Well written with clarity about the pros and cons of 'the war.' Thought provoking for the reader."

Dockendorf's other first-place award came for Best Performing Arts Story, Daily Division, for his profile of Marty native and world-renowned artist Mato Nanji and his band Indigenous.

The band had recently released its latest CD, "Acoustic Sessions," and was preparing for a European tour. The Press & Dakotan story was written in conjunction with Nanji's performance at Dakota Theatre in Yankton as a benefit for the Marty Indian School's athletic teams.

The judge commented, "Good solid feature 'story.' Feel good. Interested me enough to go online to learn more and hear them."

Dockendorf's other national awards include:

- 2nd place, Best Education/Literacy Story, Daily Division, for the Marty school's recovery and coming together after summer flooding.
- 2nd place, Best Environmental Story, Daily Division, for coverage of historic flood-

ing's swelling of area rivers.

The judge commented, "Nice start to important story for coverage area. Good detail and use of quotes and subjects."

- 3rd place, Best Education/Literacy Story, Daily Division, for local students' food drive for the Pine Ridge reservation.
- "Good lede. Strong prose. Human interest value. Good research," the judge commented.
- 3rd place, Best Performing Arts Story, Daily Division, for the Danish gymnastics team's visit to Viborg.
- "Good, interesting story," the judge commented.

There were 2,044 entries in the Better Newspaper Contest and 397 entries in the Better Newspaper Advertising Contest for a total of 2,439 entries. A total of 631 awards were won by 143 member newspapers in 40 states.

Judging was performed primarily by active community newspaper editors and publishers and included retired university journalism professors and retired or former newspaper men and women.

"Winners reflect the high quality of publications represented by the association," said NNA Contest Chair Jeff Farren, publisher of the Kendall County Record in Yorkville, Ill.
