the summer, we will see an average of about 10 people on a tour through the dam, this summer, we are taking an average of 20 per tour. We had more than 12,000 visitors to the Visitor's Center in the month of June."

In June 2010, there were 4,755 guests at the Visitor Center compared to 12,400 this June. There were 67 dam tours with a total of 682 people in June 2010. This year there were 84 tours and 1,688 people.

"The increase is such that we have had to bring in extra help, because the numbers have been so high," Zeutenhorst said. "We depend on our seasonal help and our volunteers. Without them, we would not be able to accomplish everything we do."

Zeutenhorst also said that the partnership with the Missouri

National Recreational River staff, unique to the Yankton area, is one that allows more opportunities for guests, as well.

"The seasonal help we hire each year falls into three categories: interpretive rangers, or our educational team that lead the tours, work in the Visitors Center and answer questions; patrol rangers, who help make sure the regulations are followed; and natural resource rangers, who are doing research on the area," she said. "But overseeing the rangers is just a part of my job. I have facility issues that I am responsible for, as well. It is surprising how much there is to deal with just with that alone."

Having been with the Corps for 22 years, Zeutenhorst says she is fortunate to have a very rewarding job.

"I have been so blessed to find a job like this where I enjoy coming to work and love what I do," she said.

While she admits that there have been more Corps related

questions and that it has been busy this summer because of the flooding, she also says that the flooding has greatly increased the interest in Gavins Point Dam.

"It used to be we would see visitors from primarily the three-state region of Iowa, Nebraska and South Dakota," she said. "But we are seeing people from everywhere this year. People who may be traveling to the Black Hills are detouring and coming to see the waters come through the dam. We have had visitors from all across the country this year."

She said the fact that there have been more than 60,000 views of the dam on the *Press and Dakotan's* live link tells her just how interested people across the country are in seeing the flooding.

She also says that she is glad people have been obeying the safety notices the Corps have released.

"I served on the safety-and-rescue team for several years," she said. "You only have to see a

body pulled out of the water, while the family stands there watching, once to know how deadly water can be and that it is worth your time to put on a life jacket."

As the summer goes on, Zeutenhorst says she knows the rushing waters will continue to be a big draw, and it will also continue to give her the opportunity to visit with guests about the river and system she so enjoys.

"It is just amazing what the power of water can do, and people are interested in it, which leads to great questions," she said. "I always tell my rangers to give the best answer you can, and if you don't know, find it out, and get back to the person who asked. I would want to be treated that way if it were me."

The Lewis and Clark Visitor Center is open 8 a.m.-6 p.m. Sunday-Thursday and 8 a.m.-7 p.m. Friday-Saturday. Tours of Gavins Point Dam are available 10 a.m.-6 p.m. Friday, Saturday, Sunday and holidays.

about her involvement in the rescue.

"I just wanted to help," she said.

Now, Humpal is hoping that Paws To Love can find individuals willing to adopt the dogs.

"They are timid," she said. "They weren't raised in a house, so they're afraid of loud noises like a vacuum or pots and pans. But they do overcome that in time. They're really good dogs."

The animals even wait to be taken outside before going to the bathroom, according to Humpal. That's considered rare for dogs raised by a commercial dog breeder.

So far, more than \$1,000 in veterinarian bills have accumulated, despite the health professionals donating time to the effort.

In fact, Dr. Janet Messner was unexpectedly at the pound when the dogs arrived to provide emergency care, if needed, Humpal said.

"It's been so overwhelming that I've actually cried when I think about all the support we're getting from veterinarians,

groomers, businesses and individuals," Humpal stated. "We're very grateful."

Soft food is needed for the dogs because many of them have had to have teeth pulled.

"The dogs mainly have teeth problems," Humpal said. "It's because family dogs get chew toys, munchies and stuff like that to help their teeth. In commercial kennels, they just feed their dogs."

Muffin, an approximately 2-year-old Yorkie who was with Humpal Thursday and has already been adopted, had to have all but three or four of her teeth pulled.

For those interested in learn-

ing more about the dogs, a meet-and-greet will take place at a pet wash taking place at Yankton's Tractor Supply Company (TSC) from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Aug. 6.

"People can show up, see the dogs and ask questions," Humpal said. "We hope to start adopting the dogs out in seven to 10 days, as soon as their stitches are healed."

Donations are being accepted at the Animal Health Clinic in Yankton, as well as the Canine Grooming Center.

Capitol Rotunda as they contemplated one of the most consequential votes of their careers.

Asked if he was seeking divine inspiration, Rep. Tim Scott, R-S.C., said that had already happened. "I was leaning no and now I am a no."

Many more congregated in the office of the chief GOP vote counter, California Rep. Kevin

McCarthy, perhaps drawn to the 19 boxes of pizza that were rolled in. Boehner joined them but did not speak to reporters.

"Clock ticks towards August 2, House is naming post offices, while leaders twist arms for a pointless vote. No wonder people hate Washington," White House Communications Director Dan Pfeiffer tweeted.

Earlier, Boehner had exuded optimism.

"Let's pass this bill and end the crisis," said the president's principal Republican antagonist in a new and contentious era of divided government. "It raises

the debt limit and cuts government spending by a larger amount."

President Barack Obama has threatened to veto the measure, and in debate on the House floor, Rep. Debbie Wasserman Schultz of Florida savaged it as a "Republican plan for default." She said the GOP hoped to "hold our economy hostage while forcing an ideological agenda" on the country.

Despite the sharp rhetoric, there were signs that gridlock might be giving way.

"Around here you've got to have deadlock before you have

breakthrough," said Sen. Kent Conrad, D-N.D. "We're at that stage now."

Wall Street suffered fresh losses as Congress struggled to break its long gridlock. The Dow Jones industrial average was down for a fifth straight session.

The Treasury Department moved ahead with plans to hold its regular weekly auction of three-month and six-month securities on Monday. Yet officials offered no information on what steps would be taken if Congress failed to raise the nation's \$14.3 trillion debt limit by the following day.
