State Fair Beef Cook-Off Registrations Sought

HURON — South Dakota is known for its good cooks and great beef — and the 2011 South Dakota State Fair Beef Cook-Off is the opportunity to put a spotlight on the state's accomplished home cooks and great-tasting, nutritious beef in a friendly, fun annual event.

If you're one of the state's good amateur cooks armed with a great beef recipe that features one of beef's 29 lean cuts, it's time to enter the State Fair Beef Cook-Off, says Karla Pazour, event chairperson. "We'd love anyone who enjoys cooking to participate," says Pazour. "The State Fair is a true South Dakota affair, with competition in everything from horticulture to livestock breeds. The Beef Cook-Off is one more friendly competition featuring grills, skillets and beef."

Entries and recipes for the State Fair Beef Cook-Off, which is held Sept. 3 at the South Dakota State Fair in Huron, are due Aug. 1. The contest is open to non-professional South Dakota residents in either the youth division (10-18 years) or adult division (19 and older). Beef recipes submitted must feature a main meal entrée appropriate for entertaining or special occasion meals. Judging is based on taste, appearance, originality, nutrition and ease of preparation. The winner of the youth division will receive a \$250 cash prize, while the adult division winner will take home \$500 in cash. There are also honorable mentions.

Individuals selected to compete will actually prepare their beef entrée in a public area during the Beef Cook-Off, allowing participants to interact with state fair attendees. Judges are kept in a secluded location and recipes are judged completely on the finished product, not on cooking procedures.

Hosted by the South Dakota Cattle Women and funded by the South Dakota Beef Industry Council through the Beef Checkoff, the State Fair Beef Cook-Off is an excellent way, says Pazour, to educate consumers on the 29 lean cuts of beef along with beef's versatility, ease of preparation and excellent taste.

'Rules' Provides An Opportunity For Discussing School Fears

"Ten Rules You Absolutely Must Not Break if You Want to Survive the School Bus," by John Grandits, illustrated by Michael Allen Austin, Clarion Books, 2011. 32 pages.

Rules, rules, rules. Everywhere you turn you find rules, especially in school. Don't run in the hallways. Don't blurt out the answer. Keep your voice down in the cafeteria.

Kyle's biggest worry is riding the school bus for the first time ever. To top it off he has to do it by himself. His older brother, James, has given him 10 rules to follow if he wants to survive riding the school bus. Kyle is petrified.

The mean barking dog in the yard at the bus stop is not a good sign. Kyle shakily climbs aboard the bus. Oh no! The only empty seat is in the front row! And Rule #1 is: Never sit in the first row. So Kyle keeps on walking. Every single seat is filled; as Kyle walks, every eye is on him.

He trudges to the next empty seat—in the last row. Rule #2: Never sit in the last row. Well, Kyle has no choice but to break Rule #2.



But then he makes the mistake of looking up at his huge seatmate. Uh oh! Rule #4: Never make eye contact. Kyle knows he's in trouble now and he's right. The big kid next to him isn't happy to be sitting next to a little kid and is ready to throw his weight around.

As the bus lumbers on its way to school, Kyle keeps breaking rule after rule. Somehow he makes it to school in one piece. But then there's the ride home after school. Guess where the only open seat is? In the first row this time (another rule breaker), right next to the big kid again. Will Kyle make it home unpulverized?

You'll cringe as you watch Kyle struggle through his first day on the bus, but then you'll enjoy seeing him make it through, his own way.

This is a reassuring book for those who are afraid of changing schools or teachers or yes, even riding the bus. It provides a good opportunity for parents to talk with their children about things that might be scaring them and reassure them that new things at school will work out fine, even if the child doesn't do everything perfectly. The illustrations do a great job of conveying the bus and school world as it seems to Kyle.

Who says only kids can read picture books? If you're an adult, break a rule and read this book. If you're a kid, follow your parent's rule and read a book this summer!
