Wednesday, July 4: 6:30 to 8:30 pm, Riverside Park playground, Yankton — Junior Ranger Tent. Kids can enjoy fun activities, learn about our national park, and earn their Junior Ranger badge and certificate.
Friday, July 6: 7 p.m., Midway Amphitheater, Lewis & Clark State Recreation Area — "Life on the Missouri." It's 1877, and the purser of the steamboat Far West talks about life on riverboats, Captain Grant Marsh, and the 1876

Army charter to the Little Bighorn. A first-person living history presentation.
Saturday, July 7: 4 p.m. Niobrara State Park, Nebraska, RV Campground — "Tokens of Friendship?" For Junior Rangers. A National Park Ranger reveals their mixed meanings while you make your own decorated peace medal.

National Park Service Bridge Walks July 2-5

Rangers at Missouri National Recreational River will conduct walks to the historic Meridian Bridge and present short talks on a variety of subjects. The walks will begin at the Territorial Capitol replica in Yankton's Riverside Park at 11:30 a.m., 12:30 p.m. and 3 p.m. Upon reaching the bridge, the talks will last no more than 15 minutes, after which visitors may continue across the bridge, return to downtown Yankton, or chat with the ranger on the way back to the capitol. Rangers will be at the capitol replica from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. most weekdays to answer questions about the river and provide information to visitors and the community.
This week's programs are as follows:
Monday, July 2 — "What is Progress?" Discover how as the river changed and Yankton grew, our definition of progress changed and matured as well.
Tuesday, July 3 — "Simple Schemes to Sink a Steamboat" The treacherous river and human errors sank hundreds of steamboats on the wild Missouri.
Wednesday, July 4 — Instead of scheduled walks, rangers will set up a tent from 6:30-8:30 p.m. with activities allowing kids to earn their Junior Ranger badge. Other rangers will be roving Riverside Park to answer questions about the river and its history.
Thursday, July 5 — "Crossing the Mighty Mo" The wild Missouri was both a means of travel and an obstacle to it. Learn how fickle fortune and the river itself stood in the way of bridge building.

Company Offers Tips On Staying Cool

DES MOINES, Iowa — With significant heat and humidity in the forecast this week, MidAmerican Energy Company reminds its customers to avoid heat-related illnesses by staying cool. The following tips will help customers beat the heat while reducing their energy use this summer:
1. Set it smart: Keep the thermostat set at 78 degrees or higher in the summer to save some green. Customers also can save with a programmable thermostat that automatically adjusts the temperature when people are asleep or away.
2. Seal it up: Use weather stripping and caulk to seal air leaks and

block drafts in the basement and attic and around doors, windows, chimneys, electrical outlets and other potential areas for air leakage.
3. Block the sun: On hot, sunny days, close drapes, blinds or shades, particularly those on south and west windows to help cool your home.
4. Keep it clear: Make sure air registers and radiators aren't blocked by furniture, rugs, drapes or other objects. In addition, be sure to dust or vacuum registers or radiators on a regular basis.
5. Dry it out: Use bath and kitchen vents to exhaust heat and moisture, but run them just long

enough to rid the house of unwanted water vapor and odors.
6. Wait it out: Schedule any heat-generating activities, such as oven cleaning, baking, dishwashing, clothes drying and ironing, for the early morning or late evening hours.
7. Keep it up: Check air filters monthly, and clean or replace them as necessary. Wash outside air conditioning coils with mild soap and water to remove dust and dirt.
During periods of high heat and humidity, it's also a good idea to periodically check on neighbors or relatives who may not have air conditioning.

Yankton Man: New Law Forces Him To Close Smoke Shop

A Yankton man's dream of owning a roll-your-own cigarette shop has gone up in smoke.
John Muilenburg is closing his doors after less than nine months because of a new state law that classifies the business as a cigarette manufacturer and taxes customers more than \$15 per box.
Mullies Cigarette Shop has a machine that allows customers to roll loose-leaf tobacco into cigarettes. The cost had been about half that of retail stores.
Muilenburg says the change makes the cost of retail cigarettes about the same as roll-your-own smokes, or about \$47 a carton.
Muilenburg tells KELO-TV he still owes money on the \$35,000 roll-your-own machine. He says he's devastated that state lawmakers "just took our livelihood away."
