



Store Employee Avoids Serious Injury After Acid Incident

An employee at Yankton's Wal-Mart Supercenter was treated Sunday after coming into contact with a corrosive acid placed in a trash can.

Yankton Deputy Fire Chief Larry Nickles said the employee came into contact with muriatic acid early Sunday afternoon as he was emptying a trash can.

Dianna Gee, a spokesperson for Wal-Mart, said the employee was treated on site and did not require any further medical attention. He chose to keep working after the incident, she added.

"We appreciate the quick response from emergency responders," Gee said. "We're glad our associate is OK."

Muriatic acid is manufactured by absorbing hydrogen chloride in water. Its uses include cleaning

brick, etching concrete, cleaning metal and swimming pool maintenance.

The remaining acid from the incident was given to the city water department for use, Nickles stated.

"It could have been a bad deal (for the employee)," he said. "It could have gotten in his eyes or caused serious injury."

Nickles said an investigation is under way to determine who placed the hazardous material in the garbage can. If the culprit is found, he or she may be charged with illegal dumping or another appropriate charge, he added.

Gee said Wal-Mart will cooperate with any investigation into the matter.

"KHAQQ--SOS," each repeated three times, were heard by Walter McMenamy and Carl Pierson over their powerful receiver. The call letters were repeated three more times.
