July 2 is the only day this month in which Yankton's record temperature reading is not in triple digits.

However, the bar for record readings runs high this time of the year. While today's (Tuesday) record is 100 degrees, set in 1990, the record on Thursday, July 5, is 113 degrees set in 1936.

Officer Hurt In Weekend Incident

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TYNDALL — Authorities are sorting out the details of a weekend incident resulting in the arrest of a Sioux Falls man and a broken arm for the Scotland police chief.

Dillon D. Fischer, 22, faces misdemeanor charges of simple assault and resisting arrest arising from an incident in Scotland, according to Bon Homme County State's Attorney Lisa Rothschadl.

Each count carries a maximum penalty of one year in the county jail and a \$2,000 fine,

Scotland police chief Steve Knakmuhs answered last weekend's call that resulted in Fischer's arrest. The police chief's arm was broken in the course of his response to the incident.

Initial media reports said Knakmuhs broke his arm during a fall while responding to last weekend's call. But at this point, Rothschadl said she hadn't determined the situation that

"I just don't know the answer to that question," she said late Monday afternoon.

Knakmuhs is recovering at home from his injuries, according to Bon Homme County Game Warden Todd Crownover.

I talked to Steve, and he expects he will be out for five to six weeks," Crownover said. In the meantime, Scotland won't go without

public safety, Crownover said. "We are having other law enforcement officers in the area taking over for Steve while he recovers," Crownover said. "I'll be one of them taking on some extra time."

Brian Humphrey, game warden for Hutchinson and Turner counties, also plans to assist with coverage during Knakmuhs' absence, Crownover said.

Fischer remains free on bond and is scheduled for an Aug. 10 court appearance at the Bon Homme County courthouse in Tyndall, according to the Bon Homme County Clerk of

Courts' office. Fischer will appear before Magistrate Judge Tami Bern on the two charges. The clerk had received an affidavit for probable cause for arrest and anticipated receiving more paper-

Rothschadl and law enforcement authorities are collecting more information on the incident. The findings will help the state's attorney determine what additional charges, if any, she will file in the case.

Rothschadl said the available details remain sketchy. She hopes to have more information as further interviews are conducted surrounding the incident.

Pitbull Captured After Attacking Two Dogs

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A pitbull is being held in custody by the Yankton Police Department after being involved in two recent attacks on dogs that left the canine victims in need of medical care.

The brindle-colored pitbull is being observed for 10 days for signs of rabies.

At the conclusion of the observation period, Lisa Brasel, the city's animal control officer, said the dog will be euthanized.

"These were pretty bad cases," she said. "There could have been people hurt, too.'

A report was received at 7:24 a.m. Wednesday of two pitbulls attacking the caller's Golden Retriever in the 1000 block of Walnut Street. The dog had to undergo surgery due to the wounds it suffered, according to Brasel.

At 6 p.m. Saturday, a report

was received that a dog involved in the earlier attack was running

loose in the 1000 block of Walnut

A report that a pitbull had attacked a Cocker Spaniel in the 2300 block of Walnut Street was received at 6:16 p.m. The victim had a large gash on the side of its neck that required a visit to the veterinarian.

The pitbull in custody was identified by witnesses in both cases as the culprit.

"People said that, when they began hitting (the pitbull), it would make him attack worse," Brasel said. "Luckily, those dogs weren't alone or they would be dead, I'm sure. Both dogs that were attacked are beloved pets."

Police captured the pitbull after it jumped into a van believed to belong to its owner.

Brasel said an investigation is under way to determine for sure who owns the dog.

using a wig and other stuff to hide his appearance," Betzen said. "What he was doing was cashing out lottery tickets, getting small wins, and then taking them and forging them into larger wins and then bringing them back a few hours later."

The Vermillion business reported the individual's suspicious behavior last Wednesday. "He was wearing a white wig, and had won 5 cents, but didn't cash it out, and had left," the chief said. "The Vermillion Police Department along with some DCI agents staked out the business and about three hours later, the guy came back with a \$50 winning ticket which was clearly forged."

The man was arrested, and Betzen said the DCI is continuing its investigation.

"There are a variety of victims throughout southeast South Dakota," he said, "We did serve search warrants, and we found a bunch of stuff that indicates he had been perpetrating this type of scheme a lot, and they (the DCI) are putting together a case against him."

Betzen had no detailed information about the individual available - such as his name, address and age — when contacted late Monday afternoon. The chief said he is apparently from Iowa. "He is not from Vermillion," he said. "Our detectives worked closely with the DCI, and the DCI took over the case.'

The man had been in the Clay County Jail in Vermillion as of Friday. Betzen was not certain, when contacted late Monday afternoon, if he was still in the county jail or if he had posted

bond and had been released. A pair of Yankton businesses

reported Monday, June 20, that they had given money to a male suspect and later discovered the "winning" video lottery ticket was, in fact, a fake. Betzen said it is likely that the

man arrested in Vermillion is also responsible for the Yankton

"It very well may be the same individual," he said, adding that
