"These people left and didn't call it in," Nickles said. "It would have been considered an accident, but since they fled the scene and didn't report it, we'll be looking at criminal charges and resti-

tution for the fire department." Earlier in the evening, farm equipment sparked a brush fire just west of State Lake.

The Yankton Fire Department was called around 6 p.m. to an area west of the lake, also known as Beaver Lake, along 302nd

"It was running pretty fast through the hills," Nickles said. The Lesterville Fire Depart-

ment was also called to assist in

Nickles estimated the fire burned 40-50 acres. A windrower is believed to have struck a rock and sparked the fire.

Firefighters had the blaze under control within about an

At approximately 11 p.m. Tuesday, the Lesterville Fire Department received a call from a residence a half-mile west of the community.

"People were shooting fireworks, and one of their canisters tipped over and shot the fireworks into the grass," said Lesterville firefighter Paul Scherschligt.

Some small patches of fire were put out by the property owners, but he stated that the wind fanned a blaze in the ditch along the county road to the point that the fire department had to be

Firefighters were on scene for about 15 minutes for the small grass fire, Scherschligt said.

On Wednesday, the Yankton Fire Department received a call around 3:30 p.m. of a fire approximately nine miles west of

That was caused by a burn pile from two months ago," Nickles said. "The fire had been smoldering under the dirt and finally sparked out because of the wind and caught the grass on fire."

He said damage was done to some fence posts and hay.

Firefighters were on scene about two hours.

As of Wednesday afternoon, Nickles said the Yankton area is still listed as being in a moderate fire danger zone. He believes it is quickly approaching a high fire danger rating and encourages residents to be careful.

## AP Survey: Next President Faces High Unemployment

WASHINGTON — A majority of economists in the latest Associated Press Economy Survey expect the national unemployment rate to stay above 6 percent — the upper bounds of what's considered healthy —

for at least four more years. If the economists are correct, the job market will still be unhealthy seven years after the Great Řecession officially ended in June 2009. That would be the longest stretch of high unemployment since the end of World

And it means the job market and the economy — President Barack Obama's main political threats — would remain big challenges in either a second Obama term or President Mitt Romney's first term.

The election isn't going to be a miracle cure for the unemployment rate — that's for sure," says Sean Snaith, an economics professor at the University of Central Florida. He thinks unemployment, which is 8.2 percent now, won't drop back to 6 percent until after 2016.

Economists consider a "normal" level to be between 5 percent and 6 percent.

The economists surveyed by the AP foresee an unemployment rate of 8 percent on Election Day. That would be the highest rate any postwar president running for re-election has faced.

The survey results come before the government reports Friday on hiring during June. Fears about the economy escalated after U.S. employers added just 69,000 jobs in May, the fewest in a year and the third straight month of weak job growth.

The AP survey collected the views late last month from 32 private, corporate and academic economists on a range of issues. Among their views:

— The economy will continue to grow only slowly. The average forecast for the April-June period is that GDP grew at an annual rate of 2 percent. That's down from a 2.4 percent forecast in April. The economists think the rate in the final

six months of the year will be just 2.3 percent. That's too weak to bring the unemployment rate

— Monthly job gains will average 139,000 the rest of this year — barely enough to keep up with population growth and prevent unemployment from worsening. In their forecast in April, the economists predicted average monthly job gains of 189,000.

— The one step Europe could take that would boost confidence in its financial system quickly would be a bailout program like the Troubled Asset Relief Program, or TARP, that Congress approved in 2008 to rescue U.S. banks after the financial crisis hit.

— The biggest threat to the U.S. economy is the tax increases and spending cuts that will take effect Jan. 1 unless Congress reaches an agreement. Many economists and the International Monetary Fund have warned that these measures would push the economy off a "fiscal cliff" and back into recession.


