EPJ's Branson To Play At MMC

A bad turn of luck helped Mount Marty College find one of the top small-school blockers in South Dakota.

Elk Point-Jefferson standout Lexie Branson, who helped the Huskies to three straight state Class A Volleyball Tournament appearances and set state-tournament record with a 1.83 block per game average, will attend MMC and play volleyball for the Lancers, the institution announced on Tues-

Branson had been the "other" middle during her sophomore and junior seasons, as teammate Kelly Reed racked up the attention. When Reed graduated and headed for NCAA Division III Concordia-Moorhead (Minn.), Branson stepped into the spotlight, recording 394 kills and 88 blocks to lead the Huskies to another state tournament appearance.

But because Branson didn't step to the forefront until her senior year, she was overlooked by college coaches, including Mount Marty's Candice Climer.

"I wanted to stay close, and (the offers I got) weren't good offers, and they didn't have good nursing programs," Branson said. "I was accepted to USD (the University of South Dakota). Accepted, registered and ready to go. EPJ head volleyball coach Traci Bennett-Kollbaum, though, knew the 5-10 middle could play at that level. "She was telling me about the fact that she was going to be short a middle, and was asking me if I knew of any," Kollbaum said. "I told her that I had an awesome one, but you'd need to talk her into playing. After watching some film of Branson in action, Climer invited her up to MMC to check out the school and play some with a few of the Lancer players who stayed around Yankton for the sum-

NL Rocks Verlander On Way To All-Star Victory

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) — Pablo Sandoval and Melky Cabrera keyed a five-run blitz against Justin Verlander in the first inning Tuesday night, and the National League romped to an 8-0 win over the American League and its third straight All-Star game victory.

Giants teammate Matt Cain started a strong NL pitching performance, combining with 10 relievers on a six-hitter that extended the American League's scoreless streak to 14 innings — its longest since 1995-97.

Sandoval hit the first bases-loaded triple in an All-Star game, and Ryan Braun and Dan Uggla also drove in runs against Verlander, who couldn't control his 100 mph heat.

Cabrera singled and scored the first

run, then hit a two-run homer against Matt Harrison in the fourth as the NL rolled to the third-largest margin of vic-

tory in All-Star history. The start couldn't have tasted much better for the National League, which was trying to earn home-field advantage in the World Series for the third straight year.

The reward sure came in handy last season, when the Cardinals rallied to win the final two games against the Texas Rangers at Busch Stadium to capture their 11th championship. The team with home-field advantage has won three straight World Series, and six of the last nine.

Tony La Russa certainly enjoyed watching his guys circle the bases

Tuesday night.

The former Cardinals manager retired after last year's World Series, but was asked to call the shots for the NL team one more time. He had vowed all week to manage the game to win.

Verlander was coming off two complete games in his last three starts, and had only allowed seven runs in the first inning all season. But the reigning AL MVP and Cy Young Award winner ran into trouble almost from the start, giving up a one-out single to Cabrera and Braun's RBI double.

The Detroit Tigers' ace recovered to strike out Joey Votto, but walked Carlos Beltran and Buster Posey — the latter on four pitches. Sandoval came to the plate with the bases loaded and ham-

mered a curve off the right-field wall, driving in three runs with his first triple of 2012.

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Dan Uggla followed with an RBI single to deep shortstop to give the NL a 5-0 lead.

Verlander was replaced by Joe Nathan in the second inning, an embarrassing way to leave his fifth All-Star game. Verlander had allowed five earned runs in a start only once all season, and hadn't given up five runs in any inning since April 11, 2010, against the Indians.

"Obviously you don't want to go out like that," Verlander said. "That's why I don't try to throw 100 (mph) in the first inning, but this is for the fans. It usually doesn't work out too well for me."

Baseball | SCL Notebook **Roach Finds Success In Final Year**

48-Year-Old Avon Pitcher Hopes To End His Career With State Tourney Berth

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AVON — Nearly twice the age of many of the hitters he faces, Bill Roach is still finding ways to get people out.

At age 48, almost 49, the right-handed throw-ing pitcher for the Avon Bards wouldn't, on first glance, strike fear into any hitter — no matter

with aluminum bats or wood bats. His final season in the South Central League, let alone amateur baseball all together, is proving to be quite possibly Roach's best, however. "I really think people take Bill for granted,"

Dan Bures, Avon's veteran catcher, said this week. "You could probably just ask people in Scotland. I'm sure they'd be amazed that he's 48 years old."

Roach threw a complete game seven-hitter, striking out seven in a 9-0 victory at Scotland on June 21 — his only victory of the season. Roach also combined with Nate Harrington in a previous

two-hitter back in May. "For me personally, I've hit two homers off him in my career, I think, and I would have never guessed he was that old," Bures added. Prior to his start Tuesday night in Freeman,

Roach had appeared in six games for Avon and had a record of 1-1 with a 4.01 earned run average. He had struck out 13 batters in 24 2/3 innings.

Far from eye-opening, though considering he still throws harder than most people his age, Roach deflects credit to his teammates.

'I've been doing what I normally do, but the guys behind me are really helping me out," he said last week before a home game against Irene. "There's nothing like getting a little run support. "I haven't had a lot of that before."

The same goes for success. With his sixth amateur team since he turned 30 years old, Roach finally has a legitimate chance to play in an event missing from his resume — the state tournament.

Coming into Tuesday night, Avon had an over-all record of 10-7 this season, tied for fourth place (9-6) in the South Central League.

Five teams from the league earn a bid to the Class B State Tournament in Mitchell next month, and discounting first-place Yankton (which is Class A), Avon would be in solid shape for an appearance — naturally, something that drew Roach to Avon this summer. "He tells me that there's a different feel to this team," Bures said. "In the past, the teams he played on were almost playing games just to keep the team going, not necessarily to win. This year, we really started with plans to make the state tournament. We looked at the league and thought, 'Hey, this could be the year.'
