'Pipe Dreams' Film To Be Shown In Vermillion

VERMILLION — The film "Pipe Dreams" will be shown at the University of South Dakota's W.H. Over Museum, Vermillion, on Tuesday, July 17. Showtime is 7 p.m.

The film documents the path of the proposed Keystone XL Pipeline through interviews with the people who would be most affected by its construction. The pipeline would carry a thick, sticky form of crude oil known as oil sands from Alberta, Canada, through the Midwest to refineries in the Gulf Coast of Texas. Trans-Canada tried to force ranchers to sign easements more or less blind and threatened them with eminent domain suits. It was one of eight films shortlisted for the Academy Award for best documentary.

The Book Shelf Scar' Is A Wonderful Book

"The Scar," by Charlotte Moundlic, illustrated by Olivier Tallec, Candlewick Press, 2011. 32 pages.

Few things scare us as much as death does. Perhaps even more frightening than the possibility of our own death is the death of someone we love. As adults we struggle when we lose someone close to us. It's almost impossible to fathom how a young child can handle the death of someone special.

In "The Scar," a young boy, about 6 years old, awakens to learn his mother died during the night. She's been sick and she, her son, and his dad all knew she was going to die. The boy remembers how he got angry with her when she tried to talk to him about her death. He yelled at her and told she should never have had kids if she wasn't going to stick around to see them grow up. He even yelled "Good riddance!" when his dad told him she'd died.

Now the boy doesn't know what to do. He tells his dad he'll take care of him, but he doesn't know how to take care of a dad who's





been crying. He doesn't like seeing his dad cry. Worst of all, the boy is afraid he'll forget his mom. If he keeps the windows closed in the house maybe he can keep her smell forever.

When he falls and scrapes his knee he hears his mom's voice soothing him, just as she did so many times when he was younger and hurt himself. After his knee scabs over he picks the scab off so it hurts and bleeds again — so he can feel his mom again.

What he really needs is a way to hold onto her and remember her. When his mom's mom comes to visit, he lets his concerns pour out of him. Then he listens, since she's older and is a mom herself.

This book is heartbreaking and beautiful at the same time. We feel the boy's pain but also his concern for his dad and grandma. His last words to his mom were angry words, which he has to live with now.

The illustrations are very sparse, but convey great emotion.

This is a picture book for ages 5 and up, but would bring tears and laughter even to an adult. We never learn the boy's name, but I think that is because he could be any one of us. I highly recommend this book for any child and any adult who has lost someone they love. You'll probably read it over and over.

"Tourism has always played a major role in South Dakota's history," notes Chelle Somsen, state archivist at the Cultural Heritage Center in Pierre. "This collection represents one man's journey through South Dakota, with photos of the state's tourist destinations, in the mid-1930s.

Images from the photo album start in Sioux City, Iowa, travel through South Dakota, and continue to Wyoming, the Bighorn Mountains and Yellowstone National Park.

Some of the destinations Karlen photographed in South Dakota include:

- the University of South Dakota,

"A small number of the State Archives' manuscript collections originate from out-of-state sources," Somsen adds. "They are either created by non-South Dakotans or are collected by family members whose relatives once lived in the state.
