## Tabor Receives Loan And Grant

TABOR — Rural Development South Dakota State Director Elsie M. Meeks visited Tabor Thursday, July 12, to recognize B-Y Water District for being selected to receive a Water and Waste Disposal loan and grant.

The loan of \$4,037,000 and a grant of \$299,000 will be used to expand and improve the service to users in Douglas County which will include the addition of a pump station, 4-inch and 6-inch PVC pipe and modifications to an existing pump station and the Yankton Segment Phase I consisting of placing 24-inch, 20-inch and 16-inch pipe along Highway 50 for approximately 8 miles.

This line will then be utilized as a main trunk line from which additional future lines can be built to provide additional flow to current and new users.

"Investing in our rural communities is a good investment," said Meeks. "Strong and sustainable rural communities are built when infrastructure is maintained. Providing clean water and safe treatment of wastewater to users will serve the community well into the future."

B-Y is an existing rural water system formulated in the mid 1970s as a water user district organized under the laws of South Dakota. There are presently 4,604 existing users being served by B-Y Water District, plus some bulk users and the Government for the Parks and Recreation camping areas. Federal funding will be leveraged with an applicant contribution of \$250,000 and other contributions of \$34,900 for a total project cost of \$4,160,900. The Douglas county project is the continuation of a project that was originally started in 2006. Twenty-two users will be added with the Douglas County Line project. When complete, the project will relieve stress on the distribution system while providing for future growth. The Yankton Segment Phase I project is the first phase of a multi-phase plan which will provide a transmission capacity increase to accommodate growth to the year 2035 in the Yankton area.

"We appreciate the assistance and effort put forth by Rural Development," said Terry Wootton, Manager of B-Y Water District. He continued, "Making improvements and growing the system can always be a challenge especially when it comes to the financing aspect. This type of help enables us to make these changes and improvements while keeping the impact to our users to a minimum."

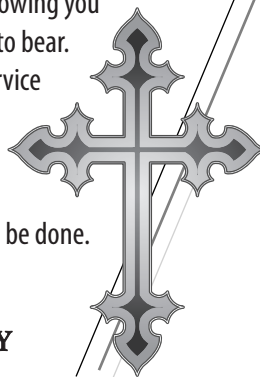

Whether it's on ways to maximize profits on the farm or ranch or how to combat childhood obesity, Extension staff tirelessly work to provide research-based information through a variety of venues including public workshops, iGrow.org, AnswerLine and at the 2012 Dakotafest Aug. 21-23 near Mitchell.

SDSU Extension, university staff and commodity groups will gather from across the state to host more than 40 informative booths inside the SDSU Pavilion during the three-day farm show.

"We want to make it as easy as possible for attendees to find us and gather the information they need," said Barry Dunn, Dean of the College of Agriculture and Director of SDSU Extension.

Once inside the SDSU Pavilion, visitors will find it easier than ever to locate what they need. Reflecting the new organizational structure of Extension, booths will be organized by focus area; Crops Climate, Livestock Production, Food Family and Youth Community Development; and will neighbor with respective commodity groups.

"This year SDSU Extension has focused a lot of energy on creating efficient and real-time access to information. Dakotafest is no different," said Emery Tschetter, Director of Marketing Communications for the College of Agriculture and Biological Sciences.

The SDSU Pavilion is also home to the SDSU Bookstore and booths which will host the Hobo Day Committee and staff from the College of Agriculture Biological Sciences. Free ice water and coffee will be available all day, with free ice cream served at noon and forums beginning at 10:30 a.m. and 12:30 p.m. each day.
