

CHICAGO (AP) — Grains futures rose Monday on the Chicago Board of Trade.

Wheat for September delivery rose 36.75 cents to \$8.8450 a bushel; December corn rose 32.25 cents to \$7.7250 a bushel; December oats rose 7.75 cents to \$3.8225 a bushel; while November soybeans jumped 38 cents

to \$15.9050 a bushel.

Beef and pork futures fall on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange.

August live cattle fell 0.40 cent to \$1.1680 a pound; August feeder cattle fell 3 cents to \$1.36 a pound; while August lean hogs rise 0.02 cent to 90.42 cents a pound.

75 YEARS AGO

Saturday, July 17, 1937

• A slender, brown-haired girl of 19, her identity closely guarded, stood out today as the one hope of police for early solution of the slaying of Dr. George W. Webster, 39, Providence obstetrician.

• Tapering off the seemingly hopeless South Seas hunt for Amelia Earhart, the first two vessels in the search started homeward today. The aircraft carrier Lexington and three destroyers remained to comb the torrid areas where the aviatrix and her navigator vanished two weeks ago.

50 YEARS AGO

Tuesday, July 17, 1962

• Yankton county was one of seven in South Dakota chosen for a pilot study of a "Medical Self-Help" training course developed by the Public Health Service, the Office of Civil Defense Mobilization and the American Medical Association. Sixty-two people at Sacred

Heart hospital took the course and have been required to give an evaluation of it.

• The city plan commission recommended to the city commission passage of amendments to the city zoning ordinance which in effect would permit no parking of trailers in Yankton in the future except in licensed trailer courts.

25 YEARS AGO

Friday, July 17, 1987

• The Yankton Police Department has investigated four different rapes in the past month, including one that allegedly occurred in 1985. According to YPD detective Carl Moser, none of the incidents are related.

• Donna Schwarz and Art Kotalik, both of the rural Tabor area, are members of the Lakeport Association, which is dedicated to restoring the 103 year-old St. John the Baptist Catholic Church. Mass will be celebrated there on Sunday by Bishop Paul Dudley.
