

"I think people after the Fourth of July are beginning to take some responsibility for what happens out there," he said. "They are very aware of what the conditions are."

Scherschligt agreed. "To my recollection, in talking with the different departments, most of the fires they've had this year have been accidental, such as farm machinery starting grass fires while cutting hay," he stated. "Nobody is burning trash. Nobody is being (careless). We just want to get the message out that conditions are severe out there."

The burn ban received unanimous approval, as did a request for Gov. Dennis Daugaard to declare that a disaster exists in Yankton County because of drought conditions.

That step could open opportunities for emergency relief loans and funds.

"I talk to a lot of farmers, and they say that in another week, if they don't get rain, the beans are really going to get hit," Commission Chairman Bruce Jensen said. "A lot of corn can't even be cut for silage because the nitrates are so high they would kill the cattle. They're just not going to have any use for it. It's a sad deal, and it's going to be tough on the whole community."

In other business Tuesday, the commission:

- agreed to get an appraisal done of the former County Highway Shop property. Sealed bids from parties interested in the property will have to be received by Sept. 5. The commission approved the move in a 3-2 vote, with Moore and Commissioner Johnson dissenting. While Moore opposes the sale of the property, Johnson said he preferred to make sure the appraisal was complete before setting a date

for bids to be submitted;

- tabled an ATV ban along Deer Boulevard south of Highway 52 until its next meeting. The commission had considered such a ban in 2006-2007 before problems with the vehicles subsided. Several ATV enthusiasts spoke against the measure, saying it punished everyone who uses the vehicles rather than the few offenders. Commissioners said they would give the issue several weeks to see if it can be resolved by other means;
- spoke with Bill Beukema, general manager of the Parkston-based Dakota Plains Ag Center, about a proposed grain facility along the railroad approximately three miles northwest of Yankton. The first phase of Dakota Plains Napa Junction has a projected cost of \$28 million. Beukema said the organization is still waiting to receive approval for rail access but plans to forge ahead with the project. The commission took the opportunity to tell Beukema that Yankton County does not have money to build the concrete road that will be needed to reach the facility and handle the heavy loads. They estimate it could cost \$2 million to \$8 million, depending on the route. Commissioners said the county and Dakota Plains must work together to find infrastructure funding prior to the project getting under way;
- approved a provisional budget for 2013;
- instructed Highway Superintendent Alan Sorensen to notify Dakota Southern Railway that it must fix the railroad crossing south of Utica or the county will pave it over; and
- agreed to allow the City of Yankton and the Yankton School District to have complimentary access to the county's Beacon site, which allows users to interact and view county information, public records and Geographic Information Systems (GIS) via an online portal. Moore opposed both actions.

BOARD OF TRADE

CHICAGO (AP) — Grains futures traded mixed Tuesday on the Chicago Board of Trade.  
Wheat for September delivery rose 0.50 cent to \$8.85 a bushel; December corn fell 1.25 cent to \$7.125 a bushel; December oats fell 2 cents to \$3.8025 a bushel; while November soybeans were unchanged at \$15.9050 a bushel.  
Beef and pork futures fell on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange.  
August live cattle fell 1.33 cent to \$1.1547 a pound; August feeder cattle fell 1.80 cent to \$1.3420 a pound; while August lean hogs slipped 0.47 cent to 89.95 cents a pound.

The U.S. Justice Department had urged the judge to dismiss the lawsuit.  
The lawsuit, filed in U.S. District Court in Nebraska, argued that the rule would effectively force religious employers and organizations to drop health insurance coverage, which would raise enrollment in state Medicaid programs and increase patient numbers at state-subsidized hospitals and medical centers.  
In his ruling Monday, Urbom said that argument was "based on layers of conjecture" and failed to show that the rule would strain state budgets.  
Urbom said Catholic groups that joined the lawsuit failed to show that a religious exemption written into the rule wouldn't apply to them. He also noted that Obama's administration has agreed to work with religious groups.  
"In short, the individual plain-

tiffs have not shown that their current health plans will be required to cover contraception-related services under the Rule, and therefore their claims must be dismissed," Urbom wrote.  
Some legal experts have said that even though the nation's highest court largely upheld the law, the lawsuit focused on a separate issue and stood a decent chance.  
Obama's administration, in response to the criticism from religious groups, delayed enforcement of the provision until next summer and has said it would shift the requirement from employers to health insurers. White House officials have said they didn't want to abridge anyone's religious freedom, but wanted to give women access to important preventive care.

Tour Of Lawns And Gardens Set For Saturday


The fifth annual Tour of Lawns and Gardens, sponsored by Missouri Valley Master Gardeners, will be held Saturday July 21.
