cans, water bottles, beer bottles, empty bags of chips and Styro-foam bait boxes. He said most of the litter is left behind by individuals fishing from the shore. "Typically, it's the worst on Mondays. It accumulates over the weekend," he said. "There are also fish that people are catching that they aren't keeping, and instead of releasing them, they throw them up on the bank, and that accumulates too."

Ledbetter said the biggest problem with most of the litter, such as the styrofoam and plastic bottles, is that it isn't biodegradable. "It just doesn't break down," he said. "That takes years and years and years."

Ledbetter said the Corps has hired contractors that are required to pick up litter along the nearby roads, but their responsibilities do not cover the area down by the rocks, which is where most of the trash accumulates. Because of this, the cleanup is left to the Corps or volunteers. "Some weeks we'll have our summer hires go out and spend 8-

10 hours a week to clean up the messes, or some times a bunch of us will get together one morning and go out," he said.

Having to devote time to picking up the litter makes the rest of the workers' jobs much more difficult, Ledbetter said.

"If we have to pick up litter and pick up after other people, then it takes away from being able to serve the public in other ways," he said. "That's why we're asking for people's help with this and asking them to pick up after themselves."

Ledbetter said the Corps has received help with the cleanup from outside sources in the past, such as various sportsman's groups and Keep Yankton Beautiful. The area has also been included in the Missouri River Cleanup program held each year. "It's very hard to try and keep up with it," he said. "It just continues to pile up."

Ledbetter said individuals caught littering can be assessed a fine of up to \$100, but that is usually limited to repeat offenders or "major issues."

"It's not something we do a lot. We try to educate people instead," he said. "We're just asking the public to cooperate."

Saturday, July 24, 1937

- A quarantine on the shipment of cattle into or out of Yankton, Bon Homme and Charles Mix counties was ordered today by the South Dakota State Livestock Sanitary Board, effective at midnight last night, in an effort to check the spread of anthrax, which has already taken a heavy toll among herds in the three counties.
- With only the signature of President Roosevelt needed to give it the effect of law, a concurrent resolution which passed the senate in Washington this week permits the placing of the first statue of a South Dakotan in Statuary Hall in Washington. A bronze statue of General William H. H. Beadle, the man whose influence led to the creation of the state permanent school fund, is being provided for the purpose by pupils and teachers in South Dakota Schools.

50 YEARS AGO

Tuesday, July 24, 1962

- With a plea for forgiveness, convicted slayer Charles Noel Brown was hanged at dawn Tuesday on the wooden scaffold at the Iowa state penitentiary. The trap was sprung at 5:02 a. m., and he was pronounced dead at 5:05 a. m.

- An SOS to the Road Rebels Auto Safety Club of Yankton one day last week brought four members to the Nancy Nursing Home to help transport some of the residents to the mobile X-ray unit downtown for their chest X-rays. Nineteen sick and elderly people who could leave the home were transported to and from the unit by the young men.

Friday, July 24, 1987

- A family of Czechoslovakian refugees arrived in Yankton Thursday, where they will establish their new home. Jiri Zatrpa, 37, his wife, Jana, 34, and three children, Martin, 15, Katerina, 9, and Miroslav, 6, will be sponsored by the Yankton Refugee Program, composed of volunteers from churches, service clubs, and other individuals who support refugee resettlement in the United States.

Online Programs Helping Students Succeed

PIERRE — The South Dakota Board of Education received updates Monday during its regularly scheduled meeting on two online programs that create rigor and relevance for high school students.

The South Dakota Virtual School provides expanded course offering to students through online studies. It gives students the opportunity to take more Advanced Placement courses, study highly specialized subjects, or receive tailored remedial instruction.

In 2011-2012, 133 public school districts and school systems participated in South Dakota Virtual School. That's up from 88 just three years ago. More than 2,900 full- or part-time students in grades 6-12 use the system, for a total of 3,822 semester registrations.

"Especially in many of the smaller districts in the state, schools may not be able to pay a full-time teacher in advanced or highly spe-

cialized subjects," said curriculum specialist Erin Larsen. "The South Dakota Virtual School gives students those same opportunities, increasing the rigor and relevance of their high school education."

Currently, there are 364 semester course offerings through South Dakota Virtual School, with 24 AP courses and 82 credit recovery courses. In the future, the virtual school will expand to offer more courses at the middle-school level.

Another program, South Dakota MyLife, is an online career development tool that encourages students to explore careers through interest inventories and skills assessments. Students can then research careers they are matched with and save that data to their online portfolios. With that knowledge, they can use their profiles to plan their academic programs and track their goals.

"SDMyLife usage is really high right now," said Tiffany Sanderson, career and technical education administrator in the Department of Education. "Overall usage has been steadily climbing since we introduced the site four years ago. It's a good indication that students have access to the resources they need for success in high school and preparation for life after 12th grade."

Completion of the online interest inventories has allowed the state's education analysts to compare student interest data with workforce needs so teachers and counselors can educate students regarding relevant opportunities in South Dakota. In a related study, it was discovered that students completing career and technical education programs graduated and continued to the postsecondary level at a higher rate than the average student population.
