whole package."

Although this is her first time in an adult theatre production, Rembert says she has been involved with theatre since she was six years old, starting out at the Missoula Children's Theatre.

"My first role ever was a bumblebee," she said. "Then I played a skunk. I was really proud of that one because I was the only kid who had lines and I actually got a name, instead of skunk two or four, like everyone else."

Rembert admits she was intimidated by having to audition with LCTC, but said it became easier after the auditions started.

"At first, I thought it was going to be really hard," she said. "I tend to exaggerate things a lot, so I made it into a really big deal. But, when we were at the auditions, all these little girls came in and I thought, 'Oh, I can do this.' I had built it up in my head but it was easier than I thought to get the part."

Gill said Rembert had a great audition, and was blown away with her singing capability.

"She really shined during the auditions," she said. "Then, during the casting process, we thought her height would be an

issue, but the person who plays Warbucks is so tall, that was no longer an issue."

Rembert has had to work just as hard now that she has the lead role, as she did preparing for auditions. Gill said there is a lot of work that comes with having the lead.

"With the lead role, you're going to have an enormous amount of lines," Gill said. "Working on the blocking at play rehearsal is really important too, because it helps coordinate the lines. You can figure out what line you're saying depending on where you are on stage."

Rembert's mother, Julia Kleinschmit, said it was great to watch her daughter go through the process to get the role, but was a little worried at first.

"When people heard that Hannah was going out for Annie, I knew that she does sing really well, she has red hair and she is really good on stage, but I was worried that other people, and Hannah herself, were getting really built up that she had this in the bag. I didn't know what was going to happen if she didn't get the part."

Although Rembert watched the movie to prepare for the theatre production, she said it didn't help as much as she had hoped.

"In the movie, (Annie) was really spunky. Then I read the script, and she was more mom-like to the orphans," Rembert

said. "I had to change that a bit, and I also had to change my voice to be able to sound younger."

Trying to act two years younger was the most challenging part of having the lead role, Rembert said.

"I had to learn to act smaller and younger," she said. "I'm playing an 11-year-old, and I'm 13. It was a little hard to remember what it was like to be an 11-year-old."

Gill said it was important for Rembert to look back on her childhood years in order to be able to play the part of Annie.

"She really had to remember what it was like to be 10 or 11 years old," she said. "Sometimes we would see the teenager Annie come out, and I would have to remind her that we need a little girl."

For Kleinschmit, getting to watch her daughter work at the

theatre has been a fun experience, she said.

"Hannah's got a really great work ethic, and she's been learning that she's contributing to something bigger than herself – that when she doesn't do her job, whether it's missing a line, or not crying big enough – that everybody else is affected. She's definitely picked that up, and I think those are going to be great lessons for her over time," Kleinschmit said.

Gill said Rembert has been phenomenal to work with and has been blown away by her talent.

"Her singing still gives me goose bumps every time she opens her mouth," Gill said. "She's just absolutely incredible. She has such a bright future in singing."
