Take An Eye-Opening Taste Of 'White Water'


"White Water," by Michael S. Bandy and Eric Stein, Illustrated by Shadra Stirckland, Candlewick Press, 2011. 40 pages.

White water? Of course water is white. Well, actually it's clear, especially when it comes out of a drinking fountain. But it wasn't always that way. At one time water was also colored.

Michael is a young African American boy growing up in the South in 1962, just before the civil rights movement which brought African Americans equal rights. When Michael and his grandmother go to town, they ride the bus. They make sure to get to the bus stop early but that doesn't matter. Even though they're first, when a white woman and her son arrive, Michael and his grandmother must give up their seat on the bench to them.

When it's time to get on the bus, the white people pay their fare and sit down in a seat. Michael and his grandmother must pay their fare, then get off the bus and get on again



through the door near the back of the bus. Michael doesn't let these things bother him because he's so excited to go to town. And hot. When he gets there, he makes a bee-

line for the water fountain and drinks from the one with a "Colored" sign. The white boy that OK the same bus drinks from the fountain labeled "White." At first the warm rusty water tastes OK, but soon it tastes muddy and nasty. He quits drinking and watched the white boy continue drinking from his foun-

The white water must taste better! Michael realizes. Just then his grandmother spies him eying the white fountain and warns him to put that thought out of his head. Too

As they ride home that day, as Michael takes a bath, as he goes to school the next day, all he can think about is that white water. He just has to know what it tastes like!

I won't spoil it and tell you what happens, but Michael comes to a huge realization, not just about white water, but about himself and his own limitations.

This is a picture book for ages 5 and up. but it's definitely a book from which every child, teen, and adult should take a long drink.

"If you're one of our state's good amateur cooks armed with a great beef recipe, it's time to enter the State Fair Beef Cook-Off," says Karla Pazour, chair of the event. "We'd love anyone who enjoys cooking to participate," says Pazour. "The State Fair is a true South Dakota affair with competition in everything from horticulture to livestock breeds." The Beef Cook-Off is one more friendly competition featuring grills, skillets and beef.

Entries and recipes are due Aug. 1, 2012 for the State Fair Beef Cook-Off to be held Saturday, September 1 at the South Dakota State Fair in Huron. The contest is open to non-professional South Dakota residents in either the youth division (10-18 years) or adult division (19 and older). Beef recipes submitted must feature a main meal entrée appropriate for entertaining or special occasion meals. Judging is based on taste, appearance, originality, nutrition and ease of preparation. The winner of the youth division will receive a \$250 cash prize, while the adult division winner will take home \$500 in cash. Thanks to the Beef Check-off dollar, there will be \$1,500 in cash prizes awarded.

Pazour says, "Many people have fond memories of their favorite meals on vacation or at

trend-setting restaurants." This year's cooking theme "DESTINA-TION: DINNER" challenges the cook to replicate recipes that are representative of specific locations—think Bourbon Street Steak, Lone Star Salad, Beef Burgundy, Korean-Style Ribs, explains Pazour. Beef's versatility makes it a natural for various ethnic creations. She says, "Sometimes you can escape from life's ordinary by simply creating an extraordinary beef meal!'

Individuals selected to compete will actually prepare their beef entrée in a public area during the Beef Cook-Off, allowing participants to interact with state fair attendees. Judges are kept in a secluded location and recipes are judged completely on the finished product, not on cooking proce-

list of cities that have participated in the project, including Minneapolis, Chicago, Reno, Montreal, Berlin and Vicenza, Italy. "We want Yankton to be the first South Dakota community to do this and we'd love to see Yankton featured alongside those other larger cities,' added Mannes Homstad.
