

CHICAGO (AP) — Grains futures rose Friday on the Chicago Board of Trade.

Wheat for September delivery rose 14 cents to \$8.98 a bushel; December corn rose 17 cents to \$7.9325 a bushel; December oats rose 7 cents to \$3.7975 a bushel; while November soybeans jumped 34.50 cents to \$16.02 a bushel.

Beef futures rose, while pork futures fell on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange.

October live cattle rose 2.10 cents to \$1.2527 a pound; August feeder cattle rose 1.75 cent to \$1.3775 a pound; while October lean hogs slipped 0.10 cent to 81.32 cents a pound.

For \$1 or \$5, individuals can contribute to their local programs and post a Backpack cutout on the wall with their name or drop spare change into coin collectors.

"We are excited to partner with Arby's to raise awareness about food insecurity," Struck said. "Arby's, as a corporation, has made it a goal to eliminate childhood hunger, and we look forward to collaborating with them throughout South Dakota."


In addition to supporting feeding programs that strive to serve quality meals to children, Arby's has "wholesome happy choices" on its menu for children.
