NPS Bridge Walk Programs Set

National Park Rangers from Missouri National Recreational River will be at the Territorial Capitol replica in Yankton's Riverside Park from 10 a.m.-4 p.m. this week to answer questions about the river and provide information to visitors and the community.

A new exhibit now on display shows some of the "outstandingly remarkable values" that led Congress to designate these segments of the Missouri as a recreational river under the Wild and Scenic Rivers Act. Rangers will also conduct walks to the historic Meridian Bridge and present short talks on a variety of subjects. The walks will begin at the Territorial Capitol replica at 11:30 a.m., 12:30 p.m. and 3 p.m. Upon reaching the bridge, the talks will last no more than 15 minutes, after which vis-

itors may continue across the bridge, return to downtown Yankton, or chat with the ranger on the way back to the capitol. In the event of heat warnings or rain, talks will be given in the capitol building.

• Monday, July 30: "Not Just a River" — The National Park Service protects not just the Missouri River, but many other natural and cultural resources associated with the river. Discover the "outstandingly remarkable values" that led Congress to create the Missouri National Recreational River.

• Tuesday, July 31: "Then and Now" — The Missouri River, its users, and uses have changed over the centuries. What does this mean for the river in our future?

Wednesday, Aug. 1: "Crossing the Mighty

Mo" — The wild Missouri was both a means of travel and an obstacle to it. Learn how fickle fortune and the river itself stood in the

way of bridge building.
• Thursday, Aug. 2: "The Missouri River: Connecting the Past and the Future" — How has the Missouri River changed and been changed over the centuries? What will the river be like in the future? Walk with a ranger and discover what changes and what remains

• Friday, Aug. 3: "Invasion!" — They're not from outer space, just other parts of the earth. But these species pose a serious threat to our lakes, rivers, and national park. Learn the true nature of the threat they pose and what we can do to stop them.

country have turned out, but the few that I've worked with and seen have not had great results," he stated. "What you end up with is a few native grasses and a few native flowers, and a lot of weeds. People aren't sure if it's a weed patch or native. In the end, 10 years down the road and a couple of burn-offs, expectations have not been met at Rotary

Taking a different approach, Larson said the city has now planted buffalo grass in the park,

which is native to the area. You don't need to water it, which is great since that park is not irrigated," he stated. "You maybe have to mow it three times a year. It stays short so people can walk through it, and it

is inviting." KYB, a non-profit that seeks to

engage individuals in local community improvement and environmental projects, agreed to become involved in the effort and secured a \$5,000 grant from the Lowe's Charitable and Educational Foundation to assist with its execution. The Rotary Club is also involved.

The funds will assist with the native wildflower educational area. Besides the buffalo grass, it will feature 12 fieldstone sections of plants (identified by informational plaques), park benches and stone pathways.

The Boys and Ğirls Club, local Boy and Girl Scout troops, Master Gardeners and Yankton 4H Clovers have also offered to helr with the project.

"What's nice about this garden is that it provides an educational opportunity, so people can learn about what plants grow naturally in this area," said Julie Perakslis, the executive director of KYB. "It will also be nice for people taking a walk or looking for a place to read a book. It will give

people a gem to go to in that part of town.

In addition, natural fauna will be helpful to the ecosystem and attract birds, insects and other creatures, she said.

Perakslis said she finds that things such as park improvements can inspire others to do work on their own spaces or offer assistance with the public "You want to motivate peo-

ple," she stated. "You improve

the perception of that corner of

town and the attitude toward it. and it improves how people feel about their areas." Larson estimates that it could several years before the proj ect is fully realized because of

the time it takes to establish "I think the end result will be something to be proud of,
