Crash Kills Son Of Southwest Minnesota State Coach

MARSHALL, Minn. (AP) — Brad Bigler, the men's basketball coach at Southwest Minnesota State University, was in critical condition Sunday after a two-vehicle crash in western Minnesota that killed his 5-month-old son and injured two other relatives.

Bigler, 33, was hospitalized in Sioux Falls with several broken ribs and a broken shoulder blade, SMSU athletic director Chris Hmielewski said. Drake Phillip Bigler, the coach's young son, was killed in the crash.

"Obviously it's a tragedy when you lose a young family member, Hmielewski told the Independent of Marshall. "The thoughts and prayers of the entire Mustang family and everybody should go out to the Bigler family as they cope with this situation.

Bigler has been head coach of the SMSU men's basketball program for three years. The Mustangs finished 19-11 last season, winning the Northern Sun Intercollegiate Conference tournament championship and making their third-ever appearance in the Division II tournament.

Bigler's wife. Heather Bigler. was driving in Pope County on Saturday evening when a truck driven by a 38-year-old Starbuck man crossed the center line and struck her vehicle, the Minnesota State Patrol said.

All four people in Bigler's vehicle were hurt. Heather Bigler suffered minor injuries, and her 74-year-old grandmother, Sharon

Schuler of Granite Falls, was left in critical condition, authorities said.

The State Patrol said alcohol was detected in the Starbuck man's system, and is suspected as a factor in the crash.

State records show that the driver had been convicted of gross misdemeanor drunken driving in 2005 and for driving under the influence in 2000, according to the Minneapolis Star Tribune. In both cases, the man's blood-alcohol content was greater than 0.20, or 2 1/2 times the legal limit in Minnesota.

Doleman Redefinition Of

MINNEAPOLIS (AP) — Chris Doleman had never played defensive end in his life when Minnesota

That position switch couldn't have worked out better for him or the Vikings.

He was 6-foot-5 and 270 pounds, taken with the fourth overall draft pick out of Pittsburgh, when he came to Minnesota. In college, he was a stand-up outside linebacker in a 3-4 defensive scheme, but the Vikings used a 4-3 alignment and asked him to frequently drop back in coverages he wasn't comfortable with. Plus, he didn't rush the

"It's like buying a Ferrari," Doleman said, "and just driving it to the grocery store around the corner.'

So when an injury to Mark Mullaney in 1986 created a spot at defensive end, Doleman was moved to the line. He used a unique blend of speed, technique and strength to amass 150 1/2 sacks over 15 seasons in the league, 10 of those with the Vikings. Doleman will enter the Pro Football Hall of Fame during the ceremony in Canton, Ohio, next

teams and endured only three losing seasons in his career. He played in 232 of a possible 237 games, building a reputation as a durable, hard-working, clutch performer. Wiggin recalled the 1989 season opener against Houston, when he reminded Doleman and defensive tackle Keith Millard of the danger that Oilers quarterback Warren Moon, already in the Hall of Fame himself, posed.

"I told them, 'If we don't put a calling card on him early in the game, he's going to feel comfortable in the pocket and he's going to throw for over 300 yards and we're going to lose the football game," Wiggin said. "With those two guys it was like pouring a bucket of blood in front of a shark.
