"I like to fish a lot, I like to hunt, I like to go out and walk around in nature and that's what I like to draw," he said. "A few years ago, I started looking through hunting magazines and books and decided I wanted to start drawing those

When I heard about the Highlights contest where you can get your picture in the magazine, I wanted to do it. I picked up one of my hunting books that my mom and dad got me for Christmas and I flipped to a page, and sure enough there was a smallmouth bass.

So Josh drew the small mouth bass for the contest and then began to wait. His mother, Cheri Loest, said they had nearly given up on the contest by the time they heard the picture would be published.

We submitted the drawing last summer, so it's been a year," she said. "When we sent the original submission, about a month later we got a reply back that said 'thank you for your submission, we get many of them and we can't guarantee that we're going to publish yours we kind of gave up with it. About three weeks ago, they sent us a letter and said 'you're going to be in the August issue.

Josh said he will get two copies of the issue, and that he was excited to find out his drawing was accepted.

"I thought it was so cool that I was actually going to be in the magazine," he said. 'It's pretty amazing because it might inspire others to draw like me. They could go outdoors more to draw wildlife and nature. They

"He goes into his room and he puts his radio on, and the thing I like about it is that they focus on a task instead of video games and all that," she said. "They focus on a task and they get it done and it really makes them a calmer person when they do that. It's pretty neat.'

Cheri has also kept many of the pieces Josh has made in the past and plans on framing them for her sun room.

Josh said he wants to continue drawing and making art, and can see himself as a part-time artist when he grows up. He said the reason he enjoys art so much is being able to see so many different things.

You can do so many different things," he said. "You can do dots or Screen like Shakespeare, you can do sunsets, prairies — there are many different types of art out there in the world.

"I want to do more stuff like submitting to more magazines or different papers if they have contests or art fairs. I would like to do it part time when I'm older, because I would like to become a fishing guide, maybe have my own show on fishing.'

But if there was one thing other kids could take away from Josh's success, he said it would be to keep trying.

'This is amazing because you feel like you've accomplished something — you've hit a milestone," he said. 'You just can't give up. Someday, if you really focus and keep working hard you will achieve any goal."


