Surplus Land In Limbo

City Commissioners Remain At Odds On How To Proceed With Property

After trying in vain Monday night to find common ground on which it could proceed with the sale of surplus property, the Yankton City Commission ultimately opted to table the subject for a later date.

The commission recently opted to declare the 5.58 acres property on the west side of the 2200 block of Douglas Avenue and south of Fire Station No. 2 as surplus land. The bare property is zoned as R-

2 single-family residential, and the commission has attached covenants so that a developer

would have to build affordable housing on it. It is projected that 18-21 homes could be built on the

City Attorney Dave Hosmer believed that the minimum bid would have to be 90 percent of the appraised value of the property as determined by three city-appointed freeholders — Jen Petersen, Dennis Breck and Lynn Peterson. They based the value upon the sales of other large tracts of undeveloped land in the city during the past five years, according to Community Development Di-

Sunday Storm Damage Reported

Thunderstorms that rolled through southeast South Dakota Sunday evening left some damage in their wake, including three suspected lightning strikes in Yankton.

According to Yankton Deputy Fire Chief Larry Nickles, a report was received at 8:22 p.m. that a tower at Mount Marty College was struck by lightning and was

"We couldn't find it." he said. "It was raining and blowing so hard, it may have been put out.'

Nickles said he hadn't spoken with college officials Monday to confirm whether any damage was eventually discovered.

A second call was received at 8:40 p.m. of a possible lightning strike and smoke in the basement of a residence in the 1500 block of Walnut Street.

'We haven't confirmed the lightning strike there," Nickles said. "However, (the owner) had a tree fall on a power line, causing his power to single phase. It caused the fuse panel to overheat and smoke, but there was no other damage."

The final call was received at 8:49 p.m. of a lightning

At its annual reorganization meeting Monday night, the Yankton School District (YSD) school board elected Jim Fitzgerald as the new president, while re-electing Kathy Greeneway to the vice president position.

Fitzgerald said he'll enter the presidential post with no set agenda and looks forward to continuing to serve the district in a new capacity on the board.

New school board member Sarah Carda was also sworn to the board with a three-year term.

"Like I said during the elections, I'm really looking forward to learning a lot while serving on the board," she

meeting in his new post, recognized outgoing school board member Chris Specht for his 16 years of service to the school district.

"Chris did a lot of good things for the district, staff members and students," Kindle said. "I want to congratulate him for a good 16 years on the school board.' Board members also discussed the preliminary 2013-

14 school budget, which will be voted on in September.

"State law requires a preliminary budget to be presented in May," Kindle said. "Law also requires there be a public hearing on the budget, which is what we did today. Budgets must be approved by October."

The YSD budget includes a one-time money allocation of \$284,000 for YSD, which was approved by the Legislature.

Tribal President Walks Out On Gov. Heineman

LINCOLN, Neb. — Less than three minutes into a meeting Monday about alcohol sales in Whiteclay, the president of the Oglala Sioux Tribe walked out on Nebraska Gov. Dave Heineman.

Tribal president Bryan Brewer said he left because he felt the governor has no intention of trying to address alcoholrelated problems that stem from the Nebraska town that sells millions of cans of beer and borders South Dakota's officially dry Pine Ridge Indian Reservation. He also accused Heineman of greeting him with a hostile tone, an allegation the governor denied. "He has no plan. He said it's

"(Heineman) has no plan. He said it's not his problem, it's my problem — solve it."

not his problem, it's my problem — solve it," Brewer said at a news conference after the meet-

Earlier Monday, Heineman said Nebraska has no legal authority to shut down the liquor stores unless they violate state law. He said the tribe should provide education and treatment to

JRWDD Meeting To Study Water Levels

At its meeting this week meeting in Yankton, the James River Water Development Dis-

trict (JRWDD) will learn more about releases from two North Dakota reservoirs into the James River. The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers and the U.S. Geological

Survey (USGS) will report on the releases during Thursday's meeting, said JRWDD manager Dave Bartel. The James River board meet-

ing begins at 9 a.m. at the Kelly Inn. The public is encouraged to

The USGS is going to be on the agenda, as well as the Corps of Engineers," Bartel said. "We have been concerned about the releases up in North Dakota, what the Corps is doing at Pipestem and Jamestown (reservoirs). They are going to explain what they are doing and why they have done it."

The Corps' releases from the two reservoirs have remained stable, Bartel said.

"Right now, the releases are a total of 1,200 (cubic feet per second) between the two, and that should be starting to drop

before too long," he said. The National Weather Service has issued a flood warning for the James River at Columbia and Stratford. The river at Columbia should continue a slow, steady climb through the middle of July before cresting. Near Stratford, the river rose above the flood stage of 14 feet and will continue rising to near 14.8 feet by Wednesday. Additional rises are likely thereafter. The river is expected to crest around late July or early Au-

For now, the James River has apparently avoided major flooding, but the situation could

change, Bartel said. 'In the Huron area, we have had very high water for a while, and now the water is starting to subside," he said. "But everything depends on our weather and what is coming. Mother Nature is still the boss. As much as we like to think we're in command, we're not."

Besides the Corps and USGS presentations, Thursday's
