his overseas mission. Lee was pitching at home against the Yankton Tappers in a South Central League game. Freeman lost the game 5-1. but he relished the chance to play one more time on the home diamond.

"Lee didn't want people to know (about his activation), but they announced it at the game because people wanted to give him best wishes," Brett said.

Lee admitted he was somewhat uncomfortable with the attention.

"I asked them not to make a big deal of it during the game," he said. "But at the end of the night, you come off the field and it's setting in, I'm done. And that really sucked.'

Lee quickly emphasizes he's proud to be fulfilling his military duties. Still, he finds it ironic — there's that word again — to see an early end to arguably the best baseball season of his life. He was batting around .450 much of the season, and he came back from a long-time shoulder injury to go the distance on the mound.

Brett sees Lee's departure not only as a brother but as the Black Sox skipper.

"Lee was one of our pitchers, so it hurt to lose him. Then, he was hitting .350 and was in clean-up for the first time in amateur baseball," Brett said. "He was playing different spots for us. He's one of the guys who can play anywhere on the infield.'

Lee was pressed into roles he didn't anticipate when the current season started.

"I wasn't expected to play much, because I wouldn't be there for the second half of the season. And we had guys who needed their (minimum number of) at-bats to qualify for the playoffs," he said.

"That was the mindset that I came in with. But our numbers were down, and I had to

Lee believes he brought a more relaxed attitude into the 2013 campaign, adding to his success.

"I knew I was leaving (before the end of the season), so maybe my mind was elsewhere and I was just able to go back to my childhood and have fun," he said.

And fun is definitely part of the Black Sox chemistry,

"We know we're not the best team, but we can compete with every team, which makes it fun and competitive," he said. "You can't always be serious. You need to lighten the mood, to make fun of someone who strikes out three times. If you can't joke, then you're not truly having fun like baseball is meant to be played."

## **WE ARE FAMILY**

The three Scherschligt brothers — 31-year-old Brett, 29-year-old Lee and 25-yearold Allan — have competed against each other since childhood. They also come from a strong baseball family, as grandfathers Lester Scherschligt of Lesterville and Joe Walter of Freeman are both members of the South Dakota Amateur Baseball Hall of Fame.

However, the three Scherschligts didn't play together at the same time in any sport because of their age differences — until they hooked up as Black Sox.

Brett played all four years on the Freeman High School football teams that rolled up four consecutive state championships from 1996-99. Brett and Lee played together at Freeman, and they continued their football careers together at Augustana College in Sioux Falls.

Brett remained in athletics by joining the Black Sox in 1999. Lee joined later, and Allan made the family affair a

"It's a great experience playing with your brothers," Lee said. "You know what they can do, and you hold them to a higher standard than other people. You are

tougher on any family

member.' The three Scherschligts live in the Sioux Falls area, meaning long baseball commutes even for home games in Freeman. However, Lee wouldn't want it any other

way.
"The Black Sox is the only amateur team that I have played for. I had a couple of years' hiatus (from baseball) while training for the military, but I have been with (the Freeman team) all the time," he said. "We have been to state every once in a while. During one of my first years with the team, we were (State 'B') runner-up to Vermillion (in 2003).'

Now, Lee is headed to Southwest Asia with a different team that will defend the nation in the war on terror.

Brett said the activation ceremony brought home the reality of his brother's departure. "Having Lee leave on the Fourth of July, it's given things a different meaning,' the elder brother said.

While leaving behind a great amateur baseball season, Lee said he's thinking more about his teammates than himself.

"I plan to keep up with the team," he said. "We have the website ballcharts.com, and the Freeman Black Sox will have their stats on the site. I'll keep track of them that way, and I'll also email my family and friends."

Even before leaving on his deployment. Lee talked about returning for the next baseball season. "Freeman hosts the districts next year, so it will definitely be exciting for us," he said.

During a pause in the interview, Lee asked to relay the message of how much his teammates mean to him — that's he thinking of them and wishing them the best during his absence.

"When you get to play the game you love with friends, it's a great feeling that not many people get to realize," he said. "When I'm with my teammates, those times are

## **Meat Groups Sue USDA Over Meat** Labeling Rule

DES MOINES, Iowa (AP) - Requiring meat labels to have more details about a product's origins is too costly and serves no public health or safety benefit, industry groups said Tuesday in announcing a lawsuit against U.S. Department of Agriculture over new label-

ing rules. The rules went into effect in May and require labels for steaks, ribs and other cuts of meat to detail where animals grown for meat were born. raised and slaughtered. Previously, labels only required that countries of origin to be noted, so a package might say, "Product of U.S. and Canada." Now, the labels must specify "Born in Canada, raised and slaughtered in the United States.

In addition, the USDA is prohibiting processors from mixing meat from animals born, raised, or slaughtered in Mexico, Canada, or other countries with meat from the

The American Meat Institute, a trade group for packers, processors, and suppliers and seven other groups said segregating the meat is not part of the law Congress passed and the USDA is overstepping its authority. They also claim the rule will be costly to implement and that it offers no food safety or public health benefit.

"Segregating and tracking animals according to the countries where production steps occurred and detailing that information on a label may be a bureaucrat's paperwork fantasy, but the labels that result will serve only to confuse consumers, raise the prices they pay, and put some producers and meat and poultry companies out of business in the process," Mark Dopp, an AMI executive, said in a statement.

The USDA says the country of original labeling, known as COOL, will help consumers make informed decisions about the food they buy.

"USDA remains confident that these changes will improve the overall operation of the program and also

trade obligations," it said. Other advocates of the new rule say segregating meat will help if a food safety issue develops.

"We've found that there's strong consumer support for country-of-origin labels. When you buy meat to feed your family, you ought to be able to know where it comes from," said Ami Gadhia, senior policy counsel for Consumers Union, a New York-based consumer advocacy group. "If there's a food safety problem with a certain product, the labels can help consumers avoid that product."

The rules also have had support from other farmers' organizations, along with environmental groups.

The meat industry groups that sued said in court documents that about 4 percent to 7 percent of beef and pork consumed in the U.S. comes from animals from other countries. In some parts of the U.S., including Texas, New Mexico, Arizona and California, as much as half of the livestock used for meat could be imported.
