Yankton Man Arrested For DUI After Allegedly Pushing Vehicle Away From Accident

An alleged drunk driver's unusual attempt to flee the scene of an accident was foiled by the Yankton Police Department Wednesday.

Christopher Baldridge, 20, Yankton, was arrested for driving under the influence and cited for being an unlicensed driver, consumption of alcohol by a minor, fleeing the scene of an accident and careless driving.

A report was received at 4:01 p.m. Wednesday that a vehicle had possibly

struck a house and was attempting to leave the scene.

According to Patrol Officer Scott Schindler, he discovered that Baldridge and his passengers had pushed the car off the lawn of a residence in the 600 block of Locust Street, across a street and halfway through an alley.

"I asked them to explain what had happened," Schindler said. "They stated the vehicle had run out of gas and rolled back down the hill and into the yard. The driver stated he didn't think he had hit the house. After speaking with the homeowner, he didn't be-

lieve the house was hit, either."

The vehicle did strike a yard ornament and knocked over a planter with pots.

"There was no significant damage," Schindler said. "I did detect the odor of alcohol on the driver's breath, ran him through some field sobriety tests and arrested him for driving under the influence."

No injuries were reported, and the vehicle had minor damage.

 - Lake Yankton, Noon to 4 p.m.: Let's Move Outdoors! — Be active and stay healthy! Discover family outdoor activities you can enjoy in your national parks and everywhere else. Canoeing and fishing clinics, nature scavenger hunt hike, games, and more activities are offered free of charge by National Park Rangers and South Dakota state park naturalists. This event will be held near the boat ramp at the southeast corner of Lake Yankton, just outside the Chief White Crane campground.
 - Riverside Park, Yankton, Territorial Capitol legislative chamber, 7 p.m.: "Standing Bear Versus the Indian Ring" — Live reenactment. In this new program, Thomas Tibbles, Indian rights advocate, abolitionist, and 1879 editor of the *Omaha Herald*, tells the story of Chief Standing Bear and the Ponca Tribe in their precedent-setting court case and their continuing battle against those who would oppress and exploit the natives of this land.
- Sunday, July 14
 - Lewis & Clark Visitor Center at Gavins Point Dam, 11 a.m.-1 p.m.: Ranger's choice program — A craft for children or an exhibit presentation for all ages; let the ranger surprise you.

BOARD OF TRADE

CHICAGO (AP) — Grains futures mostly rose Thursday on the Chicago Board of Trade.

Wheat for September delivery rose 4 cents to \$6.83 a bushel; September corn rose 7 cents to \$5.6075 a bushel; September oats slipped 0.25 cent to \$3.5625 a bushel; while August soybeans rose 7.25 cents to \$14.72 a bushel. Beef and pork prices fell on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange.

August live cattle slipped 0.15 cent to \$1.2192 a pound; August feeder cattle fell 0.43 cent to \$1.5012 a pound; August lean hogs fell 0.43 cent to 95.27 cents a pound.

The Congressional Budget Office forecasts the annual deficit will be \$670 billion when the budget year ends on Sept. 30. If correct, that would be well below last year's deficit of \$1.09 trillion and the lowest since President Barack Obama took office. It would still be the fifth-largest deficit in U.S. history.

The Obama administration also estimates a lower annual deficit, although it projects a slightly higher figure of \$759 billion.

Steady economic growth and higher tax rates have boosted the government's tax revenue this year. At the same time, government spending has fallen. The dividend payments from Fannie and Freddie have also helped.

The government has collected \$2.09 trillion in revenue so far this budget year, according to the June report. That's 14 percent more than the first eight months of the previous budget year.

It has spent \$2.6 trillion so far, or nearly 5 percent less than the same stretch last year. The decline partly reflects the impact of the automatic spending cuts that began in March. Defense spending is down 7 percent. A better job market has also helped lower spending for unemployment benefits almost 25 percent.
