Microsurfacing To Begin On Highway 44

MITCHELL - The South Dakota Department of Transportation is advising motorists that microsurfacing will be applied on

a portion of Highway 44 near Platte beginning Monday, July 15. Work will begin on Highway 44 at the junction of Highway 50 west of Platte in Gregory County and proceed east 15 miles to the junction of Highway 281 in Douglas County.

The contractor will begin filling ruts on Monday, July 15 and take approximately two days to complete. The microsurfacing part of the project will then proceed and take approximately 10 days to complete.

Traffic will be reduced to one lane and guided through the project using flaggers and a pilot car. A delay of up to 15 minutes can be expected during daytime hours




