

# State Softball: Hale's Angels Finish Wild Ride With Title

Notebook: Love Of Softball Keeps Coach Pepper, Players Coming Back

SIOUX FALLS — Despite the team's propensity to "give me a heart attack," according to coach Mark Mora, the Hale's Angels from Tripp put together a pretty good weekend, winning the 18under 'C' division of the South Dakota ASA Girls' Fastpitch Tournament, which concluded on Sunday in Sioux Falls.

The Angels went 5-1 in the tournament, needing to play a second championship game with Little Missouri Valley Conference rival Wagner before taking the title with a 10-9 victory.

Tripp opened with victories over Clearfield (16-14), the Sioux Falls Riot (9-4) and Scotland (10-9) before beating Tabor 15-7 Sunday morning to advance to the final. Wagner, which had lost its opener before reeling off four straight wins to get to the final pairing, won 12-3 to force the "if" game.

"It's always good between us and Wagner," Mora said. "They came out hitting."

After taking a 2-0 lead in the deciding contest, Tripp fell behind again.

"We were getting down in time and innings," Mora said. "We had a little chat, then we went ahead 10-9."

In order to face unique and challenging competition, the Yankton Gazelles do not need to look far.

"We played 11 kids today and saw some great things," Losing said. "The thing that I like is that we're not settled on a starting five; I'm not sure that you want to have that solidified right now. You want kids battling for spots." With the focus keyed on individual and team improvements, the actual scores of games is irrelevant, Pesicka said.

"It's convenient for our kids to be right here in town at a great camp that Mount Marty has," head coach Doug Pesicka said. "That way, they don't have to worry about travel."

Then there is the idea of facing some high-level competition, all of which the Gazelles wouldn't otherwise get a chance to face — they were the only Class AA school in attendance.

"The one thing that never shocks me, but it does take me by surprise, is how many good players you see in our state," Pesicka said. "Even here at this camp, you see a bunch of really high quality kids."

Dell Rapids also split its players onto two teams, while Alcester-Hudson, Beresford, Bon Homme, Harrisburg, Irene-Wakonda, Lennox, McCook Central-Montrose, Menno, Mount Vernon-Plankinton, Parker, Vermillion and Viborg-Hurley also competed from South Dakota.

Teams across the state are allowed four out-of-season contacts, and the Gazelles played at both Mount Marty team camps this summer the first was held in June. The idea, Pesicka said, is simple: Give the Gazelles an

opportunity to compete. "With so many players here for us, a lot of kids are getting a chance to play," he said. "We can mix and match a lot of different combina"They just need to come out here and compete."

BLOOMINGTON, Minn. — Yankton First Dakota Post 12 advanced to the quarterfinals of the 2013 Jim Hanus Gopher Classic before falling to West St. Paul, Minn., by a 3-1 score Monday in American Legion baseball action.

The finish marked the first time Yankton advanced that far in the 90team event since 2008.

"We never thought that far ahead. We just wanted to put ourselves in decent position," said Yankton head coach Trey Krier. "Then Tanner (Termansen) throws an amazing game on Friday, Sawatzke pitches five strong innings on Saturday and Benji (Zach Benjamin), pitching on four days rest, pitches seven strong innings on Sunday."

Andrew Hummel, Brad Ulmer and Termansen had hits for Yankton in the loss. Mitchell Gullikson drove in the lone Yankton run.
