Neligh Woman Dies In Knox Co. Accident

CENTER, Neb. — A Neligh, Neb., woman has died in a farm-related accident in Knox County, Neb.

Anita Miller, 66, died in the roll-over of a Utility-Type Vehicle (UTV), according to a news release from the Knox County Sheriff's Office.

At 3:12 p.m. Monday, a report was received of a UTV accident in a pasture, approximately 3 1/2 miles southwest of Center, Neb. Leonard Miller, 67, of Neligh was checking cattle in a John Deere Gator with his wife, Anita, when the UTV came too close to a gully and rolled.

Anita was ejected from the UTV and was pinned underneath. She was pronounced dead at the scene.

Leonard was not injured in

the accident but was taken to the Avera Creighton Hospital by the Creighton, Neb., ambulance as a precaution.

The Verdigre, Neb., fire department also assisted at the scene.

Seatbelts were not in use at the time, and it did not appear that alcohol was involved in the accident, according to the news release.

At this point, the fatality appears to be "an unfortunate accident," Knox County Sheriff Don Henery told the Press & Dakotan.

However, as always in a death case, the information from the fatal accident will be forwarded to the Knox County Attorney for review, Henery added.

on top of a major City of Yankton sewage pipe between the vehicular bridge and a walking bridge just to the south. It's estimated the car was traveling at 65 miles per hour in a 30 mph zone when it went off the road, and it sustained extensive damage upon impact.

In addition to the police department, the Yankton Fire Department and Yank-

ton County Emergency Medical Services responded to the incident.

Eastbound traffic along Fourth Street was narrowed to one lane in the area for hours as the scene was investigated and the vehicle was recovered. MW Towing and Automotive Services used two tow trucks to lift the car from the embankment.

Yankton police are investigating the incident along with the South Dakota Highway Patrol. Police Chief Brian Paulsen said an autopsy of Scott has been ordered.

have it here by (last year's) Fourth of July and we could show the community what they got," Simonsen said.

However, Simonsen and the rest of his squad would have to wait until this year's Fourth of July celebration to show off the purchase to the community.

Mark Wurtz of Yankton made frequent trips to the East coast, three or four times a month, Simonsen said. One of his trips took him to Pennsylvania, when he offered to pick the truck up for the firemen.

After making a call to Walkkill, Wurtz made his way to New York but found no one at the station.

"It ended up being that their attorney wouldn't release the truck, so our driver had to leave," Simonsen said. "It ended up costing us \$500 to get us to go there from Pennsylvania, and this started out the long, draw-out affair."

Because New York state does not license its emergency vehicles the same way South Dakota does, Simonsen needed the title in order to finalize everything in South Dakota.

The truck did have a title when it was originally built but was lost when the company's basement flooded.

This meant Simonsen had to go back to the original manufacturer for the truck, but that company had merged with another and no longer existed. Simonsen and his squad then went through Freightliner itself to obtain a manufacturer's sheet of origin (MSO), which stated the truck was sold to Walkkill. This would allow Simonsen to get the truck titled in South Dakota.

Meanwhile, a broker in New York had been trying to buy the truck out from underneath Simonsen without his knowing. His contract with Firetrucks Plus to buy the truck stated that after six months, if the equipment had not been delivered, the contract would be void.

"Everyone who has looked at this truck has said it's a \$70-

80,000 truck," Simonsen said. "So he was going to buy it out from us and turn around and sell it to make more money."

"The guys from Walkkill found out about it, and they were irate. They wanted to honor the contract they signed with us, so we finally got the MSO at the end of January," Simonsen and his crew then had to deal with Firetrucks Plus in California, where the broker who they were buying the truck from was located. Simonsen had paid for the truck with a personal check in June and sent it to the broker in California.

But the money never made it to Walkkill, he said.

Simonsen said the broker had used the money to get himself out of another project. After speaking with an attorney, Simonsen said he was told the broker was guilty of mail fraud and gave him a phone call.

"I told him it was up to him," Simonsen said. "The money showed up the next day, and we got the truck the second week in March."

That's when the historic surprise came up.

Assistant fire chief Shannon Herrboldt said the crew didn't even realize the truck had been at Ground Zero until they received it.

"We were looking for a truck, this one came up and we just thought it was too good to be true for the price," he said. "The truck driver told us it was at Ground Zero, and we thought that was pretty special. That's when (airbrush artist) Mickey Harris thought we really need to do some-

thing to commemorate that deal—we all thought it was pretty special."

So Harris, a professional airbrush artist who lives in Menno, decided to paint the truck at no cost to the fire department as a donation. He painted a fireman with flames rolling past on each side of the hood, and added this inscription on the hood: "This truck served at Ground Zero and serves today in memory of the 343 firemen who lost their lives that day."

"It was something cool to demonstrate what firefighters go through and can go through, and the dangers of it," Harris said. "Once I learned the history of the vehicle and that it had been at 9/11, I thought we ought to do something there as well that says something about it. Everybody agreed, and that was that."

Harris said he has also painted first responder trucks for General Motors that were at Ground Zero and are still touring.

"I do a lot of different work that commemorates the heroes from the armed service," he said. "I was there and got to meet a lot of the people who were there and a lot of people who lost loved ones there. It became pretty personal to me because I stood on that ground with the other vehicles I had done and talked with a

lot of those firemen who survived and had lost their fellow firemen.

"We're very proud of our firefighters here. They do a lot for the community. They're all volunteers and these guys give selflessly of their time. They deserve all the respect they can get."

Herrboldt said the opportunity to put art on the truck is something they can do as a small department, and it was a way to show respect.

"Larger departments aren't able to do stuff like that on their trucks," he said. "We are a small department, so we don't have as many loopholes like Sioux Falls might have. They can't put certain things on their trucks. We thought it would make it pretty special to put something like that on there to honor those who lost their lives."

Not only did the Menno community appreciate the new truck, but so did the surrounding areas, Simonsen said.

"We're all in mutual aid with everyone around here—Scotland, Freeman, Tripp, Parkston, Yankton, Lesterville. We all help each other," Simonsen said. "It's a big deal for everybody. Times have changed a whole lot."
