"The state has no control over the Affordable Care Act," he said.

However, the governor said he understands the local frustration. "Businesses would rather have bad news with certainty than uncertainty,' she said.

McIlvenna has seen the wide-ranging impact at her M&M Manufacturing plant in Viborg, maker of pressure washer components. 'We ship to Canada, Mexico and all the states," she said. "We have never had more than 15 employees, but our customers have more than 50 employees. They are holding back (on their orders) because of the uncertainty (surrounding health reform), so we are coming out of the ditch (from the recession) much more slowly.' McIlvenna said she opposes the current health reform on political grounds. However, she would prefer to see some firm action if reforms are going forward. "I have held back because of the constitutional issues,' she said. "But now, I'm apathetic and just want a decision (on the details).

President Obama has delayed the employer mandate until 2015, but the individual mandate remains on the same deadline, he said.

South Dakota will use the federal insurance exchange rather than spend up to \$8 million to create its own state exchange for a relatively small number of people, Daugaard said.

"On Oct. 1, we are supposed to have the exchanges, but I don't think the federal government is going to get it going," he said. "We'll see, but before expansion. Once you expand (Medicaid), it's hard to go back.

Medicaid expansion could create long-term issues, Daugaard said. 'With Medicaid, we had

100,000 before the recession. During the recession, we had the number go up. Some months, we added 1,000 to Medicaid. We peaked at 160,000, then dropped down to 115.000.

necessary tests and procedures.

Another woman referred to the rising cost of prescription drugs, adding, "We're trying to keep our heads above water."

After the forum, Parsons said she has seen her clients run into the bureaucracy con-

nected with the prescription drug program. The customers aren't the only ones confused by the coverage, she said. "From a provider and insurance standpoint, it's a nightmare," she told the Press & Dakotan. Despite any perceived drawbacks, health reform was needed in some form, Sorlien told the Press & Dakotan. "When patients show up at the (emergency room), do providers have a choice?" she asked McIlvenna emphasized she wasn't blaming Daugaard or state government for her frustration. She told the Press & Dakotan hopes for decisions from federal officials. "Our business has been going for 54 years. We keep busy, but our recovery is going slower until things are figured out," she said. "Knowing the employer mandate could stretch out another year - it creates a lot of frustration."

#### JRWDD Board Announces Funding

Chairman Randy Stanley of Groton announces that the James River Water Development District awarded \$106,000 in cost-sharing assistance at their recent Board of Directors meeting held in Yankton on Thursday, July 11.

The district awarded \$100,000 to Spink County for bank stabilization at County Bridge 58-153-030, 58-190-258 and 58-200-287. Due to flooding on the James River in the last few years the berms of the bridge crossings are eroded. The repair projects would consist of rebuilding the berms with compacted clay fill, placing drainage fabric and rip rap on each berm. The funding will prevent future erosion and prevent damage to the bridges. These funds will be matched by Spink County.

The district also awarded \$6,000 to a landowner in Molan Township in Hutchinson County for repairs to an existing dam. This dam collects silt, chemical runoff and will also control the runoff for approximately two sections of drainage.

Opening Monday's program, Daugaard noted the requirement that individuals carry health insurance or face penalties.

"A whole different world will come Jan. 1," he said. "You hear people say, 'I can't afford it' or 'I don't qualify' (for health insurance). But those reasons are gone Jan. 1."

Daugaard said he supports a delay in deciding whether South Dakota should expand Medicaid to take advantage of federal incentives. Currently, 115,000 South Dakotans are on Medicaid out of the state's 800,000 residents, he said.

"I have never said we shouldn't expand Medicaid, but we shouldn't rush into it," the governor said.

Daugaard said he saw too much uncertainty surrounding the federal government to buy immediately into the Medicaid expansion program.

'We had the federal sequester, the expiration of the Bush tax cuts, and the federal government's budget was too much of a wreck," he said. "How would we know if they (federal officials) were going to keep up their end of the bargain?'

Under health reform, the federal government would pay 100 percent of the cost of Medicaid expansion for 2014, 2015 and 2016, Daugaard said. The federal government would reduce its coverage to 95 percent and eventually to 90 percent, he said.

"After that, we don't know," he said. "We need to see how health insurance shakes out

now than before the recession, Daugaard said.

He noted a similar rise in food stamp numbers, which stood at 60,000 enrollees before spiking to 104,000 during the recession. "We started climbing out of the recession, but the number of food stamp recipients hasn't gone down,' he said.

What worries me, as people become dependent, they remain dependent," he added.

#### THE FUTURE

During Monday's forum, Viborg-Hurley school business manager Wanda Kost expressed concerns about health reform's impact on her district.

Kost felt confident about the school's health care coverage for its full-time staff. However, she was unsure, under one health reform provision, if the district would be required to provide health insurance for substitute teachers who work at least 30 hours a week.

An audience member wondered whether employers will terminate workers in order to fall under the 50-employee threshold for mandated health insurance. One woman questioned whether health providers were requiring un-
