customers receive faster Internet connection and the carrying of more information that put rural customers on a more level playing field. That's important for both economic development and residential use.

Dendinger bid for and won the NTA president's services “for a day” at an auction in May. Carstenson assisted an underground construction crew plowing fiber optic cable to farms throughout the Hartelco service area.

Carstenson assisted with a similar installation the previous day at Prague, Neb., and Clearwater, Neb., for the Northeast Nebraska Telephone Co. (NNTC).

“What people are seeing with NNTC's and Hartelco's investment is being done throughout the state by our

companies,” he said. “This puts in place for Nebraskans the most advanced technology available.”

Hartelco's project is funded by a \$5.265 million loan from the Rural Utilities Service (RUS), according to a news release. Monies received from the federal Universal Service Fund and the Nebraska Universal Service Fund assist in repayment of the loan.

“Our Hartelco serving area will then be 100 percent covered by fiber optic cable,” Dendinger said. “Fiber optics is the 21st century's standard in bringing the information superhighway to not only our town customers, but also to our rural customers.”

Both NNTC and Hartelco are using Nebraska firms to do the engineering, trenching and the work to bury their cable.

“The economic impact of deploying fiber optics will not only help Hartington area residents, businesses, and entre-

preneurs, but the impact is felt much farther away from Hartington,” Dendinger said.

The economic impact will spread even beyond northeast Nebraska, Dendinger said.

“The project engineers from Columbus are also staying in Hartington, and the fees paid to them are spread around the community of Columbus,” he said. “So there are many impacts felt in the local community and larger communities from Hartington's fiber project.”

The Hartelco project provides customers with superior connections for broadband, television and phone service, according to Hartelco regulatory and marketing manager Mike Becker.

“We have completed laying fiber optic cable to each home and business in Hartington and Bow Valley,” he said. “This fiber-to-the-home (FTTH) project is the latest technology that is capable of providing the large bandwidth

steps are going to be made by the township to take care of the problem.

that will be needed for communications in the future.”

“These rural telecom projects are rare after the FCC (Federal Communications Commission) announced its national broadband plan in late 2011,” Becker said. “Many telephone companies across the U.S. have stopped or delayed all construction projects as funding is uncertain.

However, Hartelco has bucked the trend by investing in such technology for its customers, Becker said.

“When this construction project is completed this fall or winter, 100 percent of the Hartelco customers in our service area will be fed by fiber optic cable,” he said.

“All city residents were connected to fiber optics a couple years back, and now all rural customers will be connected. This is unusual in a small rural community.”

The loss of the branch manager position is the latest of several changes that have been made to Yankton's Red Cross services as part of the organization's national consolidation plan. Within the past few years, Yankton has gone from a stand-alone chapter to a branch office with a full-time manager to an office with a part-time manager.

With its latest cut, Yankton's Red Cross joins Madison, Pierre and Huron as branches that recently have

had their managing positions eliminated.

“We have made consolidation efforts across the region, so this is not just isolated to Yankton,” Burke said. “Coming down from national, this is the best way to make sure the most money was going back into the communities.”

Lauren Hanson, executive director of the United Way & Volunteer Services of Greater Yankton, said it is unfortunate that Bodenstedt had to be a “victim of consolidation.”

“She did an amazing job. She really went above and beyond to fulfill her duties,” said Hanson, whose group serves as the umbrella or-

ganization for local Red Cross services. “It was a great thing to have that branch manager here, but it makes sense in the big aspect of things for them to cut costs that way.”

Burke said Bodenstedt has expressed interest in staying with the Red Cross organization as a volunteer. Bodenstedt could not be reached for comment.

Hanson said there are still details that need to be finalized concerning the consolidation, and members of the
