'It is exciting for USD to be working with SculptureWalk Sioux Falls and (director) Jim Clark, to bring these six new, leased sculptures to campus," stated Larry Schou, D.M.A., dean of the College of Fine Arts and chair of the USD sculpture committee. "Every two years, we will conduct another international call for sculptures. These first six pieces represent a good variety of diversity in artistic vision."

The sculptures and their artists: "Generation Slaps" by Matt Miller, "Stream Chit Chat" by Won Choi, "Comma" by Lee Badger, "Meteor" by David Skora, "Relationship Series XV" by Joseph Castle, and "Manly Springs" by Dana Parlier can be viewed at Clark Street in front of the Andrew E. The proposed rules, intended to strengthen previous regulations, would set standards for bacteria and other contaminants, regulate the bottling of milk and require regular testing. They would apply to unpasteurized milk from cows, sheep, goats and

The rules also would require a label that says: "WARN-ING: This product has not been pasteurized and may contain harmful bacteria. Pregnant women, infants, children, the elderly and persons with lowered resistance to disease have the highest risk of harm from use of this product." State officials say there are only five licensed raw milk producers in South Dakota. Opponents of the rules on

Friday criticized state officials' contention that 24 cases of the disease campylobacteriosis were associated with raw milk consumption last year in South Dakota. They said that's far from proof that raw milk caused the illnesses.

Gena Parkhurst, a Rapid City resident who drinks raw milk, said the proposed rules would impose "an even more vicious economic burden on small family farms" that produce the milk.

and 12-year-olds need a booster shot for pertussis.

Meningococcal disease is a bacterial infection resulting in inflammation of the tissues covering the brain and spinal cord. Symptoms include fever, severe headache, stiff neck, vomiting and a rash. Ten to 14 percent of people with the disease die and up to 19 percent of survivors may suffer permanent disabilities such as hearing loss, limb amputations or brain disease. South Dakota typically reports three cases of meningococcal disease a year. To date in 2013, four cases have been reported.

Meningococcal vaccine is available from family health care providers and campus student health centers. The department provides the vaccine for 11 to 18-year-olds who are eligible for the federal Vaccines for Children Program (Medicaid eligible, Native American or Alaskan Native, uninsured or underinsured). The vaccine is free for these children but providers may charge an administration fee.

Whooping cough, or pertussis, is a serious illness that causes uncontrollable coughing, rib fractures, pneumonia, loss of consciousness and even death. Infants are at highest risk, with two-thirds of those under age 1 infected needing hospitalization. There have been 11 pertussis cases reported in South Dakota to date in 2013; three of those cases have been younger than 1.

A pertussis vaccine booster dose is recommended at 11-12 years when immunity begins to wane. The initial pertussis series is given to children at 2 months, 4 months, 6 months, 15-18 months, and 4-6 years.

The department provides the childhood series of whoop-ing cough vaccine and the booster dose free for 11-14 year olds. Providers may charge an administration fee.




5.50 cents to \$13.4975 a bushel. Beef was mixed and pork prices were lower on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange.
