Visitors may also join the ranger for a walk to the Meridian Bridge and a short talk on the natural or cultural history of the Missouri River at 11:30, 12:30, and 3:00 pm.

Hearing On Health Regulations Thurs.

LINCOLN, Neb. — The Nebraska Department of Health and Human Services is holding a hearing on proposed new regulations related to behavioral health services at 1:30 p.m. on Thursday, Aug. 1, in the Nebraska State Office Building in Lincoln, 301 Centennial Mall South, lower level conference room A. The Division of Behavioral Health will accept comments on new regulations that will:

- Implement provisions of the Nebraska Behavioral Health Services Act, including provisions related to the determination of consumer financial eligibility;
- Eliminate provisions relating to assistance for problem gambling;
- Incorporate key concepts of behavioral health reform, such as the concepts that services are recovery-oriented, trauma informed and consumer-focused; and
- Combine all regulations governing community-based services for individuals provided by the public behavioral health system.

Anyone may attend and comment at the hearing or submit comments in writing. Written comments will be given the same consideration as oral comments. Written comments must be postmarked or received by 5 p.m. CT on the day of the hearings and should be sent to DHHS Legal Services, 301 Centennial Mall South, P.O. Box 95026, Lincoln, NE 68509-5026, fax 402-742-2382, or e-mailed to DHHS.RulesandRegs@nebraska.gov/. Dockendorf Wins 3 National Awards

COLUMBIA, Mo. — Yankton Daily Press & Dakotan Regional Editor Randy Dockendorf has won three awards in the 2013 Better Newspapers Contest (BNC) sponsored by the National Newspaper Association (NNA). Dockendorf will be honored at the award reception held Saturday, Sept. 14, during NNA's 127th Annual Convention and Trade Show at the Arizona Grand Resort in Phoenix, Ariz. Dockendorf won the following awards:

- Second Place, Best Breaking News Story, Daily Division, for his Dec. 27, 2012, story on "The Thirty-Eight."

The story covered the Dec. 26, 2012, horseback ride by the Santee Sioux of north-east Nebraska. The riders were paying tribute to the 38 Santee Sioux hanged Dec. 26, 1862 — 150 years ago to the day — in the largest mass execution in United States history. The hangings ended the war between the U.S. and the Dakota people. Nearly all of the Santee Sioux are direct descendants of the 38 executed in Mankato, Minn. In addition, many of the tribe's ancestors were transported from Minnesota to Crow Creek in central South Dakota, then walked to the modern-day

reservation in northern Knox County, Neb. After marking the 150th anniversary with a five-mile ride in bitter weather, the Santee Sioux gathered to remember the sacrifices of their ancestors and the challenges still awaiting their tribe. The NNA judges' commented, "The facts are inherently interesting and compelling, but are more so thanks to Dockendorf's writing."

- Third Place, Best Education/Literacy Story, Daily Division, for the Dec. 19, 2012, story "Wagner Student: Hope A Key Ingredient To Student Success."

The story covered the national recognition given the Wagner High School chapter of the Jobs For America's Graduates (JAG) program. The school-to-work program has 900 chapters in 32 states. The story particularly focused on WHS student and Yankton Sioux tribal member Sage Zephier. He was chosen from among nearly 43,000 JAG students nationwide to deliver the student address before 1,000 persons at the JAG national leadership luncheon in Washington, D.C. Zephier brought a message of hope amidst the often challenging conditions on American Indian reservations. The NNA judges commented, "Wonderful story of

a great program, a teacher's encouragement and an ambitious student taking full advantage of both."

- Honorable Mention, Best Feature Story, Daily Division, for the June 4, 2012, story "With 'SNL' On Break, Two Staffers Explore The River."

The story followed two members of NBC's "Saturday Night Live" who stopped in Yankton during their boat trip down the Missouri River. Justus McLarty explained his past long-distance pontoon rides on American and Canadian rivers, along with plans for the current Missouri River trip. Fellow traveler Becca Landis also gave her thoughts about the trip. The couple also talked about their work on "Saturday Night Live. The NNA judge commented, "I enjoyed getting a peek inside the SNL world and only wished there would have been a little more of the river's lure included."

NNA Contests and Awards Committee Chair Jeff Farren announced and congratulated the contest winners in an award notification e-mail. Farren serves as president and publisher of Kendall County Record Newspapers Inc. in Yorkville, Ill. "The winners reflect the high quality of publications represented by the association," Farren said. Judging results have been

processed, and winners of the 2013 Better Newspaper Contest and Better Newspaper Advertising Contest have been posted online at [nnaweb.org](http://nnaweb.org). There were 1,777 entries in the Better Newspaper Contest (BNC) and 375 entries in the Better Newspaper Advertising Contest (BNAC) for a total of 2,152 entries. A total of 544 awards were won by 140 member newspapers in 41 states. California had the most combined BNC/BNAC wins with 88, followed by Texas with 45, and Iowa and Wyoming tied with 41 each. Lists of winners by division and newspaper, as well as judges' comments, are available at [nnaweb.org](http://nnaweb.org). Winners will be recognized in a special contest PDF available at [nnaweb.org](http://nnaweb.org) following the award reception this fall. Places won in General Excellence categories, and respective judges' comments, will be announced at the award reception. Judging was performed primarily by active community newspaper editors and publishers and included retired university journalism professors and retired or former newspaper men and women. "We deeply appreciate and value the time and talent volunteered by the judges for these contests," Farren said.
