Leahy expressed concerns about Comey's approval in 2005 of a legal memo that he said authorized the use of torture, including waterboarding, in which water is poured onto a suspect's face to make them feel like they're drowning. But Leahy cited Comey's answers at a committee hearing this month, when Comey said the FBI would not allow abusive treatment of prisoners.

Comey was praised by the Judiciary Committee's top Republican, Iowa Sen. Charles Grassley, who called him "a fine

Monday's vote led off a week in which majority Democrats were hoping to push a pa-

Paul had threatened for weeks to block Comey's nomination until the FBI reveals more details about its use of drones in the U.S. He had written three letters to the FBI since June, seeking details on the agency's use of drones and the policies it follows in deploying

The agency's latest response, sent Monday, said the FBI has used drones 10 times

since 2006 for surveillance in kidnappings, search and rescue missions, drug and fugitive investigations. Āmong them was last winter's standoff between authorities and Jimmy Lee Dykes, who was shot to death after holding a 5-year-old boy hostage in an underground bunker in Alabama, the letter

The letter, from Stephen D. Kelly, the FBI's assistant director of congressional affairs, said the agency doesn't use drones for general surveillance unrelated to specific investigations. An earlier FBI letter said none of its drones have been armed.

Monday's letter said the FBI's use of drones must comply with constitutional privacy protections and agency guidelines and meet "the definition of a reasonable expectation of privacy provided by the Supreme

However, the letter said that while the top court has not ruled on the use of drones,

prior rulings on aerial surveillance held that court warrants were not needed because the areas monitored were open to public view and "there was no reasonable expectation of pri-

vacy."

The agency also wrote that a warrant would not be needed because drones don't physically trespass on private prop-

erty. "I disagree with this inter-pretation," Paul said in a written statement. He said he agreed to allow the Comey vote 'given the fact that they did respond to my concerns over drone use on U.S. soil."

Democratic leaders were hoping the Senate would confirm three Democratic nominees to the five-member National Labor Relations Board on Tuesday: Mark Gaston Pearce, the board's current chairman, and Kent Hirozawa and Nancy Schiffer, who have both been long-time labor lawyers.

missioners wanted to look into the issue.

'If we do move forward with an ordinance, it should be well-studied and thought through," Nelson said. "We'd be changing the laws on the books, and we wouldn't want to do that without serious

The current ordinance states: "No person shall disturb the peace through oral communications which amount to fighting words or through conduct which creates unreasonable noise. 'Fighting words' are oral communications which tend to incite an immediate breach of the peace. Examples of conduct creating unreasonable noise are loud stereos, cars or dogs.

Violation of the ordinance is a misdemeanor charge.

Police records indicate there were 98 disturbing-thepeace reports between Jan. 1 and July 22. Only 49 of the

calls resulted in cases/citations. Of those, 29 were from residential homes and were related to things such as music or parties. Nine of them involved juveniles, including kids screaming. Another five were from juveniles being otherwise disruptive, such as for music emanating from a car. Dogs were responsible for two cases, and one case was for

noise from a hotel The only formal disturbingthe-peace complaint related to music from a business establishment was the one for Happy Hourz. Meanwhile, noise at businesses generated eight informal complaints.

The only other formal complaint during that time period was filed in regard to ATVs driving on private property near West City Limits Road

Paulsen said that, in most cases, the disturbances cease upon officer request.

Jay Roberts, who lives in the 400 block of Pine Street and has been disturbed by the noise from Happy Hourz, encouraged the City Commission to look at a comprehensive ordinance that includes specific decibel levels and times of day when certain

noises are allowed.

"I think it would be a disservice by this commission to continue with the same failed policy that your city attorney has indicated is vague," he said, referring a City Attorney Dave Hosmer's description of the current ordinance. "The citizens of Yankton deserve better than a vague ordinance. It's just going to continue. There are going to be other complaints.

Among the questions Nelson said will have to be answered are what noises should be regulated, as well as when, where and how those noises should be regu-

lated. Mayor Nancy Wenande commended the police department for working with Happy Hourz and another downtown business that received a couple complaints related to karaoke to resolve those issues. One-on-one communication may be a better way to deal with the current level of noise complaints than an ordinance revision,

"I think the commission is really stuck in a difficult position on this issue," Wenande said during the meeting. "We have citizens who are obviously being impacted in their homes by the music they're hearing from the downtown area - and not just by one establishment, as we've heard. The police department is in a very difficult situation because of the way (the law) is written. They really don't have a strong mechanism for enforcing anything to get it to change. ... The worst thing the commission could do would be to enact an ordinance that we cannot enforce and is not well-written. That really doesn't help us get to where we would like to be."

Ultimately, no one on the commission disagreed with the need to study the issue with a task force.

Commissioners Brooke Blaalid and Brad Woerner vol-

unteered to be a part of it. "I think we need to at least look into some options to maybe refine the ordinance we have a little bit," Commissioner Craig Sommer said.

these efforts would be possible without the continued cooperation among the state, local partners and surrounding communities. The success of the combined effort of all involved proves there is "strength in numbers," he said.

"We're coming together and wrapping our arms around a problem, which is workforce development," Svatos said. "We all face it. We all face workforce shortages. We have to work together, and that's the answer to solving the problem."
