Yankees 'Pen Preserves 6-5 Win Over Twins

MINNEAPOLIS (AP) — The New York Yankees have a bunch of proud, highly paid and accomplished hitters who have been performing much of this season as if they are well past their prime. Signs of a turnaround have emerged in this series at Minnesota. Brian Roberts had three doubles and a triple for the first four-extra-base-hit game of his 14-year career, and the Yankees used their bullpen to preserve a 6-5 win over the Twins on Friday. "Hitting is contagious. I think it goes both ways," said Roberts, who raised his batting average by 11 points to .248. "When a couple guys start struggling, sometimes everybody starts struggling. A couple guys start hitting, it can kind of roll. So hopefully we'll fall in that direction." David Huff (2-0), the first of four New York relievers, struck out three in three perfect innings after starter Chase Whitley faltered. David Robertson notched his 20th save in the ninth. "It's always big when the bullpen can pick up six innings and we still get a win out of it," Robertson said. The veterans in the lineup did the heavy lifting early on. Jacoby Ellsbury delivered a two-run single in the second to help finish off Twins starter Kyle Gibson (7-7), and the Yankees had 10 hits for the second straight game. "It was probably the most frustrating part, looking back," Gibson said of Ellsbury's hit that pushed the lead to 6-1. Gibson brought the American League's best home-ball-park ERA among qualified pitchers at 1.54, but he only lasted two innings against the Yankees. One of the runs on his line was unearned, due to a passed ball by Kurt Suzuki

that let Mark Teixeira move up and later score on Carlos Beltran's sacrifice fly in the first, but almost every ball was hit hard. "They jumped on him and never let him breathe," Twins manager Ron Gardenhire said. Brett Gardner led off the game with a triple, Roberts drove him in with a double and Gibson was on his way to that kind of day. He gave up six hits and one walk, without any strikeouts. Teixeira had an RBI double, and Brendan Ryan added a sacrifice fly. "We've said all along these guys are good hitters, and eventually it's going to turn," Yankees manager Joe Girardi said. The matchup on the mound between Whitley and Gibson quickly deteriorated, but a legitimate duel between Huff and Sam Deduno developed. Whitley gave up eight hits, four runs and one walk in three innings with four strikeouts, putting his spot in the injury-depleted rotation in a tenuous place. The rookie was unbeaten in his first seven starts, allowing three runs or fewer each time, but he has allowed a whopping 27 hits and 17 runs in 10 1-3 innings over his last three turns. "It's very frustrating, but you've got to keep working to give the team a chance to win," Whitley said. Brian Dozier led off the Minnesota first with his 16th homer, and Chris Colabello went deep the next inning in his first at-bat since May 23. Oswaldo Arcia had an RBI triple and scored on Trevor Plouffe's single to pull the Twins within two before Huff took charge. "Whether he goes eight or he goes three, we're always going to be ready for him.

We're there to back him up and get him through the game," Huff said. Dellin Betances dodged trouble in the eighth inning after Colabello cut the lead to one with an RBI groundout. Teixeira made a diving stop to his right at first base on Eduardo Escobar's sharp grounder, recovering in time to throw to Betances for the third out with a runner on third. This Independence Day game, pitting the Yankees and Twins at Target Field for the second straight year, was preceded by a ceremony for the 75th anniversary of Lou Gehrig's moving farewell address, shortly after he was diagnosed with the degenerative neurological disease that later took his name. Players from both teams read prerecorded portions of the speech. NOTES: The Yankees are 15-3 at Target Field, including two postseason wins. ... University of Minnesota basketball coach and lifelong Yankees fan Richard Pitino sat in the first row behind home plate. ... David Phelps (3-4, 4.26 ERA) will pitch for the Yankees Saturday, and Yohan Pino (0-2, 6.32 ERA) will take the mound for the Twins. The Twins will honor retiring Yankees captain Derek Jeter before the game with a farewell gift. Jeter had Friday off to rest. Brendan Ryan played SS instead.

Yankton's Mulhair To Be Honored By S.D. Tennis Association

Former Yankton tennis coach Tim Mulhair will be recognized with the South Dakota Tennis Achievement Award during the S.D. Tennis Hall of Fame induction on July 27 in Sioux Falls. The ceremony will be preceded a lunch and reception at 10:30 a.m. at McKennan Park. Championships for the 2014 As-fora-Clayton S.D. Adult Open tournament will follow. Mulhair prepped at Sioux Falls O'Gorman, then competed for the Northern State men's basketball team. He returned to O'Gorman, then taught at Highmore and Mission before beginning his tenure in Yankton in 1983. He took the helm of the Yankton girls' tennis team in the fall of 1985, then added the boys' tennis duties in 1992. He coached both until 2010, when he retired from teaching. Under Mulhair, the Gazelles won two Eastern South Dakota conference titles, and Yankton had three players honored with the 'Spirit of Max' Award. Mulhair spent 13 years on the South Dakota High School Coaches Association's tennis advisory board, and spent 11 years as the tennis representative for the South Dakota High School Activities Association. During that tenure, he helped spur changes in state tournament play, allowing kids more playing time and create a true team champion. Mulhair is a two-time National High School Athletic Coaches Association Tennis Coach of the Year finalist. He also was awarded the South Dakota High School Coaches Association Tennis Coach of the Year, and the South Dakota High School Coaches Association Distinguished Service Award. He was inducted into the O'Gorman High School athletic Hall of Fame in 2010. Gayle Klein of Mitchell also will receive the S.D. Tennis Achievement Award. Aberdeen's Terry Jordre and Brookings' Bob Fishback will be inducted into the S.D. Tennis Hall of Fame.

PG's Heller Signs With Wayne State

WAYNE, Neb. — Wayne State College Head Track and Field Coach Marlon Brink announced today that Nick Fly of Omaha, Cole Heller of Platte, South Dakota and Aydan Ronspies of Pierce will attend Wayne State College and compete for the Wildcat men's track team in 2015. Heller and Ronspies each signed national letters of intent while Fly is a transfer from Iowa Western Community College and signed a tender to attend Wayne State College. Cole Heller is a sprinter from Platte-Geddes High School. He was the Class B state champion in the 100 meter dash (11.11) and placed third in the 200 meter dash (23.79) as a senior. Heller also helped Platte-Geddes to a second place finish in the Class B boys state basketball tournament as a senior earning Southeast South Dakota All-Conference honors. He also excels in the classroom with Academic All-State accolades in basketball. "Kole is a very good athlete who is competitive and knows how to win," remarked Brink. "He has pretty good running mechanics and I believe will continue to get better at the college level in a year round training program. He should be able to help our team in the short sprints and relays immediately."

Koch Named WSC Baseball Coach

WAYNE, Neb. — Wayne State College has named former player and assistant coach Alex Koch as its head baseball coach. Koch was a first-team All-Northern Sun Intercollegiate Conference selection, as well as a two-time all-region selection. He played on four NSIC regular season and four NCAA Tournament teams, including the 2009 squad that reached the Central Region final. He spent three seasons as an assistant coach with the program, and was a volunteer assistant with the program after becoming director of the Wayne Community Activity Center in February of 2012. Koch also has high school coaching experience, working with the Omaha Roncalli and Millard South Legion teams and most recently assisting the Wayne American Legion baseball program. Wayne State College was 27-24 this season, finishing eighth

Summitt To Remain Lady Vols' Head Coach Emeritus

KNOXVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — Pat Summitt will remain the Tennessee women's basketball head coach emeritus next season and can continue holding the position as long as she wants it. That's according to a new contract signed in May and obtained Thursday night through a public records request. It states that Summitt will have the title head coach emeritus "in perpetuity, or until she chooses to relinquish it." Summitt will make \$75,000 under terms of the contract, which runs through April 30. She had been paid \$85,000 last year. Summitt has served as head coach emeritus since ending her 38-season tenure as the Lady Vols' coach in April 2012. That came one year after announcing she had early-onset dementia, Alzheimer's type.

Sabathia Likely Out For Season

NEW YORK (AP) — The New York Yankees are no longer expecting CC Sabathia to return to their rotation this year, given the persistence of inflammation in his injured right knee. Asked Friday whether he believed Sabathia's season was over, manager Joe Girardi said: "I think that's about fair to say." The six-time All-Star left-hander has been out with a degenerative cartilage problem in his right knee since mid-May, when his ERA reached a career-high 5.28. The Yankees were targeting a post-All-Star-break return for Sabathia, who had begun a rehabilitation assignment. In his second start, Wednesday for Double-A Trenton, Sabathia was hit hard: five hits, five runs and one walk while striking out two in 3 2-3 innings. The next morning, the 33-year-old woke up with swelling in the joint. An MRI test on Thursday didn't reveal any new damage. Sabathia will be examined on July 14 by Dr. James Andrews before the next step is determined, Girardi said, but microfracture surgery is possible. Previously, Sabathia had an operation on the knee in October 2010 to repair a small meniscus cartilage tear. The microfracture procedure requires far more recovery time, though. "That's a surgery a lot of players don't want to hear when they need to have it," Girardi said. The manager even acknowledged the possibility that Sabathia might have thrown his last pitch for the Yankees, as dire of a scenario that sounds like. "I think it's too early to predict that, but whenever you have degenerative issues that cause surgery or things like that, there's always a little question there," Girardi said. Despite his 6-foot-7, 285-pound frame, Sabathia has been remarkably durable, logging at least 28 starts and 180 innings every season of his career. He reached 230 innings or more in five different years, including in 2007 when he won the Ameri-

The Newberg, Oregon, native concluded his NDSU career ranked among the school's all-time top 10 in nine statistical categories, including points, steals and rebounds. Twenty-four teams will compete in this year's NBA Summer League from July 11-21 on the campus of UNLV.

Boise St. To Pay \$2.3M Settlement

BOISE, Idaho (AP) — Boise State has settled a lawsuit with the American Athletic Conference that was first filed a year ago claiming the university owed \$5 million in exit fees. The university announced Thursday that all claims have been dismissed and it has agreed to pay a negotiated exit fee of \$2.3 million. The lawsuit was first filed after Boise State backed out of joining the Big East Conference in 2012. School officials said at the time that the Big East wasn't successful in securing western members or a strong television package. Boise State officials say that the conference has already been paid \$1.6 million and will get \$140,000 a year over the next five years. The money will come from \$1.1 million in national television bonuses and \$3 million from the Mountain West.

Umpire Darling Retires After 28 Years

NEW YORK (AP) — Umpire Gary Darling has decided to retire after a 28-year major league career that included two World Series. The 56-year-old Darling has been on the disabled list for the entire season. He officially joined the National League staff in 1986 and became a crew chief before the 2004 season. Darling was a part of the World Series in 2003 and 2010. The San Francisco native also worked All-Star games in 1993 and 2003. Major League Baseball also announced Friday that Quinn Wolcott had been appointed to the full-time umpiring staff. The 28-year-old Wolcott had been working at the Triple-A level since 2011.

Germany lacked zip in beating a France team that lacked self-belief. Heat and also a cold bug that swept through Germany's team after it beat Algeria 2-1 to reach the quarterfinals appeared to take its toll. Coach Joachim Loew earlier said one-third of his players complained of sore throats and Hummels ran a fever. Sticky humidity and early afternoon sun made the cauldron of the Maracana feel hotter than FIFA's temperature reading of 26 degrees (79 Fahrenheit). Fans in a large section not shaded by the overhanging doughnut-shaped roof were slow to return to their seats for the second half. "Brutally hot," said German captain Philipp Lahm. At a World Cup where substitutes have starred, scoring a tournament-record 29 goals

so far, France got no spark off its bench. Coach Didier Deschamps' introduction of forward Loic Remy for deep midfielder Yohan Cabaye only stirred the embers of a dying game, without re-igniting it. Striker Olivier Giroud's cameo, replacing winger Mathieu Valbuena in the 85th minute, was also too late to make a difference. Germany made a big statement with a 4-0 humbling of Cristiano Ronaldo's Portugal in its opening game. Since then it hasn't really wowed and its defense was farcical against Algeria, a problem it fixed against France. Like Brazilians, German players have said anything but victory in the final would amount to failure. As well as the 2002 final, Germany also lost the 2006 semifinal to Italy and the 2010 semifinal to Spain after playing dazzlingly in earlier games. It also lost to Italy in the semifinals of the 2012 Euros and in the 2008 final to Spain. In short, since it won Euro 1996, Germany's record at major tournaments can be best described as close but no cigar. The way Loew's players closed out the win against France showed they have learned victory tastes better than playing beautifully. "We're playing the kind of football which will give us a chance to win," said Hummels. "You can't always score two more goals than your opponent in a World Cup." In other developments: —The son of FIFA senior vice president Julio Grondona denied claims he illegally sold a World Cup ticket for profit. Brazilian police are investigating a ticket scalping operation and have made 11 arrests this week, bringing the issue to public attention. —Rescue workers recovered the body of a 25-year-old man crushed beneath tons of concrete and steel of an unfinished overpass that collapsed in Belo Horizonte, killing two people and injuring 22.
