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ask for extensions," he said. Factoring in whether students are improving over time will help because as it is, a student can grow each year but still be marked as non-proficient, Nold said.

He'd also like to see the tests changed to account for more diverse schools like Washington that have a higher number of Englishlearning and special education students. Such diversity is a good thing but can hurt scores, Nold said.

"Our students graduate here having had contact with people from all over the world. But when it comes to purely testing, it does not paint a very accurate picture whatsoever," he said.

In a letter to South Dakota **Education Secretary Melody** Schopp, the U.S. Department of Education said its decision to grant the waiver was based on its determination that the flexibility has helped the state reform student achievement.

The five other states granted an extension were Arkansas, Colorado, Connecticut, Nevada and Virginia.

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"I have worked in performing arts for all my life essentially," Quinn said. "I taught music at Sacred Heart (School) here in Yankton after I graduated from college, and I also taught at a music studio when we were in New York. I felt my skill set applied to this.

With her background of education. Ouinn's focus for her two years at Yankton Area Arts has been on arts education for both children and adults.

"Establishing the programs for youth arts was exciting for me," she said. "If you can develop these skills and give them the platform while they're young, it has somewhere to go. If you wait until they're older, the interest and the skills won't necessarily be there. It meets the needs of a well-rounded education."

In winter 2012, Quinn started the Kids Studio program, which is a six-week fundamental arts course. That year, it served 16 budding artists. She brought the program back in winter 2013 and saw the program grow to 68 kids. This summer, Kids Studio expanded to a summer program as well.

We've seen such a positive impact on the community with this program, that we decided to start Art Adventure, which is an art program that goes into elementary classrooms," Quinn said.

To start Art Adventure. Ouinn enlisted a team of retired Yankton teachers to create a curriculum of art lessons, which they taught to 17 elementary classrooms this past spring. Lessons included skills such as color theory and contour drawing, and had different themes such as the Olympics.

"Budget cuts have left art programs essentially non-existent at the elementary level," Quinn said. "We wanted to do something that lasted an entire semester, so we enlisted a team to not only teach the students the lesson but also teach the teacher how to teach art. The program went fantastically and was a lot of fun for the retired teachers who

came back and for the stu-

Quinn also helped grow adult art education through the program Artist Un-

leashed. 'We wanted to bring the concept of social art to Yankton, while breaking down the stigma of art being untouchable at the same time,' Quinn said. "So we did the painting, hor d'oeuvres and drinks and let everyone have fun with it."

Before she leaves, Quinn will oversee Yankton Area Arts' newest fundraiser, Meridian Diner en Blanc, which Quinn describes as "a chic picnic" on Meridian Bridge. The fundraiser will be held July 19.

"It will not only raise funds for programming for next year, but it will also be a night of art," Quinn said. We'll have a 15-piece brass band (Bridge City Brass) performing and four artists creating art throughout the night."

While Quinn introduced several new programs in the past two years, she said there were certain programs that she didn't change at all. Instead, she emphasized those programs.

"Some things you just let run because they become so familiar with the community and just work so well," Ouinn said. "The Summer Arts Festival, the Kids Art Festival and the exhibits in the gallery changing out every six weeks — those are all things I determined just needed to be emphasized and celebrated more, so that's what we did.' Quinn said she will miss

the community when she leaves for Tennessee.

"I will definitely miss the people I've met here," she said. "There are some treasures here that I will take with me in my heart, but I want them to know that Yankton Area Arts isn't about one person. You can have all the ideas in the world, but if the community doesn't respond, then you have nothing. So it's not about Jackie Quinn; it's about what this community wants and gets behind for Yankton Area Arts to thrive. I've just been lucky to be here.

pay it forward, too. That's what I'm doing. I can, and I'd like to.' I went ahead and paid for it. ... Off she went, then I paid for what I had and I left.

It wasn't long before the act of kindness had grabbed wider attention.

'Monday afternoon I got a call from Jill Callison with the Argus Leader," Flynn said. "I know Jill because we both go to the same church, and I know she writes human interest stories. She said, 'Carol, were you at Walmart last night?' She said that they had seen this video — I guess he posted it around 11 p.m. Sunday night — and she said it had gone viral."

Flynn said the news had come as a bit of a shock at first and that she was even a little concerned.

"I was just stunned, I just couldn't believe it," she said. 'You think you do something anonymously and certainly

don't expect something like this. The thing that bothered me the most was you could see her face, and I thought that was too bad. I didn't know who she was.' Callison then asked Flynn

to do a story on the viral video, which led to interviews with Diane Sawyer, "The Today Show," "Inside Edition," Ellen Degeneres and Fox News during the span of a week. Flynn's son, David Hos-

mer, who lives in Yankton, said that, while the newspaper story came as a surprise, the act of kindness did not.

"I was surprised like everyone else that it was published," Hosmer said. "But ... I've known her a long time, obviously, and it doesn't surprise me that she'd do it.

Hosmer said the power of social media is astonishing. "Social media is very pow-

erful, and it can obviously get to a lot of people very fast, he said. "It's amazing what people will respond to. It's wonderful and nice, but you just kind of shake your head and wonder how come it happened the way it did."

Flynn said it's been an exciting experience, even if it was unexpected. "It's nice, and it's been a

lot of fun," she said. "With that said, I never expected anybody else to know about a feel-good story that others will take a note from.'

As for what Flynn wants others to take away from the story, she said she'd like people to realize the power of kind acts, as well as the importance of just speaking with each other.

"A random act of kindness is kind of a good thing to do,' she said. "One of the things that comes pretty easy to me is to talk to people. It was easy for me to walk up to her and talk to her and ask what she might need. I think people should be open to just enjoying each other and talking to each other. If along the way they find they can help, that's great."
