

"Because people are running things more efficiently, the companies say they don't have enough money for maintenance," he stated. "I've been in the electrical industry for 20 years, and maintenance only seems to be done when it is called upon or something has failed. I question that." Allen tied the utility

increases to a Democrat-led effort to get voters to support an increased minimum wage during this year's general election. "We face a battle right

now with the minimum wage," he said. "If South Dakotans don't get a minimum wage increase and the utilities get to increase their rates, there will be a huge draw on public assistance for people who need help with utilities. We're going to see that on a larger scale. If we do get a wage increase, why should it automatically go to cover utilities? It's time for our families to be able to set money aside and save what little bit they can instead of it going to corporations that are trying to rewrite the rules of the free

Allen said he opposes the TransCanada XL Pipeline

that is proposed to traverse western South Dakota.

He would also use the PUC seat to promote policies that would reduce greenhouse gases that cause climate change. "Anything that can gener-

ate power without leaving behind a (carbon) footprint, I think we need to pursue," Allen said. He said he is convinced

by the science that shows human activity is causing the globe to warm. "You and I probably won't

be around to see the worst of it, but who wants to be around to see it?" Allen stated. "Someone has to be willing to bring forward evidence and not be afraid to be scrutinized for it. Call me a kook if you want. I think,

for the most part, South Dakotans aren't easily buffaloed when it comes to that stuff. They're pretty good stewards of the land.

During the next four months, Allen said he will be attending events around the state and trying to make himself more visible.

"It's going to be hectic," he conceded. "I ran against (District 18 Sen.) Jean Hunhoff two years ago. Now, I'm running against Gary Hansen. Both of them are formidable opponents. Maybe my calling is to take on the Goliaths. Why not?"


