

from renewable energy technology allowing more people to rely less on the traditional electric grid, Allen believes.

"Because people are running things more efficiently, the companies say they don't have enough money for maintenance," he stated. "I've been in the electrical industry for 20 years, and maintenance only seems to be done when it is called upon or something has failed, I question that."

Allen tied the utility rate increases to a Democrat-led effort to get voters to support an increased minimum

wage during this year's general election.

"We face a battle right now with the minimum wage," he said. "If South Dakotans don't get a minimum wage increase and the utilities get to increase their rates, there will be a huge draw on public assistance for people who need help with utilities. We're going to see that on a larger scale. If we do get a wage increase, why should it automatically go to cover utilities? It's time for our families to be able to set money aside and save what little bit they can instead of it going to corporations that are trying to rewrite the rules of the free market."

Allen said he opposes the TransCanada XL Pipeline

East River licenses and \$418,428 from fewer West River licenses.

There also will be smaller declines of \$2,640 for Black Hills deer; \$1,608 for refuge deer; \$27,000 for archery deer; \$9,000 for muzzleloader deer; \$6,320 for youth deer.

The division's biologists consider each hunting unit and don't set population goals on a statewide basis or an entire season.

"Deer aren't the easiest

critters to get a count on," Leif explained to Sen. Mike Vehle, R-Mitchell.

"We've heard a little bit on both sides," Leif said about the public response to the reductions. He summarized the reaction as "prevailing support for the changes but not unanimous."

The state Game, Fish and Parks Commission sharply decreased licenses in many deer hunting units, especially for antlerless deer such as does and fawns. The goal is to rebuild populations in many areas.

The legislative panel gave its endorsement to the changes 6-0 after the review Tuesday.

BOARD OF TRADE

CHICAGO (AP) — Grain futures were mostly lower Tuesday on the Chicago Board of Trade. Wheat for Sept delivery fell .50 cent to \$5.5625 a bushel; Sept corn was 2.25 cents lower at 3.9825 a bushel; Dec oats were 1.75 cents higher at \$3.4050 a bushel; while Nov soybeans declined 9.25 cents

to \$11.1625 a bushel. Beef and pork were lower on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange. August live cattle fell 1.43 cents to \$1.5352 a pound; August feeder cattle was 2.10 cents lower at \$2.1590 a pound; while August lean hogs fell 1.97 cents to \$1.2985 a pound.

WALL ST. RECAP

Investors sold stocks broadly for a second day on Tuesday as they wait for corporate earnings reports to see whether a recent run-up in prices is justified. The Dow Jones industrial average closed below 17,000, a key level it topped last week for the first time in its 118-year history. Internet stocks were hit hard, with Twitter and Pandora Media down 7 percent each.

ON TUESDAY:

The Dow Jones industrial average lost 117.59 points, or 0.7 percent, to close at 16,906.62. The Standard & Poor's 500 index fell 13.94 points, or 0.7 percent, to 1,963.71.

The Nasdaq composite index fell 60.07 points, or 1.4 percent, to 4,391.46.

FOR THE WEEK:

The Dow lost 161.64 points, or 1 percent. The S&P 500 fell 21.73 points, or 1.1 percent. The Nasdaq fell 94.46 points, or 2.1 percent.

FOR THE YEAR:

The Dow is up 329.96 points, or 2 percent. The S&P 500 index is up 115.35 points, or 6.2 percent. The Nasdaq is up 214.87 points, or 5.1 percent.
