# NASCAR Made Right Call To Pull Plug At Daytona

ond-place finisher Brian Vickers. "I was expecting them to wait a little bit longer knowing that we have lights here and it was going to be a night race anyway." Those fans have a point.

But when posting from their living room with the race on the television, it doesn't really apply.

Weather has wreaked havoc on four events this season, including the waterlogged Daytona 500, which needed a stoppage of more than six hours. Then came Bristol a month later, and that race needed two stoppages of more than five hours.

Both times, there were fans that stuck around for the finish. And both times, the television window was stretched, but NASCAR's partners worked with the series to keep the events on TV. Texas in April was just like

Daytona on Saturday. It rained hard all day, and the cars never got on the track. So NASCAR came back the next day, a Monday, and got the race completed under a sunny sky. Some fans stayed, some left, but the television audience was appeased.

Daytona was an entirely different animal.

It was a long holiday weekend with the party scheduled for Saturday night's main event. Rain had caused a wreck in the Nationwide Series' shortened qualifying session, and the race was delayed on Friday night by more rain.

When Saturday night racing for the Sprint Cup Series was scrapped, NASCAR and track officials picked an early start for Sunday to create the largest possible window to the race to comp But the final shower that spoiled it showed no signs of letting up until at least 8 p.m. It would likely take two hours to dry the track when it did finally stop.

### NDSU Wrestling **Boston City Council Talks College Athlete Rights** Staff Adds Former National AP Sports Writer Champion

FARGO, N.D. (AP) — North Dakota State University has hired former University of Iowa NCAA wrestling champion Derek St. John as an assistant coach.

BOSTON (AP) - Local universities expressed concern Tuesday that a proposed College Athletes Bill of Rights would cost them scholarships and commit them to lifelong health insurance for players who are in-

jured during games. Testifying at a Boston City Council committee hearing, representatives from the area's Division I schools balked at provisions that they said would put them at a competitive disadvantage on the field and burden already money-losing athletic department budgets.

The College Athletes Bill of Rights proposed by City Councilor Josh Zakim would require schools in the city to

offer four-year scholarships, instead of the renewable oneyear grants the NCAA currently allows. It would also require schools to cover athletes' medical expenses for any sport-related injuries – for the rest of the player's life.

"I think this is an area the city has an opportunity to lead on," Zakim said.

Zakim also introduced a separate bill that would create a head-injury protocol that would apply to any games played in Boston.

The school representatives said they were in favor of protecting students but questioned whether the city should be the one to regulate them. On Monday, the NCAA issued guidelines that recommended a limit of two contact practices per week, but

Zakim said it didn't go far enough.

"They (the NCAA) are a non-governmental body; these guidelines are nonbinding," he said. "Why shouldn't the city take the lead?"

The ordinance was filed in May, and Tuesday was an opportunity for the public to comment. Daniel Sibor, Zakim's chief of staff, said the proposal now goes to working sessions to hammer out the language with the hope of required to offer injured or a vote in the fall.

Other provisions would require the school to provide athletes with "financial and life skills" and promise the athlete the same disciplinary rights as other students.

Calling for a "Right to Health and Safety," the ordinance also would require schools to provide athletes with comprehensive, yearround medical care, and to train athletes and staff in concussion and dehydration awareness. The head-injury ordinance also filed by Zakim creates a protocol that would prevent players from returning to games after a concussion or becoming unconscious.

Previously, Brazil's biggest World Cup loss was 3-0 to France in the 1998 final. In the 1920 the South American championship, the predecessor of the Copa America, Brazil lost 6-0 to Uruguay.

The responsibility for this catastrophic result is mine," Brazil coach Luiz Felipe Scolari said. "I was in charge.

It was Germany's biggest World Cup win since routing Saudi Arabia 8-0 in a group match in 2002.

On Tuesday, with Bernard playing as the third striker in the place of Neymar, Brazil attacked from the start. But they failed to get any solid chances, and it wasn't long before the Germans opened up the defense and started the rout.

Toni Kroos and Andre Schuerrle scored two goals each, while Thomas Mueller and Sami Khedira added the others.

Oscar pulled a late goal back for Brazil.

"Brazil was shocked after the goals, they did not expect that. They did not know what to do," Loew said. "Their defense was not organized. A little humbleness would not hurt now.

Klose scored his record goal in the 23rd minute to make it 2-0. The German had his original shot saved, but he followed up as Brazil goalkeeper Julio Cesar spilled the ball, easily scoring from the rebound.
