"It gets you more court time and you can improve your skills," Cap said, "especially on defense."

Plus, the faster tempo seen in AAU basketball helps players stay in shape and avoid injuries during their high school seasons, Cap added.

As Parish said, the high level of competition on a players' own team allows them to focus on their specific skill-set. Mieras agreed, pointing out that she can rely on her teammates.

'I get to play my game, because I know I have girls on the court who can help me out, or I can help them out," Mieras said.

Her experience with the Dakota Schoolers played a key role in Mieras attracting the attention of the SDSU coaches, she said.

'The Schoolers really helped me out with that,' Mieras said. "There's a lot of contact with coaches; they get to see you play."

Mieras said she took part in SDSU's elite camp last week in Brookings, and the experience got her even more excited to play for the Jackrabbits.

"It's awesome to know where you're going," she said. "It (recruiting) can get stressful, especially if you wait longer.

Mieras isn't alone within the Dakota Schoolers program in a D-I commitment. Megan Bulstma, an incoming junior at Mount Vernon-Plankinton, has already committed to SDSU.

Coaches from SDSU and USD have been frequent spectators to Schoolers games, according to Parish.

"College coaches love it, because they can watch 30

kids at the same time," he said. "And if you're looking at a certain kid or a couple kids, you're also seeing other great players."

For a trio of incoming sophomores at Yankton High School, summer basketball at this point is more about development than catching the eye of a college coach.

Kami Cornemann, Lindsey Hale and Josie Sayler are all members of the Dakota Schoolers 15-year-old team coached by Pete Egstad. Every player on the squad is a 2017 graduate, meaning they still have two years or potentially three — until a college decision will be made.

"It's a good thing to play more games, because you get tougher," said Cornemann, in her second summer with the Schoolers.

Echoing the thoughts of coaches and fellow players, Cornemann said she agrees with the idea that playing on a team like the Schoolers frees her up to focus on her specific skill-set.

"It means I don't have to be a post," she said, with a smile, "or a point guard."

If there was a natural position for her, Cornemann said it would be as a three or a four.

"We all contribute well," she said. "You don't have to do everything on your own."

And the Schoolers weren't alone in playing a tightly-contested and up-tempo game on

Wednesday afternoon. "It's usually a faster-paced game and not as many fouls, so you have to play smarter,' Hale said.

Though it's still early in the process, Hale - like Cornemann — said she is interested in some day playing college basketball.

"Hopefully this (summer ball) shows them that you're dedicated and motivated," Hale said.

The up-side for AAU basketball is obvious, according to Parish, referencing college exposure. On the other hand, not every athlete walks into the same situation, he added. "In my opinion, it's a dou-

ble-edged sword," Parish said. "There are huge benefits if you get in with a group that coaches and guides you the right way."

That's not always the case, he added.

"Some have had a negative experience, so in that way, I still run hot and cold on the whole thing," Parish said.

At the end of the day — or summer, as it was - the potential to play college basketball out-weighs any negatives, Cap said.

"It's kind of scary, and you don't want to overwhelm yourself," she said.

final, and its first in 24 years. It won the title in 1978 — beating the Dutch — and in 1986. It lost the championship matches in 1930 and 1990. It played West Germany in both the '86 and '90 finals.

The Netherlands, which has never won the World Cup, was seeking to reach its fourth final.

The tournament's second semifinal had been billed as a showdown between Messi and Arjen Robben, but both star dribblers were subdued. Instead it was midfield controllers Nigel de Jong and Javier Mascherano who stood out as both sides' defenses marked two of the World Cup's biggest stars out of the game. When Robben finally broke

free in stoppage time, Mascherano's perfectly timed sliding tackle blocked his shot at the near post.

De Jong, who recovered from a groin injury to start, lasted just over an hour before being replaced by Feyenoord midfielder Jordy Clasie, who made his World Cup debut.

After scoring 10 goals in three group matches, the Dutch scoring dried up in the knockout rounds. The team managed two late strikes against Mexico but failed to find the net before eliminating Costa Rica in the quarterfinal shootout.

"The issue in a championship like this one is that you score one more goal than your opponent, which we didn't do," Van Gaal said, "We didn't create very much."

Argentina also has found goals hard to come by in Brazil, not winning any of its matches by more than a onegoal margin and recording
