parents are aware of the threat.

Barton Bonn, the franchisee for Palm Beach Tan facilities throughout Nebraska, said his salons made "minor adjustments" to comply with the new law. Bonn said his facility and many others already imposed age restrictions for customers, and have added signs to meet the law's requirements.

"It reflects what professional tanning salons do already," he said.

LB174: Truckers who spill livestock manure in Omaha will face a minimum \$250 fine, up from the current \$100. The law was proposed in response to numerous spills around meatpacking plants in south Omaha.

The Nebraska Trucking Association worked on the law with a coalition of local business owners and residents, who have complained for years about urine and manure spills on state highways. The spills also pose a hazard to public health and traffic safety. Design changes to the trucks reduced some of the spills, but residents complained that they were still happening often.

"This is a step that we're going to watch closely," said Larry Johnson, the trucking association's president. "We're hoping to see even fewer incidents than before."

LB403: Nebraska will only allow the sale of novelty lighters that have child-proof safety features. Firefighting groups argued that the lighters are a threat to young children because they can resemble toy guns, animals, tractors and other items. Some senators argued that they pose no greater risk than regular lighters or candles.

LB438: Nebraska will send state intervention teams into poorly performing schools to comply with the federal No Child Left Behind Act. The new law sets up an accountability system for Nebraska schools, and gives the State Board of Edu-

cation the power to designate "priority schools" with low performance scores.

LB674: Judges will have the power to impose longer ownership restrictions on people who have neglected animals. The law was inspired by a 2013 neglect case involving a puppy mill in Malcolm. A judge described the operation as an "animal Auschwitz," with dogs living in feces- and urine-crusting cages, but complained that he wasn't able to impose any restrictions on the owner beyond her two-year probation period.

LB690: Nebraska will take additional steps to expand in-home care services for the elderly, at a cost of \$8.2 million to the state and \$36.5 million in federal dollars. Supporters say the law will reduce Nebraska's long-term Medicaid expenses, because in-home care costs less than nursing home care.

LB698: Nebraska farmers will be able to mow and harvest hay along state highways each year, instead of every other year.

LB740: Veterans who recently left the military will qualify for in-state college tuition, as long as they've established residency in Nebraska and registered to vote. So will their spouses and dependents.

LB811: Assaulting a firefighter, paramedic, state corrections employee or social worker will carry the same penalty as the crime of assault on a peace officer. Anyone convicted of the felony charge faces a mandatory minimum sentence of three years in prison and a maximum of 50 years.

LB920: Nebraska will become the nation's last state to create a public guardian office for vulnerable people who can't make decisions on their own. The law will create the office as a last resort when no one is available to serve as a guardian or conservator.

LB923: Public school teachers, counselors and other employees will receive at least one hour of suicide prevention and awareness training each year. The law goes into effect on Friday, but schools won't have to provide the training until the 2015-16 school year.

KNOX CO. SHERIFF'S REPORT

On June 30, 2014, a stolen bike was reported by Jody Jessen west of Bloomfield. The bike is a children's 16-inch orange and black hot wheels bike with training wheels. It was last reported seen on Thursday, June 26. The Knox County Sheriff's Office is conducting an investigation as to the whereabouts of the stolen property.

On July 1, 2014, the Knox County Sheriff's Office received a report of a one-vehicle accident southwest of Bloomfield. A Knox County juvenile was driving north on 543rd Ave. and lost control of the vehicle. The vehicle left the roadway and entered a ditch before skidding and rolling out of the ditch, coming to rest in the opposite ditch. Bloomfield Ambulance and Fire Departments responded to the scene. The driver was transported to Osmond General Hospital for minor injuries.

On July 3, 2014, the Knox County Sheriff's Office investigated the theft of a blue 2007 Honda 4-wheeler from Daniel Folk's farm east of Bloomfield on Highway 84. The 4-wheeler has a white 11 gallon sprayer attached to the rear, with a homemade sprayer boom. Also on the 4-wheeler was a log chain and clevis. The 4-wheeler had been parked in Folk's machine shed prior to its disappearance. Two sets of foot prints were found inside the machine shed from the persons responsible for the theft. Anyone with information about this theft is encouraged to call the Knox County Sheriff's Office at 402-288-4261.

On July 4, 2014, a report was received of a stolen bull, southwest of Verdigris. Alex Hoffman reported that a black Angus/Simmental bull had been missing. A search of the property and a check with neighbors turned up nothing. The bull has a blue ear tag with "CHUB" written on it. It is also branded on the hip with "PE." Anyone with information about the location of this bull is asked to contact the Knox County Sheriff's Office or your local Law Enforcement Agency.

On July 6, 2014, the Knox County Sheriff's Office investigated a two-vehicle accident at the east entrance to Hideaway Acres, on Highway 121, 7 miles north of Crofton. Anthony Macke, Creighton, had damage to the pickup he was driving. Pamela Magnuson, Sioux City, Iowa, had damage to her car and the Jet Ski trailer and Jet Ski she was towing. There were no injuries.

On July 6, 2014, a report was received from Miranda Becker, Hartington, that someone had stolen a metal sign from the memorial site of her son's fatal accident, last year, south of Winnetoon. Anyone with information about the current location of this sign is encouraged to contact the Knox County Sheriff's Office or your local law enforcement agency.

movement of calves, said Roger Scheibe, executive director of the South Dakota Dairy Producers. The group supports the potential change.

"It's just one less thing they have to worry about," Scheibe said about farmers. "There has not been a problem."

The board has also been closely watching the progress of the PED virus and will discuss updates on that front. Federal dollars are now available for newly infected herds to manage the virus and research new vaccines. And a recent federal order will require the reporting of all infected herds. Farmers dealing with the virus will have to develop a management plan with a veterinarian.

Oedekoven said mandatory reporting already was in place within the state. Thirty-two herds in the state are infected with the virus.

The money available for vaccine research will be a good thing, said Glenn Muller, executive director of the South Dakota Pork Producers Council. And he hopes that producers continue to share and learn from each other even as reporting requirements increase.

At the meeting, board members will also hear testimony on licensing the Stockman's Livestock auction in Yankton, which recently changed owners. All of the nearly 35 livestock auctions in the state require annual license renewal. The hearing is only required because of the change in ownership.

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
