"We do have other critical needs," added Commissioner Garry Moore. "It would look a little silly for us to put \$2.4 million into something when we have a bridge over the Jim River that connects the east and west parts of the county that we can't find revenues for right now. But I don't disagree; we can have the discussion. Certainly, there is not going to be a commitment on our part any time soon.'

Commissioner Donna Freng joked that the city can have the road right now.

"We have a couple more we can throw in," added Sinclair.

Nelson responded, "I bet you do. And you'll throw in a bridge for free!"

On a more serious note. she added, "It's one of those long-term things. Is it our number one priority in the city for maintenance? No.

The county traditionally participates in cost-sharing for those items, and the commission said the expenditures are already planned for in its provisional 2015 budget.

In other business Tuesday, the commission:

• Was advised by Dan Johnson of Johnson Engineering to wait on moving ahead with plans to replace the Jim River Bridge along Highway 50. The commission had requested the engineering firm to put together a proposal for studying replacement options for the structure. Johnson said that the bridge currently has a

sufficiency rating above 50, which makes it ineligible for federal funding. "You want the state's involvement with this project. ... I think it would be wise to wait for the (federal) funding (that would come through the Department of Transportation), Johnson said. That would open the door to not only funding but access to state expertise on bridge construction. Johnson said he expects the sufficiency rating to fall below 50 in the spring of 2015. At that point, several options are available for the county to proceed;

• Approved a \$19,000 contract with Johnson Engineering for a drainage study related to replacement of a culvert along Walshtown Road. The culvert was recently washed out, and the county wants to replace it with something that won't suffer the same fate in the near future. The James River Water Development District said during its recent meeting in Yankton that it may have funds to assist with the project. With that in mind, the commission requested that the survey be done by Sept. 1 in order to submit an application. Johnson said it would be a challenge to get

• Heard a \$5,000 funding request from the Yankton Homeless Shelter for 2015. The commissioners said they would consider the request at the end of the year when the 2015 budget picture is clearer; and

• Listened to a resident's concern about a weed problem along 452nd Avenue between Volin and Irene. A landowner quit farming a sizable number of acres in that area several years ago, and local residents say the weeds are creating a nuisance. Efforts by the county to serve legal papers to the man to force the problem to be addressed have been unsuccessful. The commission is working with an acquaintance of the landowner who believes he can get on the property to mow and spray it. If not, the commission said it will have someone do the work and assess the landowner.
