# Some Science Fun For Summer

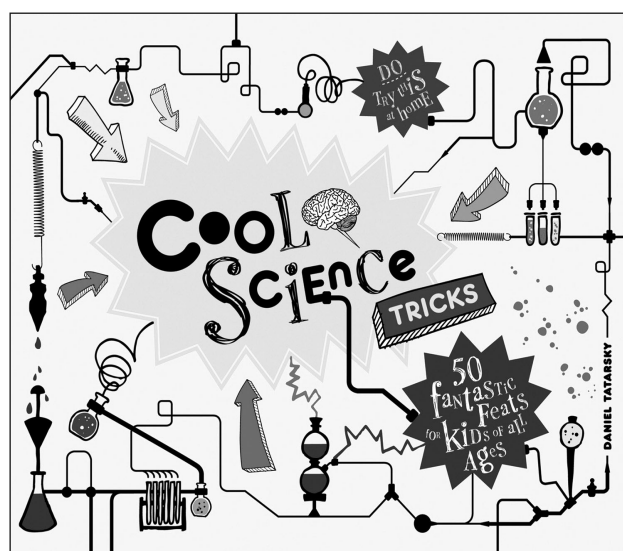
You will not be bored this summer.

Will. Not. There's no way you'll give Mom any reason for extra chores. You'll keep busy enough so that Dad doesn't come up with "ideas" for your time. You'll find something to do that doesn't involve more "When I was your age..." stories.

No, you're determined that the "B" word will not be in your vocabulary this summer — and with "Cool Science Tricks" by Daniel Tatarisky in your hand, it's a snap.

Go find something to do. You've heard that a thousand times in your life and you'll hear it a thousand more — but how cool would it be to find something to do that nobody else does, and then make your friends and siblings wonder how you did it?

You can — through science. And you can stop groaning now, because what you'll find in "Cool Science Tricks" isn't like what you'd



find in school. These science activities are actually fun to do.

Take, for instance, a lava lamp. By following the directions in this book, you can make one yourself. You'll also learn how to make a "witch's brew" with water and a few things you probably have around the house, and how to "supercharge" a tennis ball so that it bounces super high.

No doubt you've got paper around, too, and that's good because a lot of the tricks in this book use plain

old paper. Did you know that it's possible to step through a postcard? Or that you can baffle adults with three cuts to a business card? With the directions you'll learn here, paper will show you how water pressure works, how your eyes trick your brain, and how you can bust a pencil with a dollar bill.

Find out why you can't break an egg with one hand. Learn a survival skill with a soda can and toothpaste. Find out how to move a straw without touching it. See how easy it is to snatch

coins out of the air. Learn how to amaze your little brother, wow your little sister, and make grown-ups gasp at your incredible awesomeness.

No doubt by now, your child is eager to find some unusual summertime fun. "Cool Science Tricks" will give him that and more, but before the enjoyment commences, be sure to read — and read, and re-read — pages 8 and 9.

Those contain the warnings that author Daniel Tatarisky has added so your child remembers to ask for help, should anything be remotely dangerous. And yes, there are activities here that could be potentially iffy, including some with fire, candles, and matches.

And that leads me to this: "Cool Science Tricks" is a very good book filled with experiments that any red-blooded kid will love and there's actual learning to be had here, but know your audience — and if he (or she) is a trustworthy, curious 7-to-10-year-old, then it will be a welcome summer addition for you both. Give a kid like that "Cool Science Tricks," and the only "B" word that applies is "brilliant."

# Heritage Music Fest Saturday

ELK POINT — The 10th annual Heritage Music Fest — featuring country, gospel and variety music — will be held Saturday, July 19, at the air-conditioned Elk Point-Jefferson Middle School Gym, 402 S. Douglas, Elk Point. The festival runs from 11 a.m.-8:30 p.m.

The fundraiser proceeds will benefit Elk Point Mason Lodge No. 3 High School Youth Scholarship Program and funds the Youth SDCHIP Program.

Featured artists will be nationally renowned Nashville Singer/Songwriter Terry S. Smith who is famous for Johnny Cash's recording of "Far Side Banks of Jordan." He is also the National Traditional Country Music Association Songwriter of the Year in 1995 and 1996. He will be backed up by Rick and Harriette Andersen of Underwood, Iowa. They have been back up duo for international, national and local fiddlers, singers and instrumentalists

for more than 20 years and have attended the Old Time Fiddlers Contest in Yankton held in September for many years.

Traditional country duo Bob and Sheila Everhart, who helped to get the Music Fest started in 2004, will be special guests this year. They are promoters and organizers of the National Traditional Country Music Festival held the week before Labor Day in LeMars, Iowa, now in its 39th year.

Another featured Artist, Clarence Hayden of Richmond, Missouri, is a Nashville singer/songwriter and has several CDs out and performs on the country music stages in Missouri and Branson. He appears on the "RFD Show" in Sandstone, Minnesota, regularly as does Smith.

"Nebraska's Daughter," Pat Boilesen from Albion, Nebraska, will also perform. She is a singer, songwriter, honky-tonk piano player and poet. She is a performer of tradi-

tional/original western, country and gospel music.

On the program are South Dakota Country Music Hall of Fame inductees Wilbur Foss and Elaine Peacock. Foss is from Scotland and organizer of the annual Old Time Fiddlers Contest held each September at Yankton. Peacock is a local square dance caller, singer entertainer and recording artist from Elk Point and has released seven CDs.

Also featured are The Bumblebees from the Tyndall area.

Back for his third appearance will be local performer DeJay Langel of Jefferson.

Elk Point Mayor and pianist Isabel Trobaugh who will share her talent this year; as will 12-year-old singer T'Kayeh Sterling from Wakefield Nebraska.

## Neb. Vietnam Vets Reunion In Norfolk

NORFOLK, Neb. — When the Nebraska Vietnam Veterans hold their annual reunion in mid-August, it will mark 30 years, so local committee members felt it had to be special. The reunion, is slated for the Divots DeVent Center Aug. 14-17 and will include a wide range of entertainment and seminars.

Legendary recording artist Lee Greenwood will entertain nearly 1,000 Vietnam vets and their families Saturday, Aug. 16, at the Divots De-Vents Center, Norfolk, Nebraska. Greenwood is best known for his signature song, "God Bless the USA."

Paul Revere and the Raiders will be performing on Friday, Aug. 15, known for their 1960s and '70s music including songs such as "Louie, Louie" and "Kicks."

This get-together has become one of the premier reunions for Vietnam vets bringing brother veterans and their families together from various parts of Nebraska. It is to be emphasized that this is not just for Nebraska veterans as veterans from 11 other states are already registered for 2014 reunion. The gathering provides fellow vets the opportunity to rekindle friendships from past Vietnam reunions, plus the opportunity to meet new friends who are first timers to the event.

Although it originated as a reunion for soldiers who served in the Vietnam War, it is open to any veteran, their spouses, family members and guests including Iraq and Afghanistan veterans.

Each registration includes daily programs, speakers, workshops, Thursday barbecue, Sunday "survivors" breakfast plus three evenings of entertainment plus a commemorative T-shirt.
