Duck Stamp Winner To Be Honored

SIOUX FALLS — Adam Grimm, winner of the 2013 Federal Duck Stamp competition, will be honored at a celebration at the South Dakota Game Fish and Parks (SDGFP) Outdoor Campus at 1:30 p.m., on Saturday, Aug. 2.
Grimm, from Burbank, will display his artwork and sign stamps. Adam's daughter Madison Grimm, who is a recent winner of the Junior Duck Stamp competition, will also be in attendance.
The event will be held in conjunction with SDGFP's 2014 Outdoor University family weekend, which runs from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. The event is free to the public and there are several different activities for the entire family, including canoeing, rock climbing, fishing and outdoor cooking.
Stamps signed by the artists will be available for purchase the day of the event.
This year marks the 80th anniversary of the federal duck stamp. Since its enactment in 1934, this landmark initiative has generated almost a billion dollars — paid for and supported by waterfowl hunters, refuge visitors, conservationists, and stamp collectors — to conserve more than 6 million acres of wetlands across the United States. Hunters, bird watchers and other outdoor recreationists, art and stamp collectors, and many other people who want to invest in wetland conservation buy Federal Duck Stamps.

Thune Unveils Rail Service Website

WASHINGTON — The office of Sen. John Thune (R-S.D.) has announced the release of a new rail service section on his official website where South Dakota shippers concerned with inconsistent rail service can find the latest South Dakota rail developments.
On the site, South Dakota shippers and consumers will find the most up-to-date actions taken by Thune, access grain car reports, find contact information for the Surface Transportation Board (STB) and can leave a message for the senator about the problems they've experienced.
"We are reaching a critical juncture in South Dakota as wheat harvests begin," said Thune. "I will continue pressuring Canadian Pacific Railway, Burlington Northern Santa Fe Railroad, and Rapid City, Pierre, and Eastern Railroad to deliver the needed rail service to our state. I urge all South Dakota shippers to continue their discussions with the STB and to keep me informed of concerns by contacting me through my website. Since this winter, I have been committed to working with our producers and shippers to ensure our state's rail service problems are addressed, and urge shippers to visit my website for regular rail service updates."
Rail service in South Dakota continues to be challenging for all shippers. South Dakota's agriculture producers have been hit particularly hard by the ongoing rail service backlogs resulting in lower grain prices and diminishing grain elevator storage capacity due to unmoved stockpiles of last year's crops.

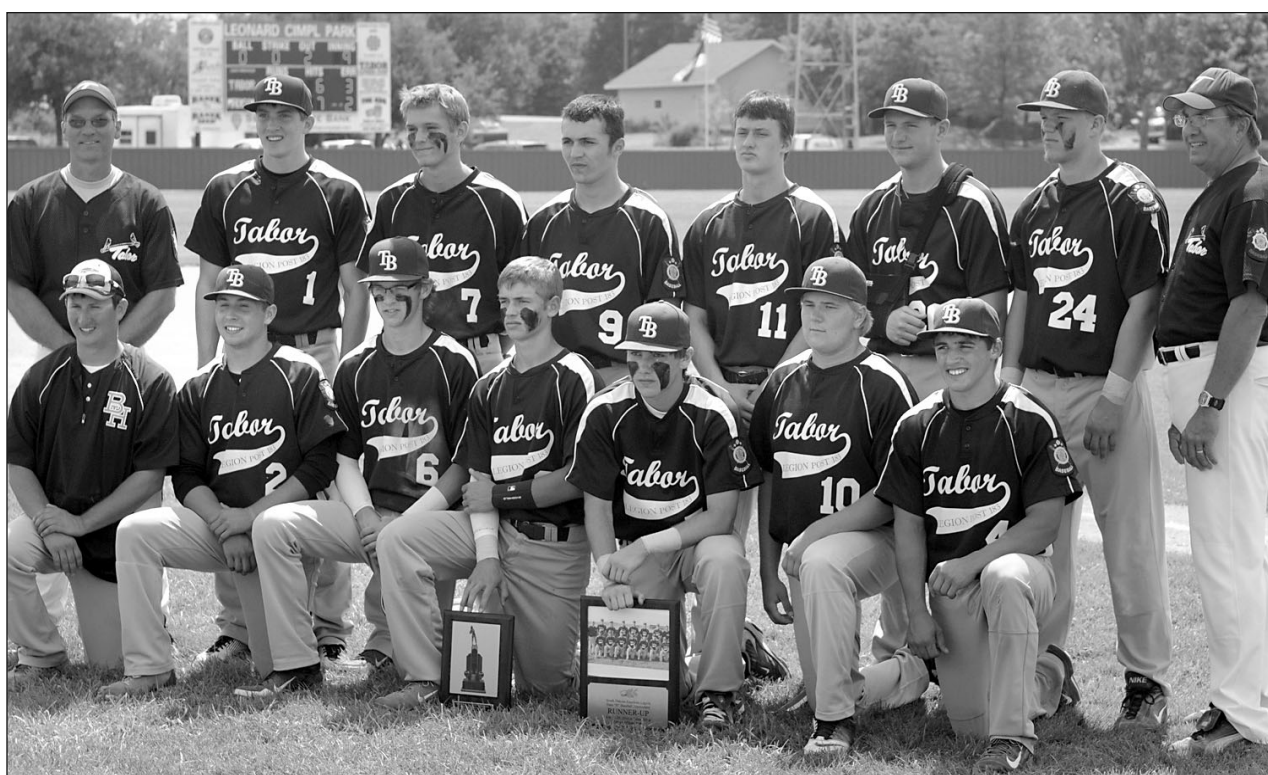
