On Friday, July 3, the Yankton Mall Farmers Market will be held west of the Fry'n Pan along 21st Street. Thereafter, it will be held at the same location on Saturdays starting July 11 and running through September.

Onward Yankton Deadline Coming Soon
The deadline for submitting a "big idea" to Onward Yankton is coming soon. The 100-day search for submissions ends July 9. Nearly 400 ideas have already been submitted, and more are arriving daily. Volunteer coordinators say they expect a flurry of submissions in the final days. Many of the most substantive ideas revolve around small business growth, river tourism and recreation, education, entertainment and downtown improvements. One proposal calls for a scenic railroad along the Missouri between Yankton and Vermillion, while another calls for a giant water slide from the Meridian bridge into downtown Yankton. "We're glad that people are thinking big and thinking outside the box," said John Andrews, one of Onward's volunteers. "There really aren't any bad ideas. Everybody seems caught up in the spirit of doing something big that will change our community for generations to come." Andrews said the Onward Yankton volunteers will whittle the 400 ideas down to a few dozen and then seek community input before narrowing it to a handful of finalists. Everyone is invited to participate in the discussion through Onward Yankton's Facebook page and at public discussions, including a community-wide meeting planned for mid-August. Five Safety Tips For A Safe Holiday
DES MOINES, Iowa — MidAmerican Energy Company wants customers to observe stars, stripes and safety this Independence Day. Water and electricity don't mix. Before you jump into the pool or lake this Fourth of July, be conscious of electrical hazards. Keep all electrical items at least ten feet away from water. Don't use electric tools such as hedge trimmers when it's raining, and be sure cords aren't running through standing water. If an electrical appliance falls into water, never reach in to grab it. First, make sure you are dry and not touching any metal objects, then unplug it or switch off the circuit breaker. 2. Barbecue smart. Each year an average of 8,800 home fires are caused by grilling, according to the National Fire Protection Association. Never use a grill indoors. Gases produced by charcoal or gas grills can be extremely harmful. Also, never leave a grill unattended and always ensure the grill is a safe distance from siding, decks and other flammable materials. 3. Teach children to play safe. Remind children to fly kites only in open areas where there are not any power lines. Make sure they know to never use metal on a kite, climb utility poles or trees with power lines running through them, play on or near electrical boxes, or enter an electrical substation. Call MidAmerican Energy at 888-427-5632 to retrieve lost balls or toys that accidentally get tossed over a substation fence. 4. Call before you dig. Building a deck to host a Fourth of July celebration? Digging a fire pit? Any time you dig, call your state's one-call system at least 48 hours prior to the excavation — it's a free service, and it is the law. In all states, call 811 to reach the One Call Center. 5. Look up and stay away. Make sure you know where overhead power lines are located before using fireworks, balloons or ladders. Contact with power lines can be extremely dangerous. Always carry a ladder in the horizontal position, rather than the vertical position, to avoid brushes with power lines. Also, if you are boating or using long-handled pool skimmers, be alert for power lines that could be above you. If you come across a downed power line, stay away and call MidAmerican Energy at 888-427-5632. Always assume downed power lines are energized. Vermillion's Roripaugh Named SD Poet Laureate

PIERRE — Gov. Dennis Daugaard has appointed Lee Ann Roripaugh of Vermillion as South Dakota's poet laureate. Roripaugh will succeed poet David Allan Evans, who has served as South Dakota's poet laureate since 2002. Evans announced his retirement from the post earlier this year. The South Dakota Arts Council serves South Dakotans and their communities through the arts and works closely with the poet laureate. "South Dakota has a rich tradition in the arts, and Roripaugh's work is outstanding," said Arts Council Director Michael Pangburn. "Roripaugh is committed to serving the poetry community and has the knowledge and expertise to do so. On behalf of the Arts Council, I thank David Allan Evans for his dedicated service with more than 12 years of traveling the state and promoting poetry in South Dakota." Roripaugh is the author of four volumes of poetry and has received various awards and recognitions. She currently teaches Creative Writing at the University of South

Dakota in Vermillion and is the editor of the national, quarterly journal South Dakota Review. Under the terms of Senate Bill 86, which the Legislature passed and the Governor signed this year, Roripaugh will serve a four-year term that ends on July 1, 2019. Future governors will have the opportunity, every four years, to name a new poet laureate to promote poetry and represent South Dakota's varied literary traditions.

BOARD OF TRADE

CHICAGO (AP) — Grain futures were mostly lower Wednesday on the Chicago Board of Trade. Wheat for September delivery declined 27.25 cents to \$5.8850 a bushel; September corn was 50 cent higher at 4.2250 a bushel; December oats were off 6.25 cents at 2.7150 a bushel; while November soybeans lost 7.75 cents to \$10.2950 a bushel. Beef and pork were higher on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange. August live cattle was up 3 cents to \$15107 a pound; August feeder cattle rose 3.78 cents to \$2.1850 a pound; while August lean hogs were .48 cent higher to \$.7485 a pound.

WALL ST. RECAP

Stocks closed higher Wednesday as investors became optimistic that a deal could be struck on Greece's debt issues. Hopes were raised after Greece's government appeared to soften its stance toward its creditors. However, European officials ruled out any deal before a Greek referendum on the matter, scheduled for this weekend. For the day: The Dow Jones industrial average rose 138.40 points, or 0.8 percent, to 17,757.91. The Standard & Poor's 500 index climbed 14.31 points, or 0.7 percent, to 2,077.42. The Nasdaq composite gained 26.26 points, or 0.5 percent, to 5,013.12. For the week: The Dow is down 188.77 points, or 1.1 percent. The S&P 500 index is down 24.07 points, or 1.2 percent. The Nasdaq is down 67.38 points, or 1.3 percent. For the year: The Dow is down 65.16 points, or 0.4 percent. The S&P 500 index is up 18.52 points, or 0.9 percent. The Nasdaq is up 277.07 points, or 5.9 percent.
