Victim In Boating Accident Identified

CEDAR COUNTY, Neb. — The investigation continues into Monday morning's fatal two-boat accident in the tailwaters below Gavins Point Dam in Cedar County, Nebraska.

The accident claimed the life of 68-year-old Carolyn Neyens of Creighton, Nebraska, according to Conservation Officer Jeff Jones with the Nebraska Game & Parks Commission (NGPC).

The two boats collided at approximately 9:55 a.m. Monday, according to a NGPC news release. The victim was a passenger in one of the boats. She was transported to Avera Sacred Heart Hospital in Yankton where she was pronounced dead.

Cedar County Attorney George Hirschbach had ordered an autopsy on the victim. Both boats have been impounded.

Alcohol does not appear to be a contributing factor in the accident, according to the NGPC news release.

NGPC spokesman Jerry Kane told the *Press & Dakotan* he had no new developments

to report as of Wednesday afternoon.

Hirschbach also had no additional information or comments Wednesday afternoon, according to his office.

Hirschbach had previously said he was waiting until the NGPC had completed its work before making any further statements.

"This matter is still under intensive investigation by the Nebraska Game & Parks Commission and, absent reports, a response at this time would be premature," the county attorney said Tuesday in a statement.

Those responding to the accident included the Nebraska Game & Parks Commission, the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, Nebraska State Patrol, Cedar County Sheriff's Office, Cedar County Emergency Management, Yankton County Emergency Management, Yankton County Search and Rescue, Yankton County EMS and Yankton Fire Department.

Neyen's funeral services are set for 10:30 a.m. Friday at St. Ludger Catholic Church in Creighton. The Rev. Jeff Lorig will officiate with burial in St. Ludger Catholic Cemetery.

Visitation will be held from 4-7 p.m. today (Thursday) at St. Ludger Catholic Church with a 7 p.m. wake.

At 11 a.m., elementary-age children are invited to test their super hero abilities and strength at Super Hero Training Camp. Arrive on time so the staff can divide everyone into groups and explain the activities.

Preschool story time is repeated on Wednesday, July 8, at 10:15 a.m. At 3 p.m. attendees are making super hero sock puppets for our weekly craft. This is intended for elementary-age children, but younger children may attend if accompanied by an adult.

The staff is showing a movie about a wonderful little hero at 2 p.m. on Friday, July 10. It is rated G and is 93 minutes long. Come in out of the heat, relax and enjoy.

There are still two more weeks to participate in the summer reading program. Activities run through July 24 and the Superhero Storehouse prize store is open from July 27-Aug. 1. "Every Hero Has a Story" is for preschoolers and elementary students and "Unmask" is the teen program for students in grades 6-12. It's not too late to stop by the library, register, pick up your program materials and join the fun.

BOARD OF TRADE

CHICAGO (AP) — Grain futures were mixed Thursday in early trading on the Chicago Board of Trade.

Wheat for September delivery was unchanged at \$5.8850 a bushel; September corn was 1.25 cents higher at \$4.2375 a bushel; December oats were unchanged at \$2.7150 a bushel; while November

soybeans lost 2 cents at 10.2750 cents a bushel.

Beef mixed and pork higher on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange. August live cattle was .48 cent higher at \$151.55 a pound; August feeder cattle was .03 cent lower at \$2.1847 a pound; August lean hogs gained .55 cent to \$.7540 a pound.

WALL ST. RECAP

Stocks ended a tumultuous trading week with a slight loss on Thursday as investors sought safety ahead of an extended Independence Day weekend. Investors sold after the release of a downbeat report from the International Monetary Fund on Greece's finances as the country prepares for a Sunday vote on terms of its bailout. U.S. markets will be closed Friday.

For the day: The Dow Jones industrial average fell 27.80 points, or 0.2 percent, to 17,730.11.

The S&P 500 slipped 0.64 points, less than 0.1 percent, to 2,076.78.

The Nasdaq composite slipped 3.91 points, or less than 0.1 percent, to 5,009.21.

For the week: The Dow is down 216.57 points, or 1.2 percent.

The S&P 500 index is down 24.71 points, or 1.2 percent.

The Nasdaq is down 71.29 points, or 1.4 percent.

For the year: The Dow is down 92.96 points, or 0.5 percent.

The S&P 500 index is up 17.88 points, or 0.9 percent.

The Nasdaq is up 273.16 points, or 5.8 percent.
